ASHLAND

ASHLAND, Sept. 1.—Forty thousand dollars, to be administered as a trust fund, the income to be used to assist needy students of Ashland and vicinity, was left by the will of Ben F. Evans, a retired stockman, who died Tuesday evening at his home on Ohio street.

Nothing was known of the bequest until Thursday morning, when announcement was made by Wm. M. Briggs, attorney, who was legal adviser of Mr. Evans.

By the terms of the will, the fund will be administered by the cashiers of the three banks of the city and by their successors, who may handle the income of the fund according to their discretion. The trustees will determine who seem most deserving and will aid in any way they see fit.

Mr. Evans retired from business about 19 years ago and took up his home on Ohio street, where he has lived very quietly. He has been in poor health for more than a year and had the misfortune to fracture both arms within the last few months. Mr. Evans was an expert penman and spent much of his time writing cards and doing other work of that nature.

Through the school superintendent, George A. Briscoe, the board of education opens the high school for adult students until the enrollment reaches the capacity of the school. Several adult students, past school age, were admitted last year, particularly to the commercial classes, and it is the desire of the board to assist in every way those who may have been interrupted in finishing their high school course or who may desire training in commercial lines.

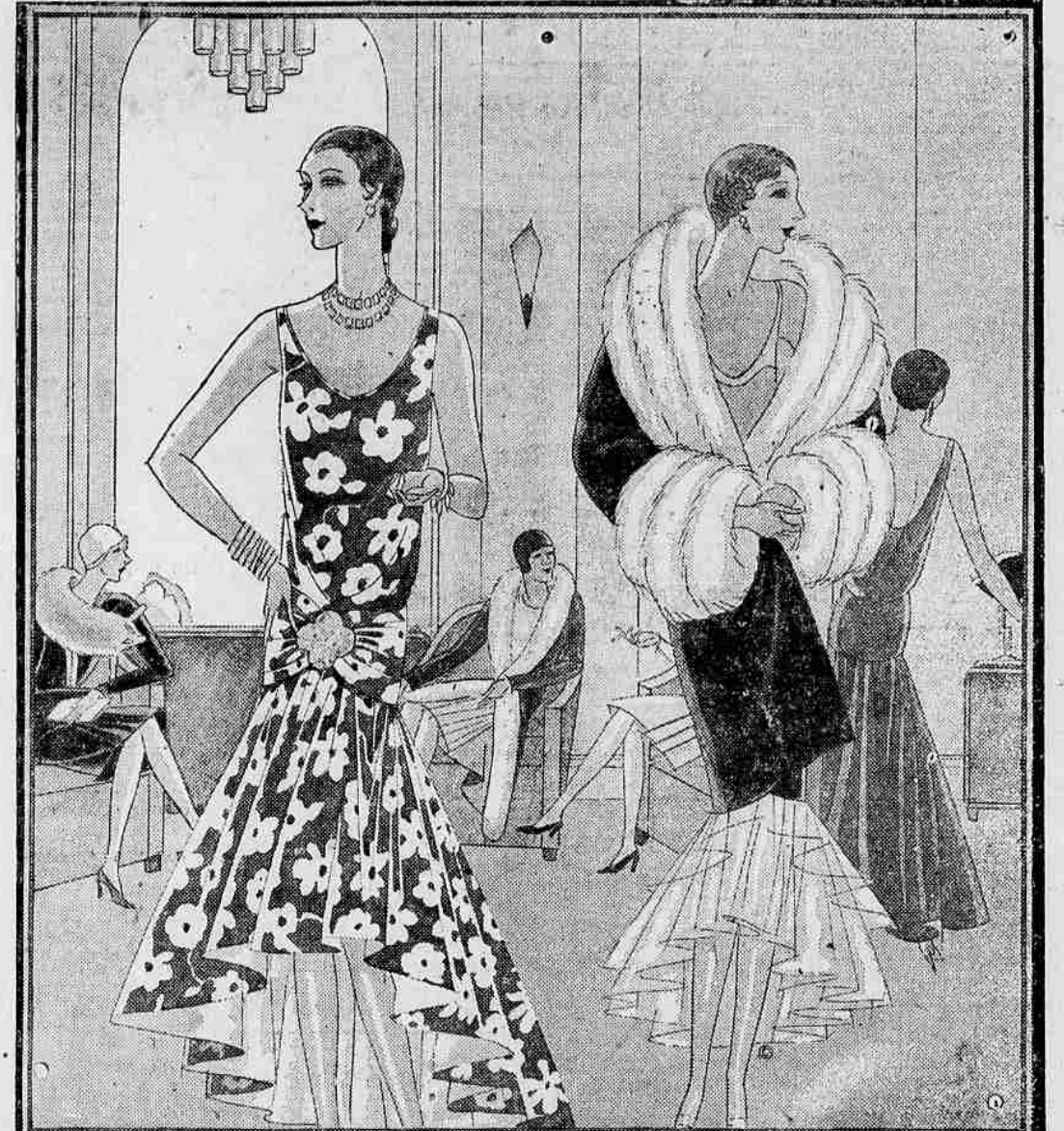
