TIME FOR PEACH, APRICOT SPRAY

Peaches, plums and apricots should be sprayed with Bordeaux mixture for the control of California peach blight fungus, within the near future. It is most desirable to have this application on before the first fall rain. This disease is quite prevalent in the county and does a great deal of damage to trees of the above mentioned fruits.

Apple trees affected with anthracnose should be sprayed with Bordeaux as soon as the crop has been harvested. The first fall rain will cause a spread of this disease, so if effective control is desired, application should be before the rains.

Bordeaux mixture 4-4-50 is the recommended spray for the above fungus disease and is made as follows: Dissolve 4 pounds of bluestone, shake 4 pounds of rock lime in separate containers, then add both to enough water to make up to 50 gallons of mixture. Keep agitation going until applied. Be thorough in spraying for best results.
