Stafford was named by republicans to oppose him.

At noon today the only congressional race in the republican party was the seventh district where Merlino Hill, a Black River Falls editor, conservative and former secretary of state, appeared to have a commanding lead over Assemblyman Gardner Whitrow, progressive.

ST. PAUL, Sept. 7.—(AP)—J. M. Reed, an avowed republican for 40 years, resigned today as president of the Minnesota Farm Bureau federation to campaign actively for Governor Smith for president.
