RUSSIA TO JOIN ANTI-WAR PACT

Soviet Sees Chance for Universal Disarmament—Ireland Fetes Secy. Kellogg at State Banquet, By Notables—Sails Monday.

MOSCOW, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Soviet Russia has consented to adhere to the Kellogg-Briand renunciation of war pact.

Acting Foreign Commissar Litvinov today handed to the French ambassador the answer of the soviet government to the invitation extended through France that soviet Russia adhere to the pact.

The note says that while the pact is vague and without provisions for disarming yet, "it does impose certain obligations upon the countries before the bar of public opinion and simultaneously gives the soviet union a new possibility of submitting to the signatory nations questions of the greatest importance to the cause of peace—that of disarmament—which is the one and only guarantee against war."

DUBLIN, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Citizens of Dublin are making the stay of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Kellogg here a memorable one; the American secretary of state and party probably will remain in Dublin until Monday, going then to the cruiser Detroit to Cherbourg to take the Levathan for New York.

The state banquet held in Mr. Kellogg's honor at Theseldurne hotel last night was the most remarkable gathering of its kind since the Free State was established. The attendance included every man high in the country's service who was present in Dublin. All were presented to the secretary and he had a friendly word for each.

Among the guests was the singer, John McCormack.

Nearly 3,000 guests participated in the reception and ball at the Plaza, Dublin's largest hall, which followed the banquet.

Enthusiastic crowds have greeted the visiting statesman every time he has appeared in public since his arrival.

President Cosgrave himself issued the invitations to the banquet, which was attended by leaders of every party in the Dail, with the exception of Eamonn De Valera, who is in Berlin. An invitation was sent to the latter's chief lieutenant, Sean Lemass.

Mr. Kellogg was cheered at the banquet and praised by President Cosgrave for his services to peace.

The secretary disclaimed credit for the war renunciation treaty. "I did not do it," he said. "I could not have done it. That treaty is an expression of the hopes of millions of people in the world. I cannot believe but that it will have profound moral effect. It springs from the people whose voice is more listened to today than at any other time in the world's history."

Giving the greetings of President Coolidge, the secretary said: "He wishes you and all the Irish people the greatest happiness, prosperity and progress in your wonderful civilization."

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The Noted Dead

SHANGHAI, Aug. 31.—(AP) Warren Manley of San Francisco, secretary of the Shanghai American chamber of commerce, died today of pneumonia.

Mr. Manley came to Shanghai in 1919 and established an import and export business. He formerly was in business in San Francisco. He became secretary of the chamber of commerce in 1925. He was prominent in Masonic circles. The funeral will be on Sept. 2.

NEW AND MODERN CONGER MORTUARY OPENS TOMORROW

Saturday, the public is invited by H. W. Conger to visit his new funeral parlors at the corner of Main and Newtown streets. The mortuary will be open for the informal reception of visitors and Mr. Conger and assistant, J. A. Walker, will explain the various modern facilities embodied in the establishment.

The new funeral parlors represent the realization of many years planning and the gaining of much experience by the owner. H. W. Conger has been a resident of Jackson county more or less continuously since 1895 when he settled in Talent with his parents. In 1920 he purchased the undertaking department of the Weeks and Ore furniture store and up to the present time has conducted the business in the L. O. O. F. building.

The most salient features of the new undertaking establishment are the preservation of privacy for the bereaved and the facilities for handling either a large or comparatively small number of mourners with the dignity and respect called for.

The lower floor is given over to the office, reception room, commodious chapel, music room, private family room with private entrance, slumber room, preparation room or morgue, with entrance to each of the rooms so arranged as to make for privacy.

The upper floor will mainly be used as private living quarters for Mr. and Mrs. Conger, although a large casket display room and workshop, connected by elevator with the lower floor, is also situated on the second floor.

The furnishings of the funeral parlor follow a blue and gold motif throughout, the carpets, draperies and furniture conforming to the general color scheme. Some idea of the scale on which the establishment is finished may be gained from the fact that the carpets on the first floor represent an investment of over \$1500. The entire lower floor is of concrete and with the heavy carpets the rooms are rendered entirely noiseless so far as the passage of persons from one room to another is concerned.

The mortuary is situated on a corner lot, 100 by 103 feet, with driveway arranged as to provide efficiently for hearse and mourners' cars. A comprehensive plan for lawns and shrubbery is being carried out and when time has been permitted, the exterior appearance of the place will be most attractive.

According to Mr. Conger, who is the coroner for Jackson county, his new establishment is built in conformity to the most modern practice and is the only building in the county erected for the purpose of housing an undertaking parlor.
