## BOY SCOUTS ALL SET FOR JAMBOREE AT ARMORY, 7.30

The stage is set and the actors are ready for the Boy Scout jamboree at the Medford Armory tonight, beginning at 8 o'clock, with at least 200 boys participating in a varied and interesting program.

More than a thousand tickets for the event have already been issued and it was announced yesterday by Scout Executive W. L. Bricker that those who have not received tickets and desire to attend the show, will be welcome.

All members of the various service clubs of the city have been given tickets during the past week and the show was made possible through their cooperation in promoting and advertising.

This will be the first scout jamboree ever to be held in Medford, but it is the aim of the committee in charge to make it an annual affair.

Final practice and dress rehearsal by all local troops was held last night at the Armory, with reports that the stunts and special features are going to be spectacular and exciting.

Music during the two-hour program tonight will be furnished by the Medford Elks' band and the 62-piece Junior boys' drum and bugle corps.

The Cottage Grove Boy Scout band, which had agreed to be present, will not be able to make the trip.

A complete program for the jamboree is as follows: Prelude: Pre-jamboree exhibit. Exhibit of model airplane, merit badge work by various troops, display of handicraft, bridge construction, photography and collections of insects, woods, flowers and other articles.

Act 1. Contests and scouting novelties; grand march by troops in opening parade; chopping contest, model airplane flying contest, wall scaling, original troop stunts; first aid, fire lighting contest, human scout signal tower contest.

Act 2. Pageant of scouting. This pageant will introduce tenderfoot investiture, court of honor for the month including the awarding of Eagle scout badges to several boys.

Act 3. Cling numbers; novelty surprises and a campfire scene in which all of the scouts will participate.

Members of the Medford committee in charge of plans for the jamboree are: Chairman, Rev. Carman E. Mell, Don Newbury, R. L. Cornwell and William Lee Beiler, all of whom are Crater Lake council officials.
