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ANTI-WAR TREATY WINS NEW LANDS; PARIS IS JOYFUL

PARIS, Aug. 29.—(AP)—The effect of the signing of the Kellogg-Briand war renunciation treaty was apparent today. Nations in various parts of the world had announced their desire to become parties to the pact.

The official signatures were still wet when telegrams and cables of adherence by other countries began to pour into Paris. The governments of Denmark, Jugoslavia, Roumania and Peru are among those having expressed this wish.

The compact now is open to adherence by all civilized nations. An official invitation to join in the pledge has been handed by the French ambassador to Maxim Litvinoff, Russian Soviet commissar for foreign affairs, at Moscow.

It is expected that at least a year will elapse before the treaty has been finally ratified by the original signatory countries whose legislatures must pass on it. Congratulations still were being received by M. Briand today while Parisians in general, including the not inconsiderable element of population furnished by American and other tourists, celebrated the event with appropriate calm and decorum.

The boulevards and the sidewalk tables of the cafes were crowded until a late hour last night with people discussing the great occasion. Even habitual cynics were impressed and there was a feeling in the air that humanity has taken a stride toward peace. Extremists made a few more efforts during the night to belittle and mock the pact, but they hardly succeeded in doing more than afford amusement to the populace. Several taxicab loads of this element demonstrated down the Champs Elysees but the police confiscated the cabs and locked up the occupants.

Premier Briand was host to about 100 guests, including the treaty signers, at a dinner served in the immense foreign office dining room last night. The dinner was followed by a reception for which 2,000 invitations had been issued.

50 PASTORS, BORN DEMOCRATS DECIDE TO BACK HOOVER

SPokane, Wash., Aug. 29.—(AP) Fifty Methodist Episcopal South pastors, born democrats and life-long supporters of that party, have recently signed an open letter to Governor Alfred E. Smith 100 per cent and all will vote for Herbert Hoover for the presidency but will vote the remainder of the ticket democratic.

This information came from Rev. John H. Dilts, superintendent of the Nez Percés Indian mission at Lapwai, Ida., who arrived here today following his attendance at a Methodist conference at Milton, Ore., which closed last Saturday that the pastors decided to oppose the democratic presidential nominee. No religious question was involved, Rev. Mr. Dilts said, the night. It was at the conference pastors declaring they would have given whole-hearted support to Senator Walsh of Montana, a Catholic, if he had been nominated by the democrats.

"We want it distinctly understood that the religious question did not enter into the matter," the pastor declared. "We also want it distinctly understood that we are opposed to Tammany Hall democracy and that there is not a single one of us who has changed from a democrat to a republican. We would vote democratic if Smith were dry."

FAMILY PERISHES IN NIGHT BLAZE

TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 29.—(AP) Three persons lost their lives in a fire in their home early today and two were so badly injured that little hope is held out for their recovery. The dead are Joseph Klaiman, his wife, Sarah, and his son, Sidney, aged 3. Siedle, 14, and Morris, 8, two other children are in a critical condition while Henry, 6, escaped with less serious injuries.

The Klaiman family lived on the third floor of a building in which the fire started in the store on the ground floor. The bodies of Mr. and Mrs. Klaiman and their young son were found in a room at the front while the other children were taken from a room at the rear.

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CATHOLIC BISHOP DENIES ANY PART IN MEXICO PLOTS

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Emphatic denial that Catholic prelates or priests had anything to do with the assassination of General Obregon has been made by Monsignor Miguel Maria de la Mora, bishop of San Luis Potosi.

He said that no more than twelve Catholic priests had participated in military movements against the government and they had done so entirely of their own initiative. Most of these priests went with the rebels as chaplains and did not carry arms. He added that no archbishop, bishop or priest has with the sanction of the church sustained the rebel movement in any form.

He reiterated his belief that Mother Superior Concepcion Acobedo de la Lanza, who is under arrest charged with complicity in the assassination of Obregon, is "hysterical" and has an abnormal brain. Monsignor de la Mora is one of two Catholic archbishops and eleven bishops who have sought concealment in the country.

Of the 400 Mexican Catholic priests who were in the country at the time the religious controversy broke out only about 40 per cent remain.

He estimates that between fifty and one hundred Catholic priests have been killed in Mexico during the last two years. None had a trial and all were executed summarily, he said, since last May seven priests have been put to death.

He declared that the pope two years ago gave strict instructions to the episcopate and priests in Mexico not to mix in politics. "We have obeyed," he said, "and still are obeying those instructions."

REPUBLICAN AID TO FARMS RECITED IN CURTIS TALK

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Aug. 29.—(AP) Republican efforts on behalf of agriculture in the party's seven years of post-war administration were detailed today by Senator Curtis, the republican vice presidential nominee, and compared with the position of democrats in congress, particularly on the tariff.

Speaking at the invitation of the American Farm Bureau to a New York state fair assemblage, the Kansas senator confined his prepared remarks principally to the agricultural situation. He cited the passage of the emergency tariff act, the extension of farm credit through the intermediate farm credit act of 1923 and through the War Finance corporation, and the enactment of legislation authorizing organization of cooperative associations, as among the accomplishments of the republican administration.

The nominee also praised the Kellogg treaty for the renunciation of war which was signed yesterday in Paris, predicting its general approval in this country and adherence to it by every nation in the world. As republican leader of the senate, Senator Curtis will be called upon next session to ask formal ratification of the pact.

CENTRALIZE WORK CATHOLIC VEREINS

ST. CLOUD, Minn., Aug. 29.—(AP) Plans for centralizing efforts of the Catholic Central Verein of America in matters of national legislation were made at the annual convention here today.

The convention voted to place the central bureau of the Verein at St. Louis in charge of the work, with presidents of state organizations or their representatives as members of a legislative committee which will meet at national conventions.

Voting for officers of the Verein is in progress today, with William Elmer of New Ulm and Frank Sankel of Salem, Ore., as candidates for president.

MINNEAPOLIS, Aug. 29.—(AP) Action of Bert Martin, national secretary of the farmer-labor party, in endorsing the candidacy of Herbert Hoover for the presidency, is a personal one and "in no way carries with it the approval of the farmer-labor party or of its national committee," Joseph A. Peirce, national chairman, declared today.

Peirce said that the secretary had asked the executive committee of the party to endorse either Mr. Hoover or Governor A. Smith for president, but that the committee had disapproved the plan and reversed Mr. Martin for submitting it.

He added the "national executive committee will declare its partnership vacant and proceed to fill the vacancy."

HEFIN ACTUALLY MAKES A LOGICAL, SANE STATEMENT

LAPAYETTE, Ala., Aug. 29.—(AP)—Senator J. Thomas Heflin, at home today for a brief rest, took occasion to issue a statement dealing with party "bolting" in reference to the recent Philadelphia address of John J. Raskob, in which the democratic chairman told "publicans that they can step down for Smith for president without changing their politics or losing their identity as republicans."

"John J. Raskob, New York republican and present chairman of the democratic national committee, is telling republicans they can step over and vote for Smith for president without changing their politics or losing their identity with the republican party," Heflin said. "Last week he appealed to republicans at Philadelphia to do that. He organized a 'Smith for President Citizens' Committee' and in addressing the republicans present he said: 'I think there are a great many republicans who are willing to give up their party affiliations. This is the class of citizens among whom the new committee here will work.'"

Heflin continued that Raskob "has completely committed himself to the position that it is right and proper for the voter of one party to cast his or her vote for the head of the ticket of another party without giving up party principles or party affiliations."

Tragedy of Woods EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 29.—(AP) Stanley Darnewood, 35, was killed yesterday afternoon while working in the W. A. Woodard Lumber company camp on the Coast fork. The top of a tree, snapped off by a high line, struck Darnewood. The sun was shining in his eyes and fellow workmen said he could not see the falling tree. Death was instantaneous. He is survived by his parents, a widow and two sisters, all residents of Cottage Grove.
