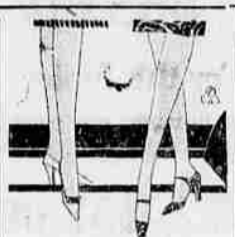

GAINES HANGED; 'I'M INNOCENT' HIS LAST WORD

Seattle Father, Convicted of Slaying Daughter, Declares Enemies Will Suffer—Brother Weeps As Doomed Man Laughs.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Aug. 31.—(AP) Wallace C. Gaines was hanged today at the state penitentiary here for the murder of his 22-year-old daughter Sylvia in Seattle two years ago.

His last words were: "Get it over with as quick as possible."

The trap was sprung at 4:07 a. m. he was pronounced dead seven minutes later.

Frank Novak, Seattle public evangelist who was elected with Gaines for nine hours before his death said that he would make a statement as soon as he recovered from the ordeal.

The evangelist later said Gaines' last words to him were: "I'm innocent of this crime."

Novak said he told Gaines, who was an ardent believer in a hereafter, that if he was guilty, he would have no peace until he confessed.

Gaines, who had steadfastly maintained his innocence, walked unaided to his death.

Gaines stoically accepted his fate and showed little emotion through his two years of imprisonment. He was most affected, perhaps three weeks ago, when Emmett Bailey, his erstwhile cellmate, was led to the gallows.

In a final statement made public through his wife, Gaines again reiterated his innocence, concluding with:

"I do not forgive the friends who are the cause of taking an innocent man's life, and know that they will be made to suffer for the unjust punishment they have inflicted upon my family. They will pay dearly for this outrage on earth and in the hereafter, for their sins will find them out."

Gaines was convicted Aug. 19, 1926, after a sensational two weeks trial of the brutal slaying of his daughter Sylvia, June 16 of that year. Subsequent appeals to the state supreme court and the United States supreme court and at the last minute, to the governor, proved futile.

Steadfastly fighting against the hangman's noose and protesting his innocence to the last, were Gaines' second wife and his brother, William A. Gaines, former King county commissioner, who appointed the prosecutor who obtained Gaines' conviction.

Gaines' brother made an eleventh hour attempt to have the execution stayed when he appeared for a writ of habeas corpus in the United States district court of Spokane yesterday on the grounds that the conviction was the work of his political enemies.

Telegrams late last night to Governor Hartley in Seattle from both Mrs. Gaines and the former commissioner were still waiting to be delivered when the condemned man walked to his death. The telegraph company was unable to locate the executive who had refused to make any comment on the many petitions submitted to him asking for clemency.

William was on the verge of hysteria after saying goodbye to his brother. Mrs. Gaines was in tears, while the doomed man was cheerful and laughed as he told them of a visit of two priests.

The body was taken in charge by local undertakers and probably will be sent to Seattle tomorrow.

"Gaines declared he was innocent up to the last moment," Novak said. "He maintained he was not guilty of the crime. Most of the night he spent praying. He confessed to me, upon my earnest request, a few minor sins having no bearing on the crime of which he was accused."

Later Novak said, Gaines had told him "I am sorry I was drinking that night," but in the same breath denied that the crime was his.

From the prison Novak went to a hotel room here, where William Gaines, brother, and Mrs. Elizabeth Lewis Gaines, wife of the dead man, were waiting.

During the previous night, Mrs. Gaines appeared composed. When told it was rumored her husband had made a confession, Mrs. Gaines merely smiled and said the rumors were ridiculous, as her husband had no confession to make. She affirmed her belief in him to the last.

As the hour of execution struck, Mrs. Gaines said "It's near the time, isn't it?" She wept bitterly when told that it was all over.

William Gaines on the other hand, was much distracted, pacing the floor in an almost hysterical manner. He was prevailed upon to calm down, however, but often put his hand up to his neck as though the rope were about his throat.

INSTRUCTIONS TO REALTORS PLAN PARENTS ISSUED FOR SCHOOL DATA AT COUNTY FAIR

Preparatory to the opening of the public schools next Tuesday Superintendent of Schools E. H. All the teachers of the public schools will meet tomorrow at 1:30 p. m. with Superintendent Hedrick for instructions pertaining to Tuesday opening, and after this meeting the teachers will assemble with the principals of the various buildings to discuss further details.

He passed over the Portland field yesterday afternoon, without a dozen people at the field and this stopping in order to avoid a possible crowd there. When he had a dozen when he took off for San Francisco, there were less than a dozen.

Members of the board went on record to the effect that they would cooperate in trying to dispose of the city's irrigated land, a total of several hundred acres of which has not been sold.

Otis Mays, newly elected president, presided for the first time today.

Discussion of the Jackson county fair which will be held September 12, 13, 14 and 15 took up most of the time at the weekly luncheon meeting of Medford real estate dealers today at the Hotel Medford.

A committee composed of Carl Tengwald, Walter Leverette and Ed White was appointed by the president to take charge of the booth at the grounds for the display of products of the valley and the distribution of literature concerning the industries of this vicinity. It was reported that the realty board's booth at the last county fair attracted much favorable comment and resulted in valuable advertising.
