Novotny Stages Heroic Struggle After Poor Start—Oregonian's Lead Cut By Wildfire Play—Poor Putt Spells Disaster.

The last three holes in a row he was down at the fourth, but he led to two up at the ninth. His birdie at the 11th left him one down, but he then lost three more straight to be four down and dropped the last two holes of the round to be six down.
