PIRATES DROP IN HOLLYWOOD TAKES PENNANT RACE AS 2 GAME EDGE IN CUBS STAGE RALLY COAST STANDINGS

It would seem to an unbiased observer that Jack Scott has been around baseball long enough to know that old "Cy" Williams is poison in his own back yard.

The Giants had rarely jumped Jimmy King and the Phils into somewhat ignominious defeat in the first game of a double-header, 4 to 1, and were leading, 7 to 6, in the second when Scott, reclining from Toledo, entered the box to pitch the ninth inning against the Indians. But Cy's counter-games was played and that may have killed Scott into a feeling of security. However, that may be, Jack served one down Cy's alley, and the old-timer clouted it over his favorite right field wall, scoring behind Klein and pulling the game out of the fire, 8 to 7.

Instead of gaining ground, the Giants really lost some, for the Chicago Cubs also put on a ninth inning rally at the expense of the Pittsburgh Pirates and advanced to within an eyelash of the second place Giants.

The figures in this mathematical tangle were: New York, 57.48 and Chicago, 57.16.

In baseball reckoning, the Cubs are a half game ahead of the Giants in the pennant race, but the advantage through the fact that they have played and lost fewer games than the Cubs.

Brooklyn took both ends of a double-header with the Boston Braves, 2 to 2, in 10 innings, and 5 to 2. Flowers' homer gave Danny Vance his 19th victory in the opener.

In the American league the Athletics came back strong after their double reverse on Labor day at Washington, and trounced the Senators, 5 to 2. Babe Ruth was touched for 10 hits but was supreme in the pitcher. The victory put the A's within two games of the New York Yankees.

The Chicago White Sox, taking their second double-header in as many days from Detroit, stepped into a fourth place tie with the Senators. The score in each game was 3 to 2. Hunsfield's single in the eleventh gave the Sox the first game and a ninth inning rally accounted for the tiebreaker.

The St. Louis Browns launched hits in three innings to down the Cleveland Indians, 5 to 4, for the third straight time.

Hollywood jumped to a two-game lead by defeating the Seals when the Seals fell before Oakland in the opener of this week's nine-game series. The Stars took an early lead and had scored all seven runs before the Seals got around to chasing in runners in the seventh and eighth. Three runs were made in the first. The Bells took the lead in the opening inning with four runs but the Angels came back in the second and took three runs, which were enough to take Bill Hughes from the box. 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COAST KID TEAM PLAYS WORCESTER FOR WORLD TITLE

CHICAGO, Sept. 5.—(AP)—Two kid baseball teams from the two coasts of the nation will be fighting for the boys' world championship, when Oakland, Cal., and Worcester, Mass., meet Friday in the first of a three-game series at Comiskey park. The two clubs are survivors of 8764 teams with a roster of 12,000 boys under 16 years of age that started play in the American Legion sand lot tournaments.

The Atlantic seaboard team is entering the final round with an impressive record of having won nine championships this season and losing only one game. Wilson Dunlap, Jr., a big curly haired kid, has carried the bulk of the mound work, turning in 21 victories in 22 starts, averaging 19 strikeouts to the name.

Even more impressive is the record of the Oakland Juniors, who have not lost in their campaign to the final round. In 16 games played, the Californians have scored 167 runs, while holding their opponents to four. Preliminary to the state championship, only one run had been scored against the westerners. The state championship finals saw three more championship games the opposing lines went scoreless.

One umpire each from the staff of the American and National leagues, will work the games, the second of which will be played Saturday. If the teams break even in the first two games, the deciding contest will be played on Monday.

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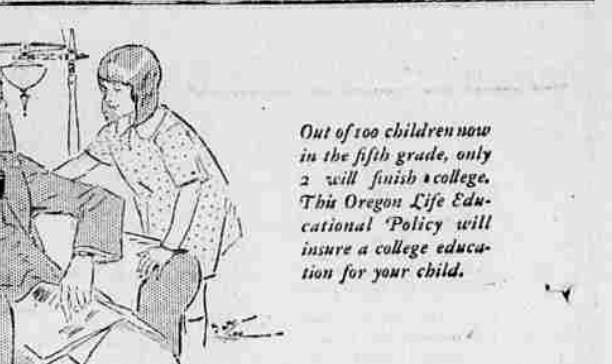
