

MOTHER PLANS EUGENIC BABE TO BE ATHLETE

Father Is Cincinnati Business Man, Not Yet Appraised of It—Vaudeville Actress Tells of Unique Coming of the Stork.

CHICAGO, Sept. 7. — Miss Katie Pullman, 27-year-old vaudeville actress, talked today of her hopes and ambitions for the boy born to her August 28 at the Deaconess hospital, and which she calls her "eugenic baby."

"My great ambition is to make a great athlete of him," she said, "and I know just how I'm going to go about it. He'll be a vegetarian, for one thing, and I'm going to train him myself. His father is a tall man, and I'm sure the baby is going to grow to be strong and healthy."

Miss Pullman said she had not notified the child's father of the birth, and saw no reason for doing so. He is a Cincinnati business man, she said.

"There was no reason for telling him," said Miss Pullman. "It was agreed the child was to be entirely mine, mine to support and train as I see fit."

"I met the baby's father in Cincinnati about two years ago. We became good friends. Both of us submitted to physical tests, and we seemed well matched."

Miss Pullman is the mother of one son by her marriage to Edward Smith of Chicago, from years ago.

ESPEE VALUE TO STATE SHOWN IN LATE PAMPHLET

The importance of the Southern Pacific as an Oregon industry is illustrated in a small pamphlet received at the local offices, which states that a total of \$1,743,204.54 taxes for Jackson county in one year, the railroad company paid \$115,237.48. Statistics are also listed which show that the per cent in other counties is in most cases equally large.

Wages paid to the 6,290 employees of the Southern Pacific in this state during the year 1927 amounted to \$8,960,616. During an average year the company spends approximately \$3,000,000 in Oregon for supplies and materials, including rent, taxes and fuel.

In 1888, 40 years ago, Southern Pacific paid \$43,888 in taxes on its property in Oregon as compared with the present total of \$1,617,260.88. Forty years ago there were 474 miles of track in this state, while today there are more than 1,400 miles, according to the pamphlet.

Alighieri, has been violated and the poet's ashes stolen. Authorities acting on this clue have opened the tomb in an endeavor to prove the truth of falsity of the story.

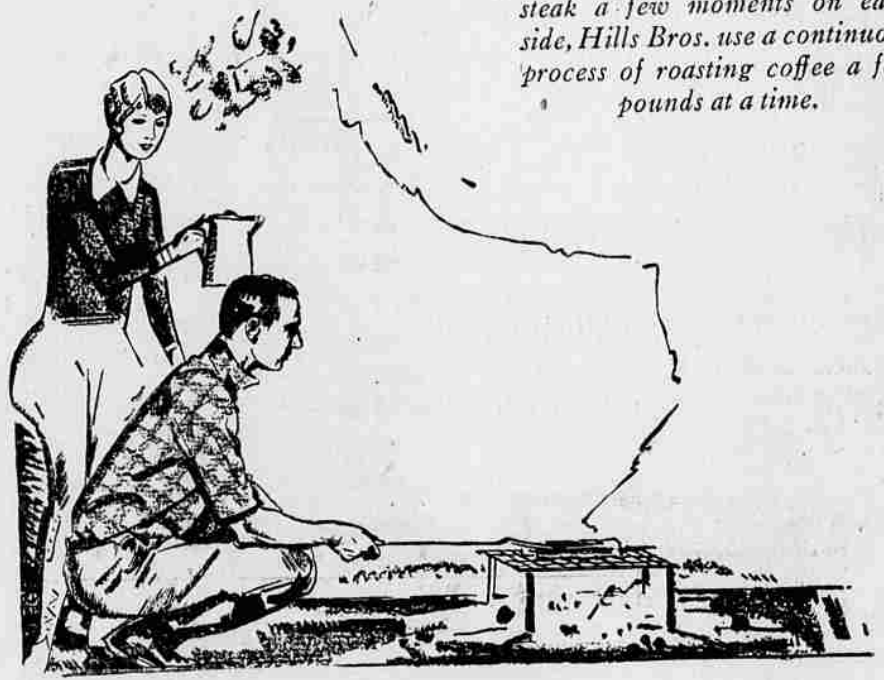
