The Poetess of Eden Precinct Has Her Song "The Way of Faith" Published



It was in 1888 that Mrs. Mary O. Carey took to reporting neighborhood news for the Jacksonville Democrat Times, a weekly publication edited by Charles Nickell, at Jacksonville, Ore.

Not that Mrs. Carey ever applied for the position. She and her husband were regular subscribers for the paper and a time came when they could not pay the eight dollar bill when the editor called around for the money. It was then that Mr. Nickell suggested that she take up reporting. And she did. For ten years after that she collected the Eden Precinct items and took them to the newspaper office, her only pay being the paper received each week.

In those days Mrs. Carey was just past 20 years of age. Her hair was blonde and it was bobbed. "No, people didn't criticize me for my short hair, and I have never, in all my life, and that's been more than 60 years, worn long hair," she declared proudly in telling a Mail Tribune reporter about the prevailing mode in dress at that time.

The day of the interview Mrs. Carey was dressed in a tight fitting dress and wore a hat with a huge bow across the front. She is fond of jewelry and wears a generous display on most all occasions.

"I'd rather write on my portable typewriter than do anything else I know of," Mrs. Carey remarked and added that she did dislike doing housework. She is perhaps one of the best known older residents of her vicinity as she gets around to attend most of the "affairs" and always keeps in touch with practically every one in the valley.

Mrs. Carey claims to be the "oldest" regular newspaper correspondent now living in this side of Portland, as she puts it, is an energetic person with re-

been sold within the past ten days, she reported yesterday.

Constantly for the past 40 years this veteran reporter has been on the job for first one newspaper and then another in this county. She is at present the correspondent from the Eden Precinct for the Mail Tribune.

The other day she brought a copy of one of her poetic efforts, a song called "The Way of Faith" to the Mail Tribune office with the explanation that she had written many others but had always been too timid to send them to the publishers. A few of her shorter poems have, however, at various times appeared in local papers and small magazines. Over 300 copies of her latest hymn have

been sold within the past ten days, she reported yesterday.

The story of Mrs. Carey's life is evidently an interesting one and she expects sometime to have it written in story form, she confided to the reporter.

When she was eleven years old she lost her parents and was brought to Oregon from California by her step-father who left her on a small farm near Talent with a pioneer family by the name of Helms. She received very little "schooling."

When she was 17 years of age she married Clinton Carey. The couple now reside south of Phoenix where her husband raises some of the choicest vegetables in that locality.
