

AUGUST SNOW IN TURKEY SPREADS DEATH AND RUIN

TRABZOND, Turkey, Aug. 22.—(AP)—The first August snow in Turkish history, spreading death and destruction over Trabzond and the surrounding region, has sent the inhabitants scurrying to the mountains to play that Allah's wrath be averted.

While Constantinople and Ankara swelter in the hottest summer experienced in years, snow, mysterious and phenomenal to the natives, continues to fall in Trabzond. It is piled 10 feet deep on the Gumush-Khane plateau, above the city, and 12 persons have been frozen to death. Crops are ruined and hundreds of cattle have perished.

Two shepherds were found dead from the cold, on the plateau today, surrounded by a flock of frozen sheep. Fanatically superstitious, the inhabitants of Trabzond, who were the only people in Turkey to actively resist the adoption of the hat in place of the time-honored fez, see in this icy visitation a manifestation of Allah's wrath. Just as earthquakes followed the religious changes recently decreed by the nationalist government.

The people believe their god is angry because of the scrapping of the Arabic alphabet, the sacred symbols in which the koran was written. This change was also effected by order of the government. President Mustafa Kemal not only orders that the Arabic alphabet be replaced by the Latin, but adopted a novel method of teaching the new form of writing.

But the faithful of Trabzond, whose ancestors through the generations since Mohammed took Allah's dictation in Arabic letters and wrote down his laws in the koran, have adhered to those sacred figures, believe that mere man has no right to discard them. The mosques are filled day and night with devout, frightened worshippers who pray that Allah have mercy and that he make the snow cease falling and cause the temperature to rise.

NFGRO ELK LEADER REFUSES TO SERVE G. O. P. COMMITTEE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—(AP)—J. Finley Wilson, grand exalted ruler of the Negro Elks, has declined to serve under the republican national committee in an advisory capacity, declaring he was "not in complete harmony with the policies of the republican party, as revealed under recent republican administrations." Wilson said in a letter to Chairman Work, that his race had lost civil rights, political representation and political leadership, and complained of "humiliating segregation within the civil service."

"I have the honor of being executive head of the largest and most influential of negro fraternities, and the additional honor of being head of the fraternity of negro fraternities," he wrote. "I know the sentiments they represent. Consequently, I can not permit myself to serve under a victorious leadership of which I do not approve."

Wilson left here for Chicago last night to attend a convention of negro voters.

GET \$19,000 IN BANK ROBBERY

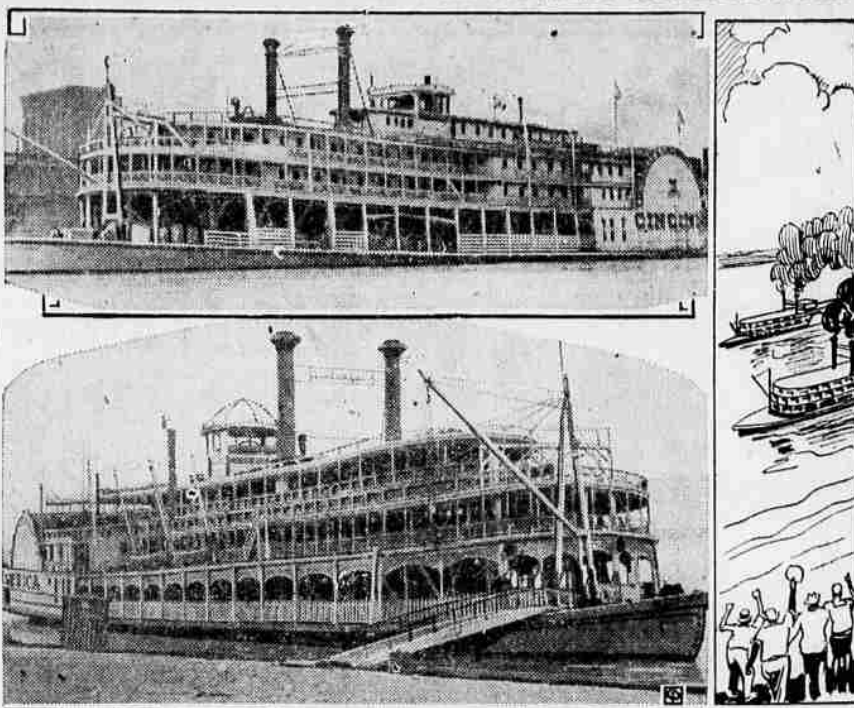

LIVE WIRE KILLS FIVE MEMBERS OF PHOENIX FAMILY

PHOENIX, Ariz., Aug. 22.—(AP)—Five persons were electrocuted here last night when they stumbled across a bare 2300-volt high-power line blown to the ground during a terrific wind storm shortly before midnight.

Three of the victims, Richard Miller, his wife and son, were instantly killed. Two others, Miller's son, Wesley, and a neighbor, Carl Meeks, died attempting to rescue the three. Miller first stumbled across the wire when he left his home on his way to work. His shrieks of agony brought his wife and a son to his aid, but they both died when they made an effort to pull him from the dead wire. Wesley, another son, escaped from the wire once when he endeavored to save his brother and parents and his screams for help attracted the attention of Meeks.

PETER PAN TARRED AND FEATHERED AS LONDON KIDS RAGE

LONDON, Aug. 22.—(AP)—The children of London are deeply resentful over the indignity inflicted upon one of their dearest friends—the statue of Peter Pan in Kensington Gardens, which during the night was tarred and feathered by unidentified vandals.

The youngsters who daily gather with their nurses and school-teachers about the figure of James Barrie's immortal boy hero, went upon seeing the bronze body of their friend in uncouth tar and feather garb.

When at 9 o'clock last night some of Peter Pan's young acquaintances said goodbye to him he was in his usual position atop the rugged tree trunk around the base of which tiny fairies, rabbits and mice peep shyly in response to the call of Peter's pipes.

When they returned this morning to say good morning to him he was hardly recognizable. Later, when park keepers endeavored to remove Peter's ugly covering, the children applauded.

The statue, probably shared, with the Statue of Liberty, the honor of being the most noted monument in the world. It was modeled in 1912 by the late Sir George Hampton, president of the Royal Society of Sculptors, inspired by Barrie's story, "Peter Pan in Kensington Gardens."

The statue is situated within a short distance of the round pond and broad walk, which Barrie immortalized.

Among the host of mothers, nurses and teachers who take children to the statue to illustrate the famous story is Lady Farrer, who has become known as "Lady Pan" because each Saturday she leads a group of children in the shadow of the statue and tells them nature lore stories.

Scotland Yard has been called in to aid the local police in running down the tar and feather perpetrators. No serious damage was done to the statue and after a thorough cleaning no trace will be left of the outrage.

Another Star of Screen Decides to Get a Divorce

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 21.—(AP)—Divorce will probably end the married life of another screen couple, unsuccessful after six years of marriage and two efforts at reconciliation, Mrs. Wallace MacDonald, known on the screen as Doris May, announced today.

Separated on July 1 with the agreement to remain apart for a month, Mrs. MacDonald and her husband agreed to extend the trial until September 1 at the conclusion of the first month, but today Mrs. MacDonald intimated she would seek divorce.

"I am to give Mr. MacDonald my decision when the extension expires again," she said. "It is probable that I will decide on a divorce."

The two were married five years ago when Mrs. MacDonald was starting as leading lady for Douglas MacLean. Mrs. MacDonald said yesterday she might seek the stage or return to the films, but her husband was noncommittal.

BOY DROWNS WHEN HE FALLS INTO W. RIVER

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 22.—(AP)—Edward Cramer, 12, was drowned in the Willamette river late yesterday. The lad fell off a log in a boom just south of the inter-county bridge and was unable to swim to safety. The boy was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Cramer, who were in Oregon City at the time of the accident. Mr. and Mrs. Cramer and their six children came here several weeks ago from Mosier, Ore., and were camped on the Willamette.

RED BLUFF RED SKIN HELD FOR KILLING WIFE

RED BLUFF, Cal., Aug. 22.—(AP)—William Philpott, 35-year-old digger Indian, was held here today as the result of the killing of his wife, who was shot to death last night in a scuffle with Philpott over the possession of his automobile key. The tragedy occurred on the ranch of Hiram Johnson, Jr., near Cottonwood.

Philpott told the police he was drunk and wanted to go after more liquor, but his wife had the key to the automobile. Philpott told Sheriff Floyd Hull of Tehama county that during a scuffle over the key his wife seized a .38 caliber revolver. In a fight over the weapon he declared it was accidentally discharged.

The woman never told Hull that the woman held hold of the gun. Philpott did not try to escape and was arrested and lodged in the Tehama county jail.

SCHOOL TEACHER IS INNOCENT GRAFTER

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 22.—(AP)—An Oregon school teacher, innocently it is believed, passed a counterfeit dollar on the state educational department in payment of the fee on a teacher's certificate. The bad dollar was detected at a local bank where a teller who didn't like the looks of it seized the coin and broke it in two. The pieces were returned to the state school superintendent's office today. The educational department had sent the money to the bank for deposit. EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 22.—(AP)—Records of Registrar Earl M. Pallette of the University of Oregon indicate that neither Keith Pollock nor Phillip Stata, Dallas county youths sentenced yesterday at Helena, Mont., for grand larceny, is or has been a student at the University of Oregon.

Reports from Helena stated that the youths represented themselves as students at the university here. Registrar Pallette could find no record of anyone of either surname ever having attended the university, he said.

W. ROGERS GIVES UP A FORTUNE TO HELP STAGE PAL

NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Will Rogers, flying cowboy humorist, has come to the aid of another aviator—Fred Stone—at the cost of some \$500,000 to himself. Stone was crippled in an airplane crash just when he was to go into rehearsals for a new musical comedy show starring him and his daughter, Dorothy. Rogers offered to take his friend's place. Charles Dillingham, producer of the yet-untitled show, accepted the offer.

Rogers will lose close to \$500,000 in cancelled motion picture, feature writing and personal appearance contracts, Dillingham said.

Rogers telegraphed Stone: "If you don't want Dorothy to wait until you are entirely recovered, I will go into the show with her. Just to sort of plug along till you are able to rejoin, and I will do the best I can with your part. Dorothy can keep telling me how you would have played it."

"Dorothy, of course, would be the star, and I don't want any billing. Anything you and Dorothy and Dillingham say goes with me."

The show means October 1.

FISHING BOAT IS WASHED ASHORE 2 MEN MISSING

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 22.—(AP)—Washed above the sea wall, above high tide on the Reedsport ocean beach, the Crackerbox, fishing boat owned by Clyde Chase of Reedsport, keeps the secret of the mysterious disappearance of the two men who manned her, Carl Miller, 37, of Siltcoos, and Peter Olson, 37, of Marshfield. The Umpqua coast guard is patrolling 20 miles of beach in a search for the bodies of the men, believed drowned.

The two men, both seasoned sailors and experienced fishermen who have followed fishing for 20 years, left Reedsport Saturday, August 11, to troll for Chinook salmon. Sunday afternoon, August 19, the 28-foot fishing boat was found right side up by the coast guard, beached high with engine in running order, and a gasoline tank nearly full of fuel.

Disappearance of the two men was further complicated by the fact that their clothing and the blankets from the bed were missing, but as it appeared that the boat had been beached for two or three days when found, it is believed that passing campers carried these off.
