

LOCAL REALTORS DECIDE KMED OF GREAT VALUE

Beginning next Friday night, August 24, station KMED will broadcast between the hours of 8 and 9 o'clock, programs under the direction of various members of the Medford Realty board.

For the past two years the board has sponsored weekly programs, but this is the first time that individual dealers have agreed to advertise, although the matter has been discussed at several meetings.

Members of the board expressed the opinion that radio advertising is of great value to the valley. Suggestions were offered a two-week series of familiarizing the public with the Rogue River valley people. The history of the growth of superkrant and bacon advertising and its results was given as an example of the value of getting a product before the public, especially by advertising in magazines and newspapers of wide circulation.

Tonight's radio program will be arranged by Charles Wing, chairman of the radio committee for this month. Next Friday members of the World and World real estate agency will sponsor the program.

IS MARY GARDEN TO BE MARRIED?

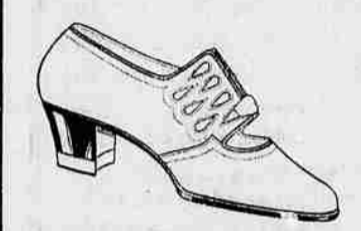
