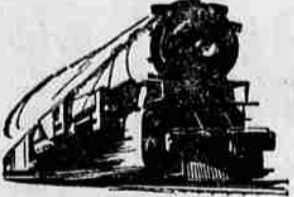

A HUGE MAJORITY FOR JOHNSON IN CALIFORNIA VOTE

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 28.—(AP) Senator Hiram Johnson will be the republican nominee and Minor Moore, a Los Angeles attorney, will be the democratic nominee for the seat in the United States senate at the general elections in November. At the California primary election yesterday, Senator Johnson received a tremendous majority over his republican opponent, Charles H. Randall, a former representative in congress, of Los Angeles. Senator Johnson's majority was more than six to one. The vote from 5237 of the state's 5082 precincts gave: Johnson, 236,136; Randall, 41,927. Moore was unopposed for the democratic nomination. In the 5237 precincts he received 27,172 votes.

Wiley J. Phillips of Los Angeles, prohibition party candidate, had received 525 votes. Randall had received 312 on the prohibition ticket, and Lena Morrow Lewis of San Francisco was not opposed for the socialist senatorial nomination. The vote throughout the state was light, due to lack of interest on the part of the electors. The registration was more than 2,000,000, but less than 50 per cent of the voters cast their ballots. Registration in San Francisco totaled 229,000, but less than 30 per cent voted.

Senator Johnson's success was attributed to his endorsement by the republican state committee, support from Governor C. C. Young, and his efforts at Washington in behalf of the Boulder Canyon dam bill and a bridge across San Francisco bay. "I look forward in our state to a really united republican party in the coming campaign, which will mean an overwhelming republican victory in November," said Senator Johnson when the growing majority made it apparent he had been nominated.

Besides the senatorial contests there were five races for representatives in congress, while six representatives were unopposed. Interest centered on the race made by Cecilia C. Casserly of San Mateo, in the eighth congressional district, against Representative Arthur M. Free, republican, of San Jose. Free apparently had won the republican nomination, as 433 of the 739 precincts gave him 21,933 votes to Mrs. Casserly's 5219. Mrs. Casserly, a delegate to the recent Houston democratic convention, had received 4488 democratic votes to Free's 3378 democratic ballots.

UPSTATE FARMER IS ABDUCTED AND HIS HOME FIRED CATHOLIC CHURCH ASKS CURTAILING OF CROP REPORTS

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 28.—(AP)—Tied with baling wire by his hands and feet to a fence, and in an unconscious condition, Martin Mikkelson, farmer, living alone two miles from Sandy, was found this morning when neighbors rushed to his burning home. Mikkelson was lashed to the fence, 300 feet from the flaming house, which was completely destroyed. He was attired only in his underclothing and beside him was an empty liquor bottle. He said two men had dragged him from the house and forced him to swallow the contents of the bottle. He did not know the men, who dragged him from his bed and tied him to the fence. Neighbors who found the man, said his wrists had been bound together by baling wire, and his feet and both his wrists and feet had been lashed to the fence. Mikkelson was taken to an Oregon City hospital where he was reluctant to discuss the affair. Other than to declare he did not know two men who abducted him, Mikkelson appeared surly when questioned. Officers expected to question him later today. A month ago Mikkelson's barn was burned and the fire was declared incendiary. Mikkelson, at that time, said some one set it on fire, while he was asleep.

ST. CLOUD, Minn., Aug. 28.—(AP)—Abolishing crop forecasts on the ground that they are, on the whole, a detriment to the farmer is urged by the Catholic central Verein of America in a record adopted last night. The Verein, went on to conclude that such forecasts are of little help to the farmer and harm him because of their effect on the market. In a session devoted to resolutions, the organization condemned use of the injunction in labor disputes, said enforced idleness of workers was unfair to them and urged the federal government to give attention to the welfare of the American Indian. Devoting considerable attention to the welfare of the agricultural industry, the Verein urged members to cooperate with all agencies such as experimental stations seeking to help the farmer.

HAITI NEEDS AID AS PEOPLE STARVE IN STORM'S PATH RUSSIA FAILS TO WAX ENTHUSIASTIC OVER PEACE PACT

MOSCOW, Aug. 28.—(AP)—The Russian press shows very little enthusiasm over the Kellogg-Briand renunciation of war treaty, both Izvestia and Pravda, leading official papers, being decidedly cold in their editorial comment. Meanwhile the soviet government intends to make a careful study of all documents relating to the pact before making any decision as to whether it will accept the invitation to adhere to it, extended through the French government. Pravda says that while a great part of the bourgeois press abroad is praising the "universality of the pact it is simultaneously glaring in its hands over the fact that the pact does not oblige anybody to do anything." Izvestia says that as long as nations keep arming, the pact cannot be anything but a dead letter. The Russian position, it adds, is that full and lasting peace can only come after complete universal disarmament.

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 28.—(AP)—Early consolidation of all relief for disabled veterans under one head was urged by Brigadier General Frank T. Hines, director of the veterans' bureau, in an address before the 29th annual encampment of the veterans of foreign wars here today. Brigadier General Hines said such action would be the most constructive step which could be taken to further the cause of veterans at this time. Consolidation under one head would provide a greater degree of benefits to a larger number of veterans and would eliminate unnecessary duplication, he said. "The veterans' bureau is at present maintaining 48 hospitals and 54 regional offices for the benefit of veterans of all wars, he said. EL PASO, Texas, Aug. 28.—(AP)—Troops today attacked a group of robbers who attempted the oil town of Las Narajah in the State of Vera Cruz Sunday night, says Mexico City dispatches to El Continental. Offices of El Aguilar company were entered and \$30,000 taken.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 28.—(AP)—Under guard in a hospital here, where he was taken Sunday following an airplane crash, James E. Nolan has been arrested on a telegraphic warrant from Los Angeles, charging grand theft. Bail was fixed at \$5,000. The warrant was served yesterday. Nolan, who is said by police to have admitted his identity, was seriously injured when a plane in which he was learning to fly crashed in an orchard. The plane was piloted by Jimmy Rinehart, young Portland aviator. Rinehart was badly hurt.

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 28.—(AP)—The Union Tobacco Company of New York, recently warned by State Corporation Commissioner McCallister not to violate the Oregon blue sky law, has replied that it will comply strictly with the statute. The company has been engaged in the practice of giving coupons with cigarette purchases. Other tobacco companies complained.

PRESIDENT HOOKS A GRAYLING UPON MOONLIGHT TRIP

SUPERIOR, Wis., Aug. 28.—(AP)—Out till late last night on the river and with only a bright moon to guide his way, President Coolidge achieved his greatest ambition of the summer by catching one of the Montana graylings which had been let out into the stream purposely to see if his angling skills were up to the level of hooking what are commonly considered the hardest fish to bait. With two secret service operatives and George Habb, veteran Brule guide and his dry fishing instructor, as witnesses, the chief executive managed to fulfill his most earnest angling wish just in time before August 31 when the fishing season on the open river will close. The graylings were originally brought to the Cedar Island lodge fish hatcheries two years ago to see if they could live and reproduce in these waters. About a month ago fifty grown specimens of the fish were let out in the river to test Mr. Coolidge's fishing skill. He was told of what had been done and since then he has been exercising himself to catch one of them. Reports from the lodge said that with the end of the season so close at hand and with no success in prospect, President Coolidge had until last night almost given up hope of realizing his purpose. The grayling caught was about ten inches in length, and was a typical example of the species, having a long fin on his back and being trimmer in shape than a trout. The merits of graylings, from a fisherman's point of view, lie in the fact that they have very small and tender mouths and are very game when actually hooked. Mr. Coolidge gave instructions when he came home last night to prepare the grayling for his breakfast today.

VALE, Ore., Aug. 28.—(AP)—J. M. Wallace, 70, will appear in court here tomorrow for hearing in connection with an indictment charging him with the killing of Robert Gray, 19, who was shot to death, while taking watermelons from the Wallace farm. Young Gray was killed by a shot from a revolver. A coroner's jury found Wallace guilty of the shooting, and he was indicted by the grand jury yesterday in this connection.
