

LANE MONUMENT WILL BE UNVEILED WYKOFF RANCH

TABLE ROCK, Sept. 6.—The Talde Rock school will open for the school year Monday morning, September 19, and it is hoped that all children expecting to attend will be on hand promptly at 9 o'clock for registration and assignments.

A large crew of workers are busy harvesting the tremendous crop of pears at the Modoc orchard, which is said to be the largest and choicest crop grown since the big orchard came into bearing.

Several men were engaged Wednesday in preparing a suitable setting for the General Lane monument which will be placed on the north end of the Wykoff ranch, where it will be unveiled September 25 with fitting ceremonies. This is supposed to mark the spot where the treaty was signed between General Lane and the Indians, although many old pioneers claim the place to be elsewhere.
