Awards to be given for yards and gardens showing greatest improvement this summer.

These prizes are classed under 12 heads and the merchants of the city are to be invited to co-operate in the civic improvement of Medford by having a share in awarding the prizes.

Mrs. Howard L. Barto was appointed chairman of a committee to extend these invitations personally and hopes for an enthusiastic response.

 Such men as Prof. Peck, Mr. Roy Gill of Gill Bros. Seed Co., Mr. Bacher, Swiss Floral Co., Arthur B. Main, Santa Cruz, one of the biggest bulb growers on the coast, and others of equal interest will be on hand and prove more than helpful.
 This is a club one cannot miss belonging to and not suffer a great loss.
 Mr. Miksche will not be able, owing to extreme press of business, to be the acting president during the balance of the year, but his place will be filled by the vice-president, Mrs. Charles Funnas, who is an enthusiastic flower lover and an able worker.
 Mr. Miksche will continue conducting the round table discussion at the meetings, just as he has been doing.
 He is full of helpful suggestions and at this meeting some interesting facts were stated for the benefit of the members. To select the best singers, both boys and girls, who are earnestly invited to join. Gladys that seem to die too soon are often affected with "hard rot," bulbs will live if put away and treated with some salt just before planting next spring.
 When "Glad's" finish blooming cut flower stems off so strength will go to bulbs.
 Peel bulbs before planting.
 The seeds and bulbs with some salt before planting.
 Do not leave "Glad's" bulbs in ground during the winter, but take them up when leaves have died and hang up or keep in dry sand during the winter.
 Plant verbenas on south side of house to keep from freezing during winter.
 Be sure and destroy crab grass now—take rake and pull up—then cut it off and burn it.
 Spray the place left with 1½ pounds of copperas to one gallon of water. This will spray 100 sq. feet, repeat in ten days. This will destroy plantain or any weed leafed plants. Do this in cool of day, evening.
 Use K. M. G. to kill small white morning glory.

 Use one pound in fall. It isn't any good in spring. Come out and join the Garden club. A welcome awaits you.
