GENE TUNNEY NOW LEAGUE LEADERS AT SEA IN MORE FIND IT HARD TO WAYS THAN ONE BETTER POSITION

NEW YORK, Aug. 17.—(AP)—James J. Tunney, private citizen, formerly Gene Tunney, heavyweight champion of the world, is on the high seas today bound for Europe for his projected walking trip with Thornton Wilder, novelist. Gene, as flattered as any other private citizen, sailed yesterday aboard the Mauretania.

Before sailing, Tunney motored to Bridgeport, Conn., where he met his fiancée, Miss Mary Josephine Lander, who made a hurried trip from Bridgeport to New York and returned with him to New York. They were guests at a luncheon given by Mrs. George Lander, Jr., mother of the prospective bride. Miss Lander did not accompany him to the ship.

Impatient at the crowd and the photographers who almost surrounded the Mauretania, Gene blocked his way on the pier, Tunney hurried aboard the vessel and sought seclusion in his suite.

"Before I do anything else, I want to tell the reporters who found him there, 'I wish to say that I do not want any questions asked. There are probably 48 questions each of you want to ask. As there are 38 of you here, that makes 2184 too many."

"I have not in any way connected myself to any business proposition and stories that I have done so are without foundation. I am not contemplating what I will do until I return from my trip. All reports to the contrary are erroneous."

"I hope to have a pleasant time abroad and will have if the public will let me. That's all."

With Tunney on the Mauretania are William O. McKeon, New York sports writer, Leonard Hannan of Cleveland and William Powell of New York.

A few hours before Tunney boarded the ship, Tom Heeney, rugged New Zealander, who failed to win the heavyweight title just before Tunney gave it away, departed for Vancouver, B. C. from where he will sail for his homeland next Wednesday. Heeney was accompanied by the American girl he married shortly after his defeat by Tunney.

GREAT GOLF PUTS VIRGINIA WILSON INTO THE FINALS

INDIAN HILLS CLUB, CHICAGO, Aug. 17.—(AP) Virginia Wilson of Chicago today won her way to the finals of the women's western golf championship by giving Dorothy Page of Madison, the 1924 champion, one of the worst beatings of her life and winning 5 and 4.

The winner shot the first nine in 14, three under par, with 5 birdies in a row and turned for home 4 up. She raised up the short sixth and the 12th but sank a 15-foot putt for her sixth birdie on the long 15th to win the hole and the match. Her opponent will be Mrs. Henry Pender of Los Angeles who defeated Mrs. G. S. Hill of Kansas City 2 and 1.

DICK RAMIES IS WINNER, BUT JOE SHOWS HIS CLASS

Outboxing and outpunching his heavier opponent in practically all rounds of the fight, Dick Ramirez last night won on a judges' decision over Joe Jewett, 156-pound slugger of Portland, before a fair-sized crowd at the armory. Ramirez made a favorable impression with the crowd, fighting three rounds with a badly injured hand, sustained when he hit Jewett a solid blow on the body.

The fighters mixed in a lively fashion during the 10 rounds, during which Jewett was dangerously close to a knockout several times. Both fought clean and worked hard to please the spectators, who were liberal with applause at the end of each round. With Ramirez the victor of last night's affair, Medford fans are looking forward to a meeting between Ramirez and Gene O'Grady, Ashland fighter, who has been having considerable success in the prize ring.

Last night's semi-windup between Pat Padelford and Sam Dillback ended early when Dillback was knocked out in the first round. Sammy Gordon of Portland was to have fought Padelford, but upon seeing Padelford was seized with an attack of "cold feet" and cancelled the match.

In the second preliminary, Les Snyder of this city was knocked out in the first round by Battling Judd of Roseburg. The latter had the appearance of a finished fighter, while the former seemed to be only a beginner. In the first preliminary, Kid Marshall of this city lost to Kid Bechtel of Portland in the third round by a technical knockout when his eye became badly cut.

Last night's card was promoted by Gas Hall, who announced that he is planning to bring a number of Portland and Seattle topnotchers to Medford during the ensuing fall and winter months. Yesterday he directed letters to Nate Drexman, Seattle promoter, and Joe Wood, Portland boxing promoters, and through these two he expects to sign up Battling Judd, Kenyon Kent and Joe Silver, all of whom are well known in northwestern boxing circles.

WIFE OF AIR HERO WANTS A DIVORCE

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 17.—(AP) The Examiner today said that Mrs. Erma Meyer Lyon had filed suit here seeking annulment of her marriage to Captain Harry W. Lyon, Jr., aviator of the monoplane Southern Cross on its epoch-making flight to Australia.

The charges were reported as being that at the time of the marriage, June 2, 1928, Captain Lyon was legally married to another woman.

BOSTON, Mass., Aug. 17.—(AP)—Captain Harry Lyon, Jr., trans-Pacific flier, denied here today that he was the husband of Mrs. Erma Meyer Lyon, who was reported in dispatches from San Francisco as having brought suit for annulment of her marriage to Captain Lyon. The aviator was here on his way to his home in Paris Hill, Maine, where his wife, Mrs. Jane Lyon, and his mother are awaiting him.

Lyon said that he knew the San Francisco woman but that his wife was Mrs. Jane Lyon of Paris Hill. He said he would send word to his counsel in Los Angeles to take any necessary action in the proceedings.

"I cannot understand why that woman should take such a step," Lyon said. "She knows I am married."

ASHLAND PLANS TO SELL PUBLIC TOURIST CAMP

ASHLAND, Aug. 17.—(Special)—Proposals to lease the Ashland city tourist camp, has brought up the question for discussion and it seems possible that the question may be brought before the people at the general election for a decision. According to the city charter, the administration of the park is the work of the park board, so that an election would be required if any changes were to be made.

According to the members of the park board, there are no funds for developing the camp ground, as it should be developed, and it would only be on the grounds of securing certain developments that the board would consider leasing the property. While the camp is self-supporting, there is no surplus of funds for development. The greatest need of the camp at the present time is additional cabins.

VICTIMS ST. FRANCIS DAM DISASTER ASK FOR BIG DAMAGES

BAKERSFIELD, Cal., Aug. 17.—(AP) Suits totaling \$1,500,000 for loss of life and injuries caused by the bursting of the St. Francis dam last March have been filed here against the city of Los Angeles and William Mulholland, city engineer, by survivors of persons killed in the disaster.

Thirty-seven complaints are now recorded at the county clerk's office. Many actions seek amounts from \$25,000 to \$100,000 for the death of small children swept away by the flood waters.

All of the actions were prepared by Attorneys Lawrence Edwards and Len H. Honey of Los Angeles.
