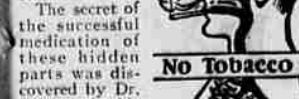

VALLEY HUNTERS PRAY FOR RAIN

The Medford and other valley deer hunters, who always go hunting during the first few days of the deer season are much disturbed over the news sent out from Salem yesterday that the state officials, because of the dangerous forest fire situation are contemplating the postponement of the opening of the deer hunting season unless there is a hard rain in the meantime to after the time that such a rain comes.

For this reason, and also because such a rain will make better deer hunting for the hunters are praying for rain within the next few days, so as to give them plenty of time to get located in the distant hills before Sept. 16th. Otherwise, if they go to the locations before that, and if the opening date is postponed, they will be unable to learn of it, and if caught hunting will be arrested.

Josephine county's thirteenth annual fair got into full swing today with the largest assortment of agricultural, horticultural, livestock and commercial exhibits ever exhibited in the county. Today was the second day of the fair, it having been opened officially yesterday.

Night Whippet and horse racing was held last night for the first time. The race track completed this year is fully illuminated for the half-mile course with hundreds of large electric lights.

A field of sixty race horses are competing in the events, and more than thirty dogs are here for the whippet races, the first ever seen in southern Oregon.

Miners of the county have erected a mining camp at which old and new methods of mining are demonstrated. The camp is known as "Sour Dough Gulch," with an old arrastra, hydraulic giant and other equipment in operation.

The fair will close Saturday night.

RABBIT BREEDERS TO MEET FRIDAY

The regular monthly meeting of the Southern Oregon Mutual Rabbit Breeders will be held on Friday evening, Sept. 7, at the Public Library in Medford. Matters connected with the rabbit exhibit at the Jackson county fair will be considered. A report on the latest developments in marketing rabbit meat and pelts will be presented. Sales and breeding stock are now in process, and breeders interested in all these matters are urged to be present. There is to be a meeting on Thursday evening, Sept. 13, at the Rabbit building at the fair grounds, at which time there will be very interesting talks, by Katherine Hayes, secretary of the state association, and by Judge Lewis J. Griffin, of Colorado Springs, Colo.

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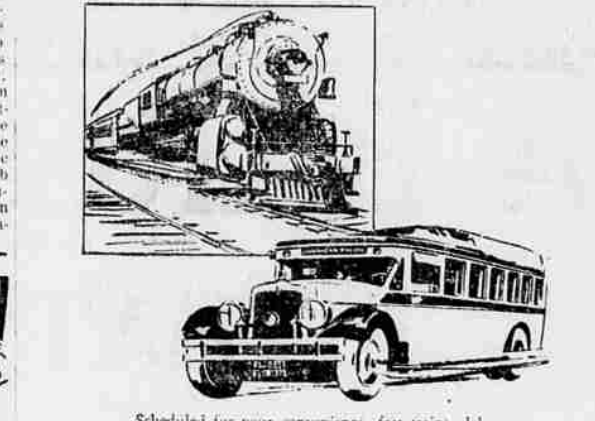
