

LA FOLLETTE AIDE LOSES WISCONSIN GOVERNOR'S RACE

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Sept. 5.—(AP)—A business man was chosen as the republican nominee for governor of Wisconsin, when Walter J. Kohler, a conservative, seeking office for the first time, defeated three other candidates, including Governor Fred R. Zimmerman, and Representative Joseph D. Beck, progressive backed by Senator Robert M. La Follette.

The vote in 252 precincts out of 2760 was:

Beck, 84,481; Berds, 2227; Kohler, 88,537; Zimmerman, 69,999.

Although returns were incomplete Kohler had rolled up such a big lead that his victory over Beck, his closest opponent, was assured as returns from yesterday's primary continued to come in.

Senator Robert M. La Follette, who was the baby of the United States senate when elected three years ago to fill the seat vacated by his father, who died in 1925, was renominated with a big majority. "Young Bob" was given almost a 2-1 majority over Governor W. Mead, conservative republican, whose showing was regarded as remarkable in view of his playing a lone hand and entering the race only four weeks before the primary.

The vote in 2223 precincts out of 2760 was:

La Follette, 250,064; Mead, 129,450.

While Senator La Follette suffered a reversal in directing the political fortunes of the progressives through the defeat of Beck, the other state officers and most of the congressmen whom he supported were successful in the primary.

DETROIT, Sept. 5.—(AP)—Governor Fred W. Green, republican, was renominated at yesterday's state-wide primary by a majority

that this morning reached more than 157,000 and promised to run close to 200,000 when the complete vote has been tabulated. In returns from 1927 out of the state's 3184 precincts, the governor had 260,552 against 12,962 for George W. Welsh, former lieutenant governor. The figures included representative returns from Wayne county (Detroit), where contrary to Welsh claims the governor also led. William A. Comstock, unopposed democratic nominee for governor, polled 2304 votes.

HATCHERY HEAD OF STATE CRITICISED

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 5.—(AP)—Matt Ryckman, state superintendent of fish hatcheries, came in for criticism at a meeting of the Salem Rod and Gun club last night. It was declared that the Santiam river is silted by the state in the distribution of baby trout. In 1927 it was claimed, the Santiam received only 350,000 trout while the McKenzie and the Clackamas received about 2,300,000 each. The club blamed to some extent its own fish committee.

Death Toll of the Automobile

OREGON CITY, Ore., Sept. 5.—(AP)—M. Yoder, 82, pioneer farmer, died here last night from injuries received a few hours earlier when a buggy in which he was riding on a downtown street, was struck by a delivery truck driven by Lazien Schmidt. The truck struck a rear wheel of the buggy, turning it over and pitching Yoder over his head. He suffered a fractured skull.

OREGON OFFICERS GIVEN \$8318 EACH FOR NABBING 'FOX'

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Sept. 5.—(AP)—Former Chief of Police, Tom Gurdane and Traffic Officer Buck Lloaillon of Pendleton were yesterday awarded 60 percent of the \$27,288 reward collected by a radio broadcasting station for the capture of William Edward Hickman, slayer of little Marion Parker. Division of the reward was made yesterday by the award committee headed by Mayor George Oger. Under its provision the two Pendleton officers will receive \$16,675 or \$8337.50 each.

They previously had received a \$5000 reward given by a Los Angeles newspaper.

Ten percent, or approximately \$2728, was awarded to George V. Willoughby, Seattle haberdasher, who received in payment for clothing one of the \$29 bills of the Parker ransom money, and then gave the police the information which turned the man hunt to the Northwest.

Ten percent to Fred King, operator of a gasoline service station at Portland, Ore., who sold Hickman gasoline and who gave the police information as to the road taken out of that city by the fugitive.

Five percent, or \$1365, to Roy W. McHugh, garage owner of Kent, Wash.

Five percent to be divided between James T. Nelson Jr., and Irwin A. Mowrey, who were given a ride by Hickman on the slayer's flight north and who notified the Portland police of their identification of the hunted man.

Three percent jointly to H. H. Antles, G. W. Marshall and W. H. Rapaport, Los Angeles First National bank employees, who informed the police of their suspicions that Hickman, a discharged employee, might have been the Parker girl's slayer. It was through their

information that the Kansas City record of Hickman was obtained. Four per cent to Howard L. Barlow, Los Angeles police department fingerprint expert, who identified fingerprints left by Hickman in his abandoned automobile.

One per cent, or \$277 each to Miss Ina Branson, telephone office clerk, through whom Hickman sent one of his telegrams to the slain girl's father, Frank R. Peck, owner of the automobile which Hickman stole and drove north, and who identified the youth; C. N. Shirley, Los Angeles police officer, who found the parking station in which Hickman left his car after delivering his victim's body to her father and collecting the ransom.

Before making the award, the radio station, KFMR, on advice of its attorneys, obtained releases from the many claimants in order that they would abide by the committee's ruling and thereby avoid litigation.

This move has been responsible largely for the delay. Hickman's capture having occurred about eight months ago.

FAMED SCOUT OF OLD WEST DEAD

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Sept. 5.—(AP)—John Silverman, 57, native of Alsace-Lorraine, who shipped to the United States in 1880 and became an adventurer in the west with Kit Carson and Buffalo Bill Cody, died here last night.

Known as "French John" he left the southwest for North Dakota, where he scouted in the Black Hills with Buffalo Bill. Later he scouted to keep the Overland trail clear with Kit Carson.

After years of this life he came to Nashville, married and settled down to live until 1925, when he had the chance for further adventure. He joined the Second Tennessee regiment as cook and served in the Philippines.

As scout in the west Silverman credited himself with having killed thirty Indians.

WANDERERS DIE IN WRECKAGE OF DERAILED TRAIN

MAUSTON, Wis., Sept. 5.—(AP)—Wreckage of nine freight cars that piled up with terrific impact on the Milwaukee road 12 miles east of here early today repelled the onslaught of rescuers fighting to release victims believed beneath its heavy weight.

The battered body of one youthful "rider of the rods" has been taken from the debris and lies unidentified here. Ten other maimed "passengers," known only as itinerant workers, were brought to hospitals here. Physicians said several would not live.

Several forms have been glimpsed by rescue crews. Trapped when a loosened truck derailed one car and eight others shot into the growing pile that now blocks the right of way, these men lie under tons of wreckage. Hope was slight that any would be brought out alive.

The wreck occurred yesterday at Lyndon, a small station. Its inaccessible position delayed the rescue work. A wrecking crew from Milwaukee arrived late last night. The injured were brought here as rapidly as they were released.

POLITICAL PARSON EGG BOMBARDED

FLORENCE, Ala., Sept. 5.—(AP)—Rev. George W. Wilbourne of Little Rock, Ark., finished an anti-Smith speech at the county courthouse here last night amid a bombardment of eggs thrown in through windows and doors.

The interruption, the speaker said today, came at the middle of his speech, but no direct hits were made and he was able to finish his address.

"I could see the eggs coming," said Rev. Wilbourne, "and saw that they were going to miss me, so I didn't move. The party throwing them must have been a ball player, for he was shooting curves at me and some of them came in pretty close."

SEC. KELLOGG ON WAY TO AMERICA

CHERBOURG, France, Sept. 5.—(AP)—With various governments still announcing adherence to the treaty renouncing war of which he was one of the chief negotiators, Secretary Kellogg was returning to America today aboard the Leviathan.

The cruiser Detroit which brought the secretary and his party from Ireland sped him on his way home with a salute of 18 guns while the band played the Star Spangled banner.

Mrs. Kellogg was presented with five large bunches of flowers by the Chamber of Commerce when the Detroit reached Cherbourg—to decorate their cabin on the voyage home.
