

FRANK DOLP IS STILL LEADING; WILLING'S OUT

BOB O'LEIK CLUB, CHICAGO, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Chick Evans of Chicago today took another step towards his ninth western amateur golf championship by defeating Kenneth Hiser, twice big ten golf champion, 6 and 5. Evans had par golf for the 18 holes he shot in the afternoon, while he was not quite so good in the morning round, as the course was mowing from a torrential rain. Hiser was off line with his iron frequently and had many struggles with traps. Lawrence Muller, Quincy, Ill., defeated Rial Rolfe, Chicago, 3 and 2. Gus Novotny, Chicago, defeated Dr. D. F. Willing of Portland, Oregon, one up. Frank Dolp, Portland, Ore., defeated Ira Couch, Chicago, 4 and 2.

BOB O'LEIK CLUB, CHICAGO, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Over a heavy course, dotted with pools of water, surprisingly good golf was played today in the first round of the quarter finals for the western amateur golf championship by all eight contestants. The largest margin of advantage in the four matches was only two up, and this was gained by Chick Evans over Kenneth Hiser, who had the medal score of the eight. The best score of the round was made by Frank Dolp of Portland, Ore., who with 73, one above par, got just a one hole advantage over Ira Couch of Chicago, who played the first nine in one under par. The other Oregon entry, Dr. D. F. Willing, also scored well with 76, but finished the round one down to Gus Novotny of Chicago, who had a 75. In the other match Lawrence Muller of Quincy, Ill., a Notre Dames student, playing evenly for a 78 was one up on his rival Rolfe, formerly big ten champion for Illinois.

The dead are Mr. and Mrs. George Wise, Mrs. Lester Vanderweert and her two small children, Jack and Joan. One of the children died on the way to the hospital, the other four persons were killed instantly. They were bound for Quebec.

TUNNEY ADVISED TRY BOBBY JONES' AUTOGRAPH PLAN

LONDON, Aug. 23.—(AP)—Autograph-seekers have added a new irritation to Gene Tunney's already overtaxed patience. Just when he was stretched out resting in an English railway "carriage" with all his troubles apparently over for the day at least, the retired champion was discovered by a band of youngsters from London's slums, returning to their homes after a holiday at "Sonsall." The youths, swarmed through the corridor toward Gene's carriage, yelling like wild Indians and indiscriminately demanding "autographs," while the railway guards sought to herd them back toward the third-class coaches. Tunney signed his name to a dozen slips of paper and sent them to the youngsters, who carried the into London's teeming mass and as the most prized contributions to their holiday. Gene was worried that there is no "closed season" on autograph hunting in Europe and was advised that the best solution of the problem is to adopt the method that Bobby Jones, the earlier, used in England when he carried bundles of signed paper which he distributed to the autograph enthusiasts. By this means Jones spared himself the necessity of writing in autograph books which are thrust under the noses of notables here almost constantly.

TUNNEY LEAVES FOR IRELAND TO VISIT OLD HOME

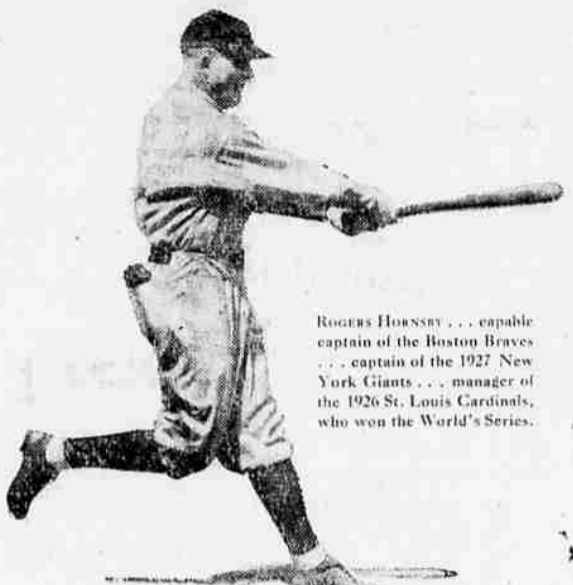
LONDON, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Gene Tunney left on the morning train for Dublin, White in Ireland he plans to visit the birthplace of his parents and attend the Tailcoat's games. He will return to London Sunday. Tunney slept soundly through his first night in England, though claiming himself tired after the champion retired soon after the dinner that he gave for a few friends last night, at which he showed himself as capable an actor as a fighter. The hotel chef had prepared a special dinner called "Lauder scuffle," in honor of Gene's fiancée, Miss Mary Josephine Lander of Greenwich, Conn. Tunney proceeded to eat the major portion of this concoction of eggs and raspberries, leaving the lady's share for his friends. He likewise did justice to a champagne cocktail.

RICHFIELD WINS AGAIN WITH GOEBEL. Richfield calendar, in the afternoon it was announced that Art Goebel, using Richfield "passion of power" in his Lockheed monoplane, "Yankee Doodle," had smashed the air record between Los Angeles and New York by making the distance in 18 hours and 56 minutes, non-stop time. Lou Myers, California race driver and winner at Indianapolis, with Richfield in his tank, won the 200-mile international speedstakes race at Alton, Pa., on Saturday. According to a telegram received by the press, other users of Richfield who made a good showing were: Ralph Hepburn won 100-mile race, average 127 1/2 miles per hour; Tom McMonough, second in the 200-mile classic. It is stated that Goebel, accompanied by Harry Tucker, owner of the plane, took off from Minesfield with 450 gallons of the blue and gold Pacific-produced Richfield. Their average speed was 140 miles per hour.
