### ROTARIANS TOLD OF POA BULBOSA NOON LUNCHEON

Blue grass, scientifically termed Poa Bulbosa, one of the recently developed and profitable products of the Rogue river valley, was the chief topic for discussion at today's Rotary luncheon at the Hotel Medford.

Through the efforts of the Rotary club, particularly Charles Hoover, grower of the winter blue grass, and the Chamber of Commerce, sample sacks of the seed have been distributed in practically all parts of North America with the result that Medford has received a great deal of valuable publicity.

Several letters sent to the Chamber of Commerce after the luncheon for introducing the grass in widespread areas were read by Charles Hoover and R. G. Fowler. Especially interesting was one communication from Argentina written in Spanish and stating that the seed would be turned over to an agricultural college for investigation.

For more than 20 years Poa Bulbosa has been a popular grass for all-year uses in some parts of Australia, according to a letter from Adelaide's Rotary club after the sample from Medford had been received.

Ed Baker, of the Chamber of Commerce, stated that the campaign conducted last year had brought more inquiries to the headquarters than any other single Rogue river product ever advertised through the organization. During the year articles concerning the blue grass have appeared in agricultural magazines throughout several countries through the efforts of Mr. Fowler.

Six Rotarians were selected by Hoover to compete in a Mother Goose rhyme contest which resulted in a tie between Howard Schoffel and Carl Swigart. After three attempts, with a different ditty each time, Mr. Swigart was awarded the prize, a small book of kids' stories.

A letter from Billy Lyman, old-time member of the Medford Rotary club, written somewhere in Alaska where he is touring accompanied by Mrs. Lyman, was read by Secretary Ed Shockley.

Tickets for the Boy Scout jamboree and circus which will be staged at the city armory Friday night, August 31, beginning at 8 o'clock, were issued at the meeting. Approximately 200 boys from various troops will take part in the affair.
