PLANE OWNED BY LINDBERGH FALLS; 2 FLYERS PERISH

NEW YORK, Aug. 30.—(AP)—The mangled bodies of M. M. Merrill and Edwin M. Tomne, missing commercial flyers, were found 80 feet from their wrecked plane at daybreak today, according to word received by F. H. Russell, one of the Curtiss flying service.

Their plane—a Curtiss Falcon, owned by Colonel Charles Lindbergh—crashed and exploded in the wilderness six miles from the Pennsylvania town of Milford.

The wreck was sighted by fellow flyers yesterday after the greatest airplane search ever known in the United States. There was no place for a plane to make a landing near the spot, so some of the searchers flew to Milford, while others made their way to Port Jervis, N. Y., where foot parties were organized.

Starting before daybreak, a party led by Charles "Casey" Jones, veteran commercial pilot and associate of Merrill, reached the wreck at 6:30 a. m. An airplane piloted by Raymond L. Kitcherman of the Curtiss Flying service, flying overhead, guided them to the place.

Kitcherman in his report said the bodies were found 80 feet from the wreck. They were not burned, he said.

The plane was a total wreck and had evidently crashed into the trees at a terrific speed and was dashed to bits.

A Fairchild pilot, who flew over the scene, reported the ground and trees for several feet around the wreck had been burned, indicating that the plane had caught fire after crashing.

The spot is inaccessible except by foot and the bodies will be packed out today, Mr. Russell said. Tomne's body will be shipped to Buffalo, where he was manager of the municipal airport. Merrill's body will be brought to New York by train.

FUNERAL RITES FOR DAKOTA GOVERNOR

BISMARCK, N. D., Aug. 30.—(AP)—Funeral services were held here today for Governor A. C. Sorlie.

Private services were held at the executive mansion with members of the family, close friends and state officials in attendance, followed by public services in the house chamber of the capitol. A special train will carry the body to Grand Forks tomorrow for interment.

MILFORD, Pa., Aug. 30.—(AP)—The bodies of M. M. Merrill and Edwin M. Tomne were found today by Arthur McCarthy, according to a telephone call from Pond Eddy. They were said to have been mangled by the plane crash.

The bodies were located about six miles from Milford in the heart of an almost impenetrable forest. McCarthy said that the gasoline tank of the plane which the two men were flying from Buffalo to New York apparently had exploded.

McCarthy was one of several scores of men who had been combing the woods since the wreckage was sighted from an airplane yesterday evening.

CHICAGO TAXIMAN TAKEN FOR RIDE

CHICAGO, Aug. 30.—(AP)—They took Tony Soverino, a taxi driver, for a ride in his own cab last night.

Police passing a lonely spot on Twenty-fifth avenue saw Tony's cab parked on the wrong side of the street. The meter was still ticking. It read "\$10.50." Soverino was slumped over the wheel. Two bullets had been fired into the back of his head.

Near the cab, in the road, police found five empty .28 calibre cartridges. In a pocket of the dead man's coat was a slip of paper on which was written: "Call for Shorty, 122 South California avenue, apartment one."

Soverino said he believed a woman was in the cab and that Soverino had been shot from behind as, unwittingly, he "put himself on the spot" for his own assassination.

Soverino was 22 years old.

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CHINESE PROTEST SHIPPING FOSSILS TO THIS COUNTRY

PEKING, China, Aug. 30.—(AP)—An attempt to prevent Roy Chapman Andrews from taking out of China the 85 crates of fossils which he brought back from the Gobi desert has been made by the Chinese historical preservation commission.

This body has been joined in its protest by the Peking political commission.

The historical commission telegraphed to the nationalist government at Nanking urging that curbs of the character unearthed by the Andrews expedition should remain in China.

The political commission, in backing up the historical body, made the claim that Mr. Andrews had expired for all deposits as well as for fossils.

If the protests are upheld at Nanking, the American museum of natural history in New York will miss having in its collection fossil remains of what the explorers declare was the largest beast known to science.

In describing the finding of this particular remnant of other days, members of the expedition said they could not bring out all of the relics of the animal because of their size. They plan, therefore, to return to the desert next year. Among other relics left in the clay bed where the giant fossil was discovered, was a pelvis-bone which was said to be as large as a base-drum.

The expedition personnel is now in Shanghai classifying the material which was transportable and preparing it for shipment to the United States.

ALBANIANS SHOUT 'WE WANT A KING'

TIIRANA, Albania, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Five thousand Albanians, parading the streets of the capital last night shouted "We want a king! Long live Zogu!"

The procession proceeded to the Italian legation where it acclaimed Premier Mussolini of Italy.

Foreign Minister, Elias Rihai, has assured the diplomatic corps that the monarch will prove a factor of stability and peace.

Reports that the diplomatic corps would leave Tirana when President Achmed Zogu is proclaimed king were denied by Minister of Justice H. Rihai. He declared the change to a monarchy is to be effected with due respect to the constitution.

The proclamation making Zogu king is expected to be published Saturday. Members of the diplomatic corps have been invited to attend parliament on that day.

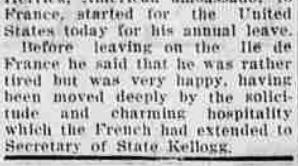
