WORLD TRAVELER STOPS IN CITY; PRAISES MEDFORD

"Of all the places I have seen during my seven months travels around the world, Cairo, Egypt, with its dark, dull looking women and men wearing white robe affairs in vogue 2000 years ago, appealed to me the most." It was Mrs. E. Johnston, nurse of San Francisco, telling a Tribune reporter about her jaunt to Europe and the Orient. The tourist left here this morning for her home after spending the night in Medford.

"I would say that about half of the women one sees on the streets of Cairo wear veils and invariably are clothed in dark dresses. Many of the people are westernized and wear the sort of clothes one sees around here," Mrs. Johnston said.

The tourist remarked that Europe was less interesting to her because the people are so much like one sees over here, while in the Orient everything is picturesque and the mode of life is reversed.

"China's streets are filled with beggars. As I left one hotel at least a dozen coolies lined up inside the door to get their tips. They are usually satisfied with small amounts, but they seem to think that all American travelers are millionaires and can give as often as they feel like reaching out their hands for money," Mrs. Johnston said, and added that she thought that it was the fault of the Americans who introduced the practice of tipping servants in that country.

London, Naples, Paris and some of other European cities were visited by Mrs. Johnston, who said this morning that she was disappointed in Italy as it was much too dirty to suit her.

"Until I stopped here last night I didn't know that Medford was on the map. There is evidently a great deal of business in the town and the valley is beautiful," the visitor remarked.
