

PEARS SELL HIGH AT \$2.50 PER BOX, PORTLAND MART

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 21.—(AP) Business prevailed on local wholesale fruit and vegetable markets here today and prices were a trifle irregular on some commodities. Peaches were scarce, the bulk of offerings being Oregon Chieftains going at 90¢-95¢ per box. Chieftains were offered only in small lots, shipments from the Yakima district still being light. Dealers look for larger receipts from that quarter later in the week.

Pears were plentiful and sold at a wide range of prices depending on quality. Best Bartlett went at \$2.50 per box while faced and filled varieties ranged downward to \$1.50.

Blackberries and huckleberries comprised the bulk of offerings in that division. Blackberries went mostly around \$1.00 per crate, huckleberries from 15¢ to 20¢ per pound.

White grapes, the first of the season which arrived yesterday, were selling at \$1.25 per lug of 24 to 25 pounds. Other varieties of grapes were steady.

Tomatoes were in oversupply and cheaper at 45¢-75¢ per box. Hubbard squash was offered in fairly liberal amount and fetched 35¢ per pound. Summer squash was cheaper at 25¢ per pound.

Country dressed meats were steady and unchanged although veal was scarce and firm at 22¢. Hogs moved out well but supplies were ample to meet demand. Lamb was inclined to drag. Poultry prices were likewise unchanged but no accumulation of stock was noticeable.

Butter and egg values were firm but not notably changed from yesterday's figures.

NEW YORK, Aug. 21.—(AP) The stock market gave an impressive demonstration of strength today as pool operations were resumed on a broad scale in a wide assortment of rails and specialties. Nearly two score issues were elevated to new high levels for the year or longer on gains ranging from 1 to 2 points. Trading showed a marked expansion in volume.

Prospects of heavy crop movements this fall stimulated buying of the railroad shares. Texas and Pacific, St. Paul preferred and St. Louis Southwestern all reached new high ground, the first named climbing 7 points. Pere Marquette jumped 5 points.

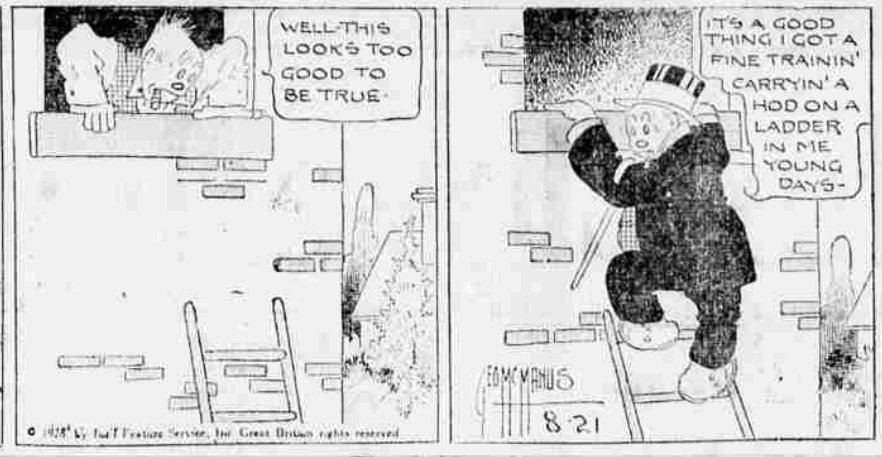
