HUMIDITY HIGH IN SOUTH PORTION

Better late than never, begins a letter dated June 19. Then the correspondent goes on to report on the humidity. She says that after I had sent instructions for the correction of the bed wetting habit.

I have gathered what seemed sound and practical ideas from many colleagues and fashioned a definite plan for parents or guardians to follow."

Any physician as well as any parent or guardian is welcome to my "schedule." But don't forget the R. A. E. even if you're the Queen of Sheba.
