LITTLE APPLIGATE RANCHER IS AFTER CO. WATER MASTER

An order asking for a modification of decree in the case of the Little Appligate Improvement company against J. J. Munsell and wife was filed in the circuit court late yesterday by Munsell through his attorneys, Kelly & Kelly. A decree was handed down recently deciding the suit in favor of the improvement company.

Munsell asks that Fred S. Cummings, county water master, be instructed to put in less expensive types of turnouts and, in an affidavit, charges that the county water master is employing high-grade lumber, "planned on four sides," expensive skilled labor and "jancy measuring devices," when rough pine lumber, common labor and a yard stick would be sufficient. He alleges that a carpenter is employed at \$8 per day, with a helper at \$4 per day and that the turnouts will cost about \$29 each, if the water master is permitted to complete his plans.

Munsell avers that the turnouts installed by himself are just as serviceable and that "I know of no farmer in Jackson county who can stand the expense of \$20 a turnout." It is further stated in the affidavit that, as the court ordered, approximately 40 of the turnouts, the total will amount to "quite a sum."

It is further alleged in the affidavit that there is a "conspiracy" between the water master and the carpenter for the high-priced "turnouts."

The hearing on the application for the modification will be heard later.

JOE GAGNON ASKS CITY TO RENT HIM P'VILLE RAILROAD

Joe I. Gagnon, who has been promoting railroads to the coast and the Blue Lodge mine and the timber belt of the Applegate for years, is declaring with the city council for rental of the old Jacksonville road to further his latest plan. The city now owns the railroad.

Gagnon proposes to rent the road, if the city will replace the missing "frogs," rails and switches, and the city proposes that Gagnon rent the railroad and replace the missing parts himself. Gagnon holds this is not a fair proposition and he should not be required to pay rent if he makes repairs. The matter is scheduled for an early hearing at a council meeting.

Gagnon says if the railroad can be rented he will build a spur from his sawmill in Southwest Medford to McAndrews street, near the Southern Pacific railroad and use the spur in the hauling of lumber and logs, for the operation of his sawmill near Jacksonville. The spur would eliminate that portion of the railroad in the city limits. Gagnon says that, inasmuch as the railroad is only resting in the weather at present, the city should welcome his offer to operate it and keep it in repair.
