RABBIT BREEDERS MEET AND PLAN EXHIBIT AT FAIR

The big new rabbit building at the Jackson county fair will have all the hutches full when the plans, completed last evening at the meeting of the Southern Oregon Mutual Rabbit Breeders' association, are carried out. Every breeder present said he was planning to have his rabbits represented, and it is certain that there will be a representative set of exhibits from Jackson county. Breeders from Salem, Portland, and California, will also be represented by their exhibits, and this promises to be the best rabbit show ever put on at a Jackson county fair.

M. J. Swain, president, presided at the meeting, held at the public library, and Dick Hegner, secretary, filled his usual place. Reports showed that there is a moderate demand for Chinchilla breeding stock for shipment to eastern points, where the domestic rabbit business is taking on a rapid growth. It was agreed among those present that every breeder should for an active campaign to organize the wider use of rabbit meat among local housewives. An active advertising campaign along this line was urged by W. R. Gaylord, who has been giving much study and work to the development of a larger outlet for dressed rabbit meat, and reported that developments are going on in eastern cities which will lead to this.

Mr. Stevens, who bought the Crater Lake rabbitry last spring, was added to the membership list. There will be a special meeting next Thursday evening, September 13, at the rabbit house at the fair grounds, at which time there will be valuable addresses by Judges Griffin of Colorado Springs and Kallgren of Hayes of Portland.

Members were advised to hold their pet shipments for another month to get advantage of the fall prices. The next regular meeting will be held on Friday, October 5, at the public library in Medford.

AL NOW SCORED ONLY AS OPPONENT OF POWER TRUST

WAKE FOREST, N. C., Sept. 8.—(AP)—Doddie G. Brummitt, North Carolina attorney-general, asserted last night in an address here that much of the opposition to the presidential candidacy of Governor Smith is fostered by power interests.

"Before this campaign ends," he said, "the people of North Carolina are going to realize that a large part of the opposition to Smith is not because he is yet, not because he is a Catholic, not because of Tammany, but because of his opposition to the power trust of this country."

The speaker said that the Anti-Saloon league is dominated by the republican party. "The national Anti-Saloon league at least is an adjunct of the republican party," he declared. "There is only one man on the national board of directors who ever claimed to be a democrat, and that is the Rev. James A. Cannon, Jr., of Richmond, Va., who has now left us."
