

### FARM LEADER NOW DENIES HE GAVE SMITH HIS OKEH

ST. PAUL, Minn., Aug. 22.—(AP)—J. F. Reed, president of the Minnesota Farm Bureau federation, denied today that he had endorsed Governor Alfred E. Smith, democratic presidential candidate, as he reported in a dispatch from Marysville, Minn., August 16.

He said that an Associated Press dispatch from Marysville relating to an address he made there "was incorrect in drawing a conclusion that I favored Smith as a greater hope for farm legislation than Herbert Hoover, the republican candidate, because I was not in the endorsing business."

Mr. Reed repeated a statement made at Marysville that he believed no candidate for the presidency can promote a principle not laid down in the national party platform.

"There is no question as to the merits of the two platforms on the farm question," he said. "The democratic platform gives a specific promise of a federal farm board which would have as much power over agriculture as the federal reserve board has over the banking system."

He refused to amplify the statement, but repeated that he has no intention of endorsing either presidential candidate and that his hearers "must draw their own conclusions."

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### COURT HOUSE AT LA GRANDE, ORE. IS BURNED UP

RAYFIELD, Wis., Aug. 22.—(AP)—President Coolidge arrived here by automobile today after a two-hour trip from Cedar Island, and embarked for a cruise along the Apostle Islands on the yacht Nelswood, owned by Frank H. Woods of Lincoln, Neb. Mr. Coolidge was accompanied by Mrs. Coolidge, his son John and other members of his party who have been with him since he arrived in Superior last June. A stiff wind was blowing, putting whitecaps on Chequamegon bay and Lake Superior.

If the water did not prove too rough it was planned to take the party to the northernmost island for lunch, then back to the largest of the group, Madeline island, for tea at the home of H. L. Gavy of Kansas City, whose estate adjoins that of Woods. They return to Cedar Island today.

BERG, Idaho, Aug. 22.—(AP)—The war department has taken a favorable attitude toward the construction of a railroad connecting north and south Idaho along the Snake river. It was indicated in a letter received at the state public utilities commission today.

Lieutenant Colonel Robert E. McIride of the general staff of the Ninth Corps area, has been assigned to attend a hearing August 27 at Lewiston to present testimony before interstate commerce commission examiners relative to the utility of the road for supplying military posts in Oregon, Washington, Montana and Utah.

The proposed railroad would extend from Homestead, Ore., to Lewiston, this connecting from transcontinental railroads. Representatives of the utility commission will leave Friday to appear at the hearing.

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### SEVEN CATHOLICS ARE ARRESTED FOR OREGON'S MURDER

MEDFORD CITY, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Seven women and five men, all Catholics, were under arrest today accused of having conspired to kill President Francisco Elias Calles as well as the late President-elect General Alvaro Obregon.

Mother Superior Concepcion Acobeda de la Lata, under custody since the slaying of General Obregon in July, is charged with having been the chief plotter. The police declared the conspirators planned to kill the two officials last April by poisoning them with a poisoned pin at a dance which they attended in the town of Celaya.

This plan, as well as a later plot to bomb a bridge near Celaya, over which Obregon and Calles were to pass, was abandoned as impracticable, it is alleged, but the conspirators continued their efforts and succeeded in slaying General Obregon.

The police attempts to arrest Enriquez Vidal, a 22-year old law student who is one of those arrested, the statement that he was invited to join the group, being promised entrance to heaven if he should become one of the "martyrs."

In a signed statement Chief of Police Antonio Rios Zertuche said that Enriquez and others among those under arrest made confessions. Enriquez, he declared, told of Mother Concepcion showing him pictures of young men executed for yellow activities and expressing her determination to organize another group of "martyrs."

The police statement says she told him the pope would canonize all those who died in behalf of the church, but believing himself timber for a saint, Enriquez, the statement says, declined to join the group.

The police statement says the plot was set at the house of Mother Concepcion. Senorita Maria Elena Manzano, now under arrest, is accused of having accepted a mission to go to Celaya, induce Obregon and Calles to dance with her and, while dancing, prick them with a poisoned pin. Mother Concepcion is charged with having furnished a bottle of poison for the purpose.

Jose Leon Toral, Obregon's assassin, and Manuel Teelo, who is alleged to have furnished Toral with the pistol that he used in slaying the president-elect, are declared to have been members of the "martyrs" group.

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### 'Ramona' Begins at Craterian Today

The much heralded "Ramona," from Helen Hunt Jackson's novel of the same name, has at last arrived in our midst at the city jail.

This afternoon at Hunt's Craterian it was the writer's privilege to witness this film story which brings Dolores Del Rio, that beautiful Mexican star of stars, to us in what may be classified as her greatest screen triumph.

"Ramona" was written by Helen Hunt Jackson with a purpose. She did not know at the time of writing the story, that it would go down in history as one of the great American epics.

And Edwin Carewe, the director of "Ramona," has given the story to the screen to such a manner as might be well termed "screen classic." This producer has added to the story—so vital a matter in a case of this sort. It was Carewe too, who directed "Resurrection."

"Ramona" is a tale of early California—the days of the Mission Indians—their trials and their tribulations. And "Ramona" came into being during that period. The story is filled with love interest. Mrs. Jackson, while probably not fully realizing it at the time, drew one of the most beautiful love stories in American literature when she penned this tale of the half-Indian maiden who is in love with two men, one of them the Indian, "Alessandro," played on the screen by Warner Baxter, the other, "Felipe," the Spanish Don, Roland Drew.

Others in the cast were equally good in their characterizations and included besides Baxter and Drew—Vera Lewis, Michael Visarof, Charles Amor, John T. Prince and Mathilde Comont.
