CARDINALS GET IN LEAD AGAIN WITHOUT PLAYING

Pittsburgh's lead in a doubleheader at Pittsburgh yesterday, and the only beneficiaries were the St. Louis Cardinals.

While John McGraw's New York Giants were breaking even in a dual bill with the Pittsburgh Pirates, the Cardinals without going near a ball park, returned to the lead in the National League pennant campaign which seems certain to make baseball history here.

The even break cost the Giants two precious percentage points, enough to give the Cardinals the lead by a fraction of one point. The standing today:

McGraw started out the day right at Pittsburgh when Larry Benton, aided and abetted by one John Scott, pitched the Giants to a 6 to 2 win in the first engagement. In the second, however, the Cardinals themselves afflicted with a pen-

nant mania, indicated a terrific hitting offensive that swept the New Yorkers into a dismal 13 to 3 defeat.

The Cincinnati Reds, taking two from the Brooklyn Dodgers, 2 to 0 and 6 to 1, posted over the little Cubs into third place and served notice that they are not yet to be counted out of the race. The Reds trail the leaders by only three and a-half games, and in turn they lead the Cubs by only half a game and the fifth place Pirates by two.

The Philadelphia Athletics, beating Cleveland 3 to 1, slipped up to fifth and a half game of the American League leaders, the New York Yankees. Lefty Grove was in his very best form for the A's, allowing eight scattered hits and fanning eight men.

In the second he fanned the side on nine pitched balls without as much as a foul intervening. He continued this string in the third by fanning Miller and then got two strikes and a foul on Lafayette before he threw a tall strike of the plate. He then fanned Lamford on the next pitch, giving him a string of five strikeouts on 17 pitched balls. The A's fanned six hits at a, putting moments off Miller to win. Grove's own victory string amounted to 19.

For the fourth straight day the Detroit Tigers downed the Boston Red Sox by one run, this time by 2 to 1. Owen Carroll, giving only six hits, chalked up his fourteenth victory of the season.

Fred Marberry held Chicago to five hits and the Washington Senators made it two out of three from the White Sox, 3 to 3, in 19 innings. Reeves' single scored Goose Goslin with the winning run.

YANKEES LET OUT COVELESKIE AND SIGN UP ZACHARY

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—(AP) The signing of Tom Zachary, veteran southpaw, by the New York Yankees, cost another veteran his job, Stanley Coveleskie, 37-year-old right hander, has been given his unconditional release by Miller Huggins.

"I intend to use Zachary as a starting pitcher," said Huggins. "He is a smart, clever southpaw who has had plenty of experience and is in excellent condition right now. Zachary is not through by any means. He is only 31 years old and I expect him to deliver for the Yankees not only this year but next. He may be just the pitcher needed by my ball club at this stage of the season."

Coveleskie was purchased as a free agent by the Yankees this spring after Washington had released him when he developed a sore arm. He never has been able to recover his best form.

MRS. HOOVER IS GIVEN OVATION BY OLD FRIENDS

CEDAR RAPIDS, Iowa, Aug. 24.—(AP) Iowa has welcomed and sped its favorite daughter, Lou Henry Hoover, with a parental blessing. Simply and maternally Waterloo took her to its heart once more last night, as a "very dear little girl" grown up.

More elaborately and officially, Cedar Rapids honored her today, as the republican candidate for first lady of the land.

"It's just splendid to find you haven't been forgotten," she said, after protesting that she simply didn't know how to speak, and adding: "In my case, at least, woman's place is most decidedly in the home."

"I have had such a very happy afternoon," she continued. "To use a word of the little girls of today, it has been a much more 'thrilling' experience than I could imagine, to come back and find all the home I knew completely down and even the school house all rebuilt, yet every now and then to see someone on the streets I knew, and to find one woman who actually looked younger than when I saw her last, 40 years ago."

This reference was to one who once lived with her two sisters on the other side of Fifth street from their playmate, Lou Henry.

"She was always a very bright and very dear little girl," said Miss Ruth Morrison, who was Mrs. Hoover's fourth grade teacher, back from Pasadena for the homecoming. "I canvassed for Hoover in California during the war and I was afraid of the dogs people had. But when I heard it was my little Lou Henry he had married, I was glad I had braved the dogs."

At both Waterloo and the luncheon of the daughters of the American Revolution here, some of Iowa's leading women were invited to honor "Lou Henry," among them Mrs. John Hammit, wife of the Iowa governor; Mrs. James W. Good, wife of the republican western campaign manager; Mrs. Hugh Clark and Miss Martha McClure, national committee women from Ohio and Iowa.

COOLIDGE GOES TRAP SHOOTING SPITE OF RAIN

SUPERIOR, Wis., Aug. 24.—(AP) Undismayed by a thin rain which by morning had soaked the countryside, President Coolidge went trap shooting again today.

What his sport was on this occasion was not divulged by his companions, who limited themselves to saying that Mr. Coolidge's aim had not deteriorated since the last time he practiced at the traps when he made 24 hits out of 25 shots.

Major General Charles P. Summerall, chief of staff, has been invited by President Coolidge to visit the Summer White House Saturday and stay over night. General Summerall's visit, coming so close upon the one which Admiral Charles Hughes, chief of naval operations, made here last week, created the impression among the president's associates that the chief executive desired to review extensively all problems connected with national defense.

Although unusual reserve was preserved after Admiral Hughes called, as to the purpose of his visit, reliable reports said that the Anglo-French understanding regarding limitation of auxiliary craft had been thrashed out.

Clayton Stump, national republican committeeman from Virginia, and former secretary to President Coolidge, has also been invited to visit Cedar Island lodge, presumably, it was said, to discuss politics.

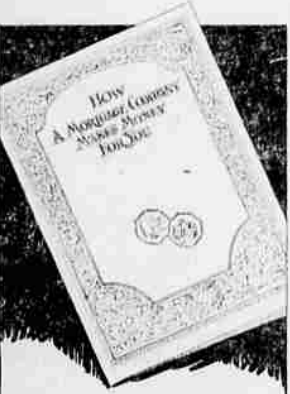
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BRENNAN'S WIDOW GIVEN NEW POST

CHICAGO, Aug. 24.—(AP) Mrs. George B. Brennan, widow of the former Illinois democratic national committeeman today accepted the post of regional vice-chairman of the party's presidential drive committee. She was suggested for the position yesterday by United States Senator Harry B. Hawes of Missouri, chairman of the central regional headquarters in St. Louis.

Meanwhile Illinois democrats have canvassed to determine who will become the Illinois committeeman and it is understood that an agreement has been reached.

The proposed national committeeman is a wealthy manufacturer, and a non-Catholic. The consideration of a protestant to succeed Mr. Brennan, a Catholic, in the party councils, the local and state committeeman believes, will aid in offsetting any consideration of the religious prejudice which might be injected into the presidential campaign.

PLANE AGAIN USED FROM OCEAN LINER TO SPEED UP MAIL

PARIS, France, Aug. 24.—(AP) The amphibian plane carried by the French liner Ile de France today made the first successful ship-to-shore flight on this side of the Atlantic, bringing mail to Le Bourget field. The machine was catapulted from the steamer's deck when the vessel was about 100 miles west of the Selly Isles.

The plane touched Cherbourg after a flight of five and one-half hours. Additional fuel was taken aboard there and the trip to Le Bourget field outside of Paris was completed in another two and one-half hours.

Despite the necessity of halting for gas at Cherbourg, and poor flying conditions at sea, the machine netted a gain of 20 hours in mail service.

MISSING FISHERMEN, NEIGHBORS OF LOCAL PEOPLE, FEARED DEAD

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Aug. 24.—(AP)—Search for Captain Peter Olson and Carl Miller, fishermen missing since August 12, has been unavailing. The coast guard has made a vain hunt up and down the coast in the vicinity of the spot near Reedsport, where their fishing boat "Crackbox" was found on the beach. Many believe that the bodies were carried north of the Umpqua river by a strong current along the coast.

Findings of some old bones near Reedsport caused an unfounded report to circulate that the bodies of the men had been found.

Captain Olson and Carl Miller are neighbors and close friends of Mr. and Mrs. Close of Medford, who have a summer place north of Reedsport on Sillocks lake.

ENGINEER KILLED ST. PAUL WRECK

ST. PAUL, Minn., Aug. 24.—(AP) Engineer William Richardson, of St. Paul, was killed and seven passengers slightly injured when Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis and Omaha, eastbound passenger train No. 542 was derailed at Stillwater Junction this morning.

None of the passengers injured needed hospital attention.

Six coaches of the train left the rails, but remained in an upright position.

Officials of the road were investigating the cause of the derailment.
