

EGAN DEFEATED BY M'HUGH 6-5 IN GOLF FINAL

Medford Star, After Playing Brilliantly in the Morning Round, Suffers Reverse in Afternoon Play and Loses California Title.

DEL MONTE, Cal., Sept. 10.—(AP)—The title of California amateur golf champion will be carried by Johnny McHugh for another year. As easily as he breezed through the field last year, the slim San Franciscoan, 23 years of age, but old in golfing, has picked his way along a trail crowded with some 400 others, all seeking the state's major honors for the links. Young McHugh emerged triumphant in yesterday's 36-hole final with a 6-5 victory over one of the most picturesque figures in the game—H. Chandler Egan.

The veteran Medford, Ore., star, holder of the national amateur championship before Johnny was born, flopped miserably yesterday on the last 18 after holding his young rival on even terms for the morning round.

Neither turned in the championship golf of which they are capable, as evidenced by their score of 77, five over par, each for the first round.

Egan turned the first nine, however, in 36 to equal par, while McHugh posted a 37 coming in.

The Oregonian had a 41 to McHugh's 40 going out.

The an Francisco youth got away to an excellent start in the afternoon and winning the first three holes established himself solidly in the lead. At the turn he was still three up. He won the tenth, eleventh and then the twelfth to have Egan down by six.

The next hole was halved and Johnny came marching home with his second successive state title.

Egan, who recently completed the job of redesigning the Pebble Beach course, learned first hand that the layout on which the 1925 national amateur event will be held, is now one of the golfing tests of the coast. The myriad trapped green and fairways coaxed the veteran's ball into trouble almost on every hole.

Hazy weather proved no detriment to the gallery and several thousand followed the finalists during the day.

BRAEBURN COUNTRY CLUB, NEWTON, Mass., Sept. 10.—(AP)—Starring the defense of his national amateur golf championship in erratic fashion, Bobby Jones required 10 strokes, five over par for the first nine holes of today's half of the qualifying test.

From the moment he sliced his first tee shot into the rough, Jones was in and out of trouble. He lost three to par on the first two holes. Another on the fifth and one on the tenth. His youthful partner Dave Ogilvie of Cleveland, son of the famous pro of the same name, made the turn in 39.

Braeburn's hazards were making the going tough for others besides Jones and the scores among the early starters were uniformly high. The best nine card for the moment, 37 registered by Robert Gordon, the home club star. The cards:

The 577-yard fifth hole, longest on the course, with a gulley to carry from the tee and a bottle neck approach to the green, flanked by traps and trees, furnished an early Waterloo. Par five for this layout was equalled by only three of the first ten golfers to try it, the earnings showing an eight, three sevens and three sixes as a warning to the rest of the field.

Jones was not the only star to stumble into trouble there. Francis Ouimet took a seven after having dropped a stroke to par on the fourth when he needed five.

POLLS OPEN TILL EIGHT TONIGHT IN PAVE BOND VOTE

The polls for the special \$100,000 bond election for the repair of the streets and for the purchasing of maintenance paving machinery, which opened this noon, do not close until 8 o'clock.

Indications early this afternoon were that the vote would be comparatively light, considering that Medford has over 1000 voters. Mainly because not much general interest has been manifested in the election and that many voters who favor the measure, as nearly always at special bond elections, forget all about such an election until too late.

Despite that the early afternoon vote was quite light in comparison with regular elections, it was expected that this vote would steadily increase during the afternoon, and that this evening's voting would be quite brisk.

There are only four voting places located as follows: First ward, public market; second ward, Washington school; third ward, Fichtner's garage; fourth ward, city hall.

J. H. FULLER NOT TO BE CANDIDATE FOR LEGISLATURE

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 10.—(AP)—Several new acceptances of nomination and some declarations were received today by the secretary of state. The period for filing of acceptances regularly expires tomorrow, but this will not shut out candidates who are yet to be nominated.

Carl E. Wimberly of Roseburg, who was nominated as the democratic candidate for the state senate from Douglas county; E. K. Plasecki of Dallas, nominated as the democratic candidate for senator from Lincoln and Polk counties; and J. H. Fuller, nominated by the democrats for representative from Jackson county, all decline their names to go on the ballot. All were nominated by the writing of their names at the primary election.

Claude C. Pratt, La Grande, who was regularly nominated at the primary election for representative from Union county, informs the secretary of state he is moving to Denver, Colo., and withdraws as a candidate.

The Socialist-Labor party committee today informed the secretary of state that Chester Harness of Bend who was nominated by that party for secretary of state, has left the country and that another candidate will be nominated this week.

Additional certificates of nomination have been filed by the "Farmway Democrats of Portland" as follows, the candidates being nominated as independents: F. E. Coulter and S. E. Holcomb for senator from Multnomah county, and Anthony Caville and Otto D. The Oregonian had a 41 to McHugh's 40 going out.

All of the candidates of this organization request that after their names on the ballot appear the words "Clean up Oregon, Independent."

The certificate of nomination for Walter M. Pierce as the Democratic candidate for congress from the second district was received. W. C. Culbertson, regular Democratic nominee for congress from the third district, and who was endorsed by the Tammany Independent organization, said he would file an acceptance of the latter nomination.

DR. ADAMS SELLS PEAR ORCHARD

C. E. Whiteman, of Ashland, has purchased a 20-acre pear orchard on the Millonaire road from Dr. W. R. Adams and expects to move onto the property within the next two weeks according to present plans.

The orchard was sold to Mr. Whiteman for a consideration of \$23,000, with the E. C. Corn real estate agency handling the deal.

Mr. Whiteman's 15 acre apple orchard two miles above Ashland has been sold to Dr. Adams.

FIRE PUMPER HERE FOR DEMONSTRATION

Driving a small 550-gallon fire pumper, Ralph Crawford of the Howard-Cooper fire equipment company of Portland arrived in Medford yesterday to leave the machine here until the city votes upon a bond issue authorizing the purchase of a 600-gallon pumper.

The small pumper has been at Albany, where it was used until a larger one arrived there last week. It arrived here yesterday a few minutes too late to answer an alarm on McAndrews street, where a small woodshed was destroyed by fire.

"Individual directors of the association, of course, are making their individual choices, some for me, Smith and some for Mr. Hoover. My choice is Governor Smith for reasons which I have recently made public. These individual choices bear no relation whatever to the attitude of the association.

"Our association will campaign actively in many of the contests for membership in the senate and the house of representatives, and this we shall do in many parts of the country. We have sent a searching questionnaire on the subject to every candidate for congress and we shall press for answers and shall preserve these answers. It is time that ordinary Americans were told just where their candidates for congress stand on this, the greatest issue of the time.

"Meanwhile, we are carrying on with the greatest thoroughness the work of our research department at a cost of many thousands of dollars, to ascertain the basic, provable facts as to the workings of prohibition in our own country and also as to the experience of other countries such as Canada, Sweden and others with their regulatory systems. As fast as these facts are assembled we shall make their public in responsible reports. We are trying to look beyond the political fight of the year and into the future when this constructive side of the problem will be sorely needed. We shall be ready to propose substitutes for prohibition based on sound and sensible study of the facts."

COUNTY SCHOOL SUPERVISOR BACK FROM OLD WORLD

The Alps in Switzerland are not unlike the Canadian Rockies and the River Rhine in Germany is similar to the Columbia in Oregon, according to Miss Elizabeth Burr, county school supervisor, who returned Friday from an extended tour through seven European countries, which included Holland, France, England, Italy, Germany and Switzerland.

"I enjoyed every minute of my three months abroad," she said, "and I am positive I will never regret taking the trip, which has shown me so many new things. I will never forget the ruins of Pompeii, which had been lost for centuries before the New World was discovered. It was impressive to view the ancient buildings and note the durability with which they had been built to endure the wear of centuries."

"Rome was beautiful," she continued, "and in the bay of Naples I met old school friends, whom I had not suspected of being so far away from home. They were on another tour and I had not seen them for years. The world after all is mighty small."

"Paris, a city of noise, hurry and bustle, was wonderful to see, but then it can never compare to our Washington, D. C., New York, London or Chicago. However, its opera and ballets are the best in the world and they have the reputation of making the New York attractions appear much cheaper. One wonders how such lavish productions can be staged with so many characters and such extravagant stage settings."

"I did not see much of Germany but what I did see impressed me deeply, especially the old castles and ruins along the Rhine, which reminds me so much of the Columbia. The Columbia, however, has a much wilder appearance along its shores, as in Germany, practically all available ground is under cultivation and here there are acres and acres, and miles and miles in their original state. The cathedral at Cologne was marvelous to behold and the old town of Heidelberg was interesting to see."

"The Jungfrau, one of the scenic attractions of the Alps, is very much like the tall mountain overshadowing Lake Louise in Canada."

Miss Burr also told of the superiority of European sight-seeing guides to American guides and of the personnel of her particular party, which included 16 people, with eight from the state of Kansas.

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 10.—(AP)—Fred L. Glad, 47, of Eugene, died in a hospital here yesterday from injuries received when his automobile skidded on a turn nine miles north of here at 6:30 a. m. Sunday. Glad was president of the meat cutters' union of Eugene.

The man was found lying on the pavement by other motorists, who arrived before the wheels of the overturned car had stopped turning. Glad's machine turned over at least once and rested in the ditch.

Glad regained consciousness in the hospital only long enough to say "the car skidded." He received a fractured skull and fractured pelvis and internal injuries. The accident occurred on the same turn, at which Fred Stevens met death in an automobile crash on July 9.

Glad had left Eugene at 4:30 o'clock Sunday morning for La Grande.

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AGED MINER WHO LOST ALL IN FIRE, GIVEN LENIENCY

William Redanz, a resident of the Applegate district, was found guilty in Justice Roe's court at Jacksonville on Saturday afternoon on a charge brought by Lee P. Fuel, forest ranger, of allowing a fire to escape to land not his own.

Mr. Redanz on August 18 set fire to a stump in the yard of his place located on Spencer creek, without permit to burn. Thinking that it was safe, he left it unattended, and it spread, burning his house and about 450 acres of forest land before it was controlled by a force of firefighters employed by the forest service.

Owing to the fact that he is an aged man, that all of his possessions were burned, and that he did not intentionally cause the fire, the sentence was suspended upon the recommendation of the forest service.

Death Toll of the Automobile

He suffered a fractured skull and internal injuries. Truce Kuylen, driver of the car, was not held in connection with the accident. He told police he was driving slowly and stopped within four feet.

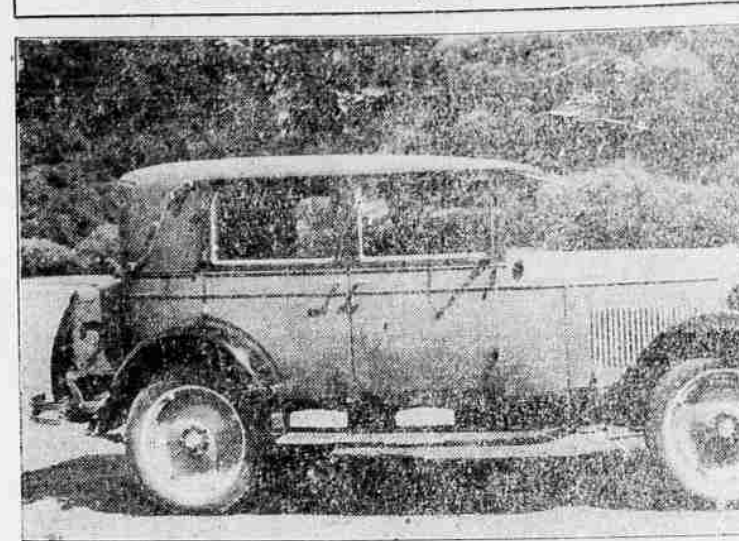
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1928 Chevrolet Imperial Landau Sedan
