SELECT LEAST COSTLY PUMPER FOR FIRE DEPT.

Following considerable discussion in regard to the merits of a 1000-gallon pumper against a 600-gallon pumper, the fire and finance committees last night at a special meeting reached the decision of recommending to the city council the purchase of the latter, an American La France machine, at a cost of \$8700, which is approximately \$800 cheaper than the other. The matter of purchasing the new equipment will be put up to the voters of Medford at the November election.

The new pumper, if purchased, will be kept mainly for use in the residential district and the present 1200-gallon Stutz pumper will be reserved for use in the business section. The smaller machine was considered ideal by the fire committee for local use inasmuch as the larger machine is too heavy and cumbersome to answer residential calls. Water mains, which are only four inches in the residential districts, are said to be better suited to the smaller machine, as they would be unable to furnish enough water for the Stutz.

WANT HOMES FOR 54 CHILDREN

"It is better from every point of view to protect children than to punish criminals. We're looking for homes for 54 Oregon children," said Mrs. Bailey, field representative of the boys and girls aid society of Oregon, now at the Hotel Medford, today.

"Thirty-five of these children are boys, ranging in age from 3 1/2 to 16 years, fine little fellows, all of them. For those under seven years we expect adoption. For the older ones we are glad to find homes where they can have the care and affection that all children need and a chance to develop into good, self-supporting citizens.

"Girls? Surely we have girls, but there are always so many more homes open for girls than for boys that today I'm making a special plea for the boys."

REGISTRATION AT HIGH SCHOOL STARTS AUG. 31

Registration of both high and junior high school pupils will open this year at 9 a. m., August 31st. This early registration will be for all pupils who did not register at the close of last year, also, pupils who did some make-up work in the summer school, and especially those pupils who have never previously attended the Medford schools.

More individual attention and consideration is being given to each pupil in the proper selection of subjects than ever before. With the growth of the high school and junior high school in size, there has been, according to Superintendent Hedrick, "an increasing tendency for the work of those institutions to become a little more impersonal in nature because of the numbers present. Personal contact and acquaintance between instructors and students, a vital thing in education unimpairedly lessens and becomes a little more remote as a school takes on larger proportions.

"To meet this condition the Medford high and junior high schools have adopted, beginning this year, a modified form of the student counselor plan which is used in many of the larger city high schools. Two or more counselors, a man and a woman instructor, are assigned to each class for boys and girls respectively. Each counselor has a group of students, 50 or less, assigned to him or her as personal charges. It is the counselor's duty to become thoroughly acquainted with each boy or girl in the group, to know the student's problems and difficulties and assist them in selecting the proper school subjects.

"First year students particularly will find the counselor system a great help in becoming acquainted and making the proper adjustments. The counselors, who are appointed from the list of teachers on the basis of individual fitness are not bosses, or disciplinarians, they are acquaintances, advisers, and helpers. The government and regulation of both the schools will center on the principals as it always has.

"Along with this more detailed personal record is to be kept of all students from the time they enter the school until they graduate, as an aid to the counselor's work.

A complete list of instructors will be issued from the school office the last of the week.

BERRYDALE WILL BE GIVEN CITY WATER

Berrydale, that growing settlement of homes north of Medford along the Pacific highway, will have a water system as soon as preliminary details, which are in the hands of F. C. Dillard, city water engineer, and John Carlin, city attorney, are completed. The city water board as well as the city council have approved selling a supply of city water to the Berrydale consumers.

The problem of financing the new system is the main question now confronting the people of that section, inasmuch as several soft-of pipe will have to be laid, entailing an approximate cost of \$25,000. Attention for a supply of Medford water has been before the Berrydale residents for some time due to the large increase of population there during the past several years.
