## LAZZERI, STAR OF YANKEE INFIELD OUT FOR SEASON

NEW YORK, Aug. 27. — (AP) — More gnashing of teeth in the camp of the New York Yankees! Tony Lazzeri, hard-hitting, agile fielding second baseman of the champion, may play no more baseball this season.

Tony suffered a muscle injury in his shoulder during the Yapeke's last disastrous invasion of the west and has been in only a few games since. Every time he plays the strain is aggravated and it begins to look like Miller Huggins will have to depend upon Leo Durocher at second base for the balance of the season.

With the Philadelphia Athletics only three games behind, Lazzeri's absence from the lineup of the champions is serious. Not only is Tony's hitting and fielding skill missed, but Mark Koenig, at shortstop, teams better with Lazzeri than with any other second baseman Huggins can use.

Huggins is authority for the statement that Lazzeri may not play again this year.

"I don't think Tony will be able to play again for the rest of the season," said the "mike" manager. "I gave him a trial to see how his arm acted. It's no good. He can't throw and he's trying to get rid of the ball before it comes to him. Every time he uses his arm he only aggravates it. I think he has torn a muscle in his shoulder. It's not serious but it might be if he kept on playing. Rest is the only cure for it."

## GIANTS TO PLAY WEAK TEAMS, AS 3 RIVALS CLASH

Barker, Associated Press Sports Writer) With the National league's fifth inter-sectional series virtually over, the four western contenders now can begin cutting each other's throats, while the New York Giants, wrathful over their recent beatings at Cincinnati and Pittsburgh, seek to visit their vengeance on the more or less helpless east.

It is no secret that John McGraw hopes to win the pennant just by these means. While the Reds, Pirates, Cardinals and Cubs are having it out west of the Alleghenies, McGraw hopes to get the Giants into first place, a strategic spot from which to view the third and final western invasion of the east, beginning September 14.

In theory this is a good scheme. But John didn't start out very well yesterday. The Giants were outgamed by the Brooklyn Robins, 4 to 3. Del Bissonette picking the 10th inning as the spot for his 20th home run of the season.

The St. Louis Cardinals, themselves buffeted around in recent weeks, again trimmed the helpless Phillies, 6 to 1, and lengthened their league lead to 3 1/2 games over the Giants and Chicago Cubs.

With Jim Bottomley back in the lineup, the Cards gave Wee Willie Sherdel excellent support and battered three Phil pitchers for 13 hits. Sherdel chalked up his 16th victory of the year.

The Cubs defeated the Boston Braves, 6 to 3, for the fourth straight time and moved to a tie with the Giants in games won and lost, although they are no better than third in percentage. This apparent contradiction lies in the fact that the Cubs have played more games and lost more than the Giants. With Kiki Cuyler and Woody English leading the offensive, the Cubs battered Kent Greenfield for 13 hits, while Hal Carlson was holding the Braves to five.

Finding their hold on fourth place rather insecure, the Cincinnati Reds downed Pittsburgh, 4 to 3 and thus put two full games between themselves and the 1927 pennant winners.

Braxton was the whole show as Washington defeated Cleveland, 7 to 1 in the only American league engagement. The Senators' left hander, one of the few consistent pitchers Bucky Harris has now, allowed only five hits and struck out seven men.
