Gates Open at 8 A. M.

Admission
Adults, 50c; children between the ages of 10 and 16 years, 25c; children under 10 years of age accompanied by parents or guardian free.

Season Tickets
Adults, \$2.50; children, \$1.50. All school children will be admitted free on Children's Day, Friday, September 14th, provided they are accompanied by parents or guardian. No tickets necessary.

Band Concerts
Every evening at seven-thirty bands will play on the grounds. Junior High School Harmonica Band will play, and the Junior Drum Corps will parade on Friday, September 14th, Children's day.

Horse Racing
There will be running races each afternoon by some of the fastest sprinters on the coast, including many horses from Tia Juana. Races by school children will be run on Friday and Saturday. Chariot and Roman races will be run each afternoon. There will also be trick riding and riding by professionals from Enterprise Oregon.

Dancing Pavilion
Dancing will be held every night at the Fair Grounds pavilion, which is equipped with one of the finest floors. The interior of the pavilion will be beautifully decorated and there will be many unique lighting effects. The famous Whit Barton's Orchestra will furnish the music. This musical organization has played over the entire Pacific coast, all accomplished musicians, each one playing several different instruments, and they will keep the dancers amused by their clever stunts. Dancing will begin at eight-fifteen each night.

Carnival
One of the largest Carnivals available has been secured, and will provide entertainment at all times during the fair.

Sickness and Accidents
The Jackson County Public Health Association will maintain headquarters in the new Educational building, where first aid will be administered by the county nurse to all cases of sickness and accidents. This service is free.

Lost and Found
Lost children will be directed to the Public Health headquarters in the Educational building, where they will be properly cared for. Articles found or lost should be left or reported to the secretary's office in entrance building.

Enter Exhibits
Exhibits must be in place by 6 o'clock Tuesday, September 11th, and in accordance with the rules as found in premium book. Judging will begin promptly at 2 o'clock Wednesday, September 12th, and delayed entries will not be judged.

Meats
Continuous service at the various eating places, especially good food, prices reasonable. All concessions will placard their prices to protect the public against over-charges.

Automobile Show
A new Automobile building has been built, and all dealers are coming in much stronger this year, with new models. This building will be specially lighted, and a very attractive display is assured. There will be an attendant at each booth, who will explain and answer questions that you may wish to ask.

Rabbit Building
One of the finest rabbit buildings in the United States has been completed. The rabbit show will have entries from California, Oregon and Washington.

Poultry Building
Extensive additions to the Poultry building have been made this year, and the building will be filled with entries.

Stock
The Stock buildings have been greatly increased, and enlarged. One new structure has been built. This department is one of the most active and creates, each year, much enthusiasm throughout the county, and the state.

Educational Building
The new Educational building is one of the finest in the state. It fills a long felt need. School exhibits which were prepared last spring, will take up the greater part of the building. Other units in this building are: the County Health Unit and Red Cross; Human Society; Home Economics; Club Work; Library and Forestry Display.

Horticulture Building
The different granges and communities are putting on exhibits that will fill the building. As an added attraction in this building, the Oregon State College is putting on an exhibit called "Truth in Meats," that will be very interesting.

BOX SEAT SALE FOR COUNTY FAIR TO BEGIN TUESDAY

Box seat tickets for the races and other entertainment features to be staged in front of the grandstand at the Jackson County Fair and Pear Show will be placed on sale at the Medford Chamber of Commerce next Tuesday.

Workers who have been employed in constructing new buildings and repairing the others for the exposition which opens Wednesday, September 12, have nearly completed their work and exhibits are beginning to arrive. Monday will be a busy day with grange and community club members, who this year will arrange the horticultural and agricultural displays.

Stock breeders are well pleased with the new quarters available for their animals and ribbon winners in all cases have been promised from the valley's best herds. Country and rabbits will be big features of the forthcoming fair, both in number and quality of the entries in these departments.

A profusion of exhibits of particular interest to women will be displayed in the Women's building, which has been re-arranged and enlarged for greater efficiency in the showing of art work.

Decorations in the Merchants' building have been refurbished and work of installing exhibits is already under way in the big pavilion which is always an attraction for fair visitors.

A horseshoe tournament has been planned for each day of the fair on the courts north of the Horticultural building. Interest is keen in this arrangement and it is expected that some real competition will be staged among the county's most expert shoe hurdlers. Entries may be made at the courts, by applying to Mr. Ginn, who will be in charge of the competition.

Track conditions are ideal and with the prospect of fair weather it is expected that some new records will be hung up in the running races which will be a part of each day's entertainment program.

Concession space has sold rapidly this year and the fair officials look upon this fact as an augury of big crowds as the concessionaires are generally approved judges of the possibilities for business.

The library and public health units have been moved from the Women's building to the new Educational building and new space has been provided for the art and flowers so the congested condition which existed two years ago have been relieved. Better and more artistic arrangements have been worked out for the displaying of exhibits, and all of these things help to make the Jackson county fair the best on the Pacific coast.

Committees are asked again to consider the letters which were sent out a month ago. Prizes are offered for floral exhibits and a general prize goes to the community doing the most for this building during the fair.

The Kerr Fruit Jar Co. is offering its usual generous prizes, and several flower magazines have offered special prizes.

Those who are entering flowers are asked to study the premium book and to enter flowers as listed. Also to see that old, half decayed flowers are cut from stems. Soiled leaves and broken stems as well as poorly arranged flowers all count against an exhibit.

Several communities have asked for special display space and at least one garden club and one professional grower from outside the county will display in the Floral dept.

Needle work, art and canning exhibits must be entered between eight a. m. and six p. m. on Tuesday.

Cooked foods and flowers are to be entered Wednesday morning before ten o'clock. The flowers and cakes will be judged Wednesday afternoon. Unless the exhibitor requests otherwise all foods will be sold and 50 per cent of the selling price goes to the exhibitor.

Auto Helps Philippines
MANILA (AP)—American automobiles are being given credit for development of the Philippine Islands because of their contributions to the cause of good roads, opening of sparsely settled areas with resulting creation of additional sources of wealth and the closer contact assured the island peoples. Average annual income of the population is only about \$24 per capita, but the islands have increased automobile imports from less than 250 in 1919 until nearly 20,000 now are registered.

2223 STUDENTS CITY SCHOOLS UP TO PRESENT

The second week of the public school sessions for this year, which began last Monday will be a short one because there will be no school session next Friday, as that is Children's day at the Jackson County fair.

While the enrollment in all the buildings was much increased last week over last year, there are many pupils, both in the high schools and grades who have not yet entered school, but it is known will enter by the end of the first month, and this leads the school officials to stick to their original estimate on attendance in the high schools when all the enrollment for the year is in of 790 for the high school and 450 for the junior high. Tomorrow and other days of this week is expected to see many more pupils enrolling in the high schools and grades who have not yet entered school for various reasons.

With the expected increased attendance tomorrow in the grade schools superintendent Hedrick and the various principals probably will make some transfers to relieve crowded rooms or classes.

Only one room yet is needed in the old First Methodist church building which the school board leased some time ago to relieve crowded conditions in the junior high school, but as soon as it is rendered necessary another overflow room, or more will be installed in that building. As to whether a second or more rooms there will be needed for a month yet is problematical at present.

The enrollment of the schools which started the first day of last week with 2110 pupils ended at the close of the school week last Friday afternoon with 2223 pupils. The largest increase in attendance over last year was in the senior high school, with 50 new students.

The enrollment figures of last week were as follows:
Senior high school, 625; Junior high school, 409; Roosevelt high, 450; Washington high, 325; Jackson, 292; Lincoln, 241.

The installation of the new roof on the Jackson School building will be completed by Monday, it is expected.
