

Sports YANKS BLANKED AND LEAD CLIPPED CARDS DOWN REDS

By Herbert W. Barker Associated Press Sports Writer Everyone's taking turns kicking the poor old New York Yankees, while they're down, but the St. Louis Cardinals are tougher meat for pursuing clubs in the National league.

While Connie Mack and some of his Philadelphia hirelings sat in the stands and grinned all over their faces, the Yankees were blanked at Washington yesterday, 2 to 0, and left the field with their lead over the Athletics sliced to measure exactly a game and a half.

The Detroit Tigers dropped to a full game back of the Senators in the battle for fourth place, when they bowed to Sam Gray and the St. Louis Browns, 5 to 4. It was Gray's 26th triumph of the year.

Alphonse Thomas finally got tired of losing big games, so he held the Cleveland Indians to seven scattered hits and pitched the Chicago-White Sox to a 3 to 1 decision that put the Sox only two percentage points back of the Indians, who hold sixth place in the standings.

"Sunny Jim" Bottomley's bat was the thorn in Pete Donohue's side as the Cardinals continued their winning streak at Cincinnati. Jim socked a triple, double and single, drove in three runs and scored one himself.

Frankhouse held the Reds to six hits in eight innings, but had to retire, after stopping Dressen's drive with his pitching hand. Sylvester Johnson finished.

The Chicago Cubs held fast to their position four and a half games back of the leaders, by turning back Pittsburgh, 3 to 2. Kiki Cuyler, traded to the Cubs by the Pirates during this winter, got a homer and a single that figured prominently in his old team's defeat.

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TEX RANKIN, PORTLAND'S RACING FLIER, LAUGHS AT HOODOOS
