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### ALL RECORDS AT LOCAL TELEPHONE OFFICE BROKEN

Over 19,000 local telephone calls are handled daily by the Medford Telephone company, marking the biggest season during R. G. Hammond's 13 years in charge of the office. This is an increase of 5000 calls daily over those of last month, he stated today.

The fruit season is credited with the sudden popularity of the telephone. Long distance calls have also increased proportionately. One hundred stations have been added in the city during 1928, bringing the total number of families now using telephones up to 3190.

Twelve operators are employed at the central office and it is expected that this number will be increased next year. Mr. Hammond said. Additional equipment in the office and underground cable will be installed within a few months according to present plans of the manager.
