A man looking through the news is like a small boy in a menagerie, so much to see you have to run from cage to cage, from the laughing hyena to the snorting hippopotamus, and from the bar-shaking orang outang to the placid elephant.

Politics may be called the laughing hyena of the human menagerie, and the crime wave is the orang outang.

In politics everybody claims everything. Mr. Raskob has already carried Pennsylvania for the Democrats, unofficially, and begins to feel that Hoover will not carry one state in the Union.

Dr. Work, on the other hand, says the Solid South is now solidly Republican and dry, and if Governor Smith gets the Southern state, why, Dr. Work will be surprised.

Governor Hughes is elected a World Court judge by 41 votes out of 48. That is, proportionately, the vote that will be cast against the United States when its interests in that court conflict with Europe's interests.

And if a question should arise as to America's duty to pay Europe's war bills or cancel old debts owed us by Europe the vote would be 100 per cent hostile.

Now Mayor Walker, of New York, determined to find out about speakeasies—the modern saloon—learns that New York City has at least 25,000.

It is difficult for the authorities to close them, what with judges granting protecting injunctions, etc.

Perhaps it would not be so hard, if somebody paid as much to have them closed as the speakeasies pay to be let alone.

# ALL READY FOR PEAR SHOW AND FAIR

## ALL PAST EXHIBITS ECLIPSED

**Final Preparations Rushed in**  
All Departments — New Building Houses School Displays — Grants Pass Day On Morrow—Carnival, Dancing and Racing for Amusement.

Hundreds of workers were busy today at the Jackson county fair grounds as entries poured into the various departments and display arrangements were being completed for the opening of the great exposition tomorrow morning.

Entry clerks were on hand early at the horticultural building checking in the huge loads of fruit, grains, vegetables and other produce which have been selected and will be arranged by county Grange committees and community club members.

According to those experienced in the work, the horticultural building will be even a greater attraction than usual this year owing to the exceptionally fine displays and the interest which is being shown in the high returns being realized on products of this vicinity.

The Oregon State Agricultural college will have an exhibit of practical educational value in the horticultural building, showing meats of various kinds with the proper methods of cutting. This display, which is shown under the banner, "The Truth in Meats," will be of special interest to the housewife.

Cattle, hogs, sheep and horses are being placed in the new quarters built or enlarged for displays in these departments and a fine insight into the county's productivity in these respects may be gained by a tour of the stock buildings.

The judging, which will take place on Thursday, will be handled by Harry Lindgren, livestock field agent for Oregon State Agricultural college, who will award ribbons in all classes except dairy cattle; and C. A. Henderson, county agent of Klamath county, who will officiate in the dairy cattle selections.

## WAVE LENGTHS STATE STATIONS CHANGE NOV. 11

**Radio Commission Makes Wholesale Revision in Interests of Better Reception—All But Two Oregon Plants Affected.**

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 11.—(AP)—On November 11 the wave length of practically every radio station in the United States will change. The change will be along the line ordered by the Federal Radio commission which has drawn up a systematic schedule by means of which it is hoped radio reception will be placed on a higher plane than it ever before has enjoyed.

In Oregon every radio station except two will change its wave length or power.

Chain broadcasting also came in for rescheduling. The commission ordered that each of the 40 stations using power of 500 watts or more, and operating on cleared channels, can broadcast identification programs for but one hour daily, from 7 p. m. to midnight, except in cases where the transmitters are 300 miles from each other, are operated on the same frequency, or have received special permission, as in cases of extraordinary events.

The Oregon changes follow: KORE, Eugene, 100 watts, will broadcast on wave of 211.1 meters, sharing time with KMED, Medford, with 50 watts rating.

KGW is moved up to the 508.2 meter band; power 5000 watts unchanged.

KTRB and KFJR, Portland, will operate on 230.6 meters, 500 watts, sharing time.

Other changes of importance to Oregon radio enthusiasts include: KIX, Oakland, will move to the 500 kilocycle wave band; KOMO, Seattle, will operate on 485.8 meters; KGO, Oakland, 279.9 meters; KIQ, Spokane, 322.9 meters; KHL, Los Angeles, 322.9 meters; KOP, San Francisco, allotted 500 watts on 449.9 meters; KXN, Hollywood, 5000 watts on the 283.5 meter band.

## RAINFALL GLADDENS HUNTERS

**Governor Ready to Revoke Ban On Deer — General Rain Predicted As Ocean Storm Moves Inshore — Many Oregon Points Report Drouth Ended.**

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 11.—(AP)—Seldom has a dush of rain been so welcome to a group of Oregonians as the light downfall that started today. Hunters, who for days have been scanning the skies for something damper than high fog, took off their hats to fully enjoy the moisture, while their thoughts turned to rifles and forests.

"It looks like a general rain for western Washington and western Oregon, except in the extreme south," E. H. Wells, district weather forecaster, said today. "A storm formed quickly off the coast last night and is moving inshore. We expect showers east of the mountains."

Wells' forecast was supplemented by reports of rain from Grants Pass, Roseburg, Salem and Eugene.

In Governor Patterson's office at Salem an order recalling his anti-hunting proclamation, is waiting for assurance that the rain is general and soaking enough to remove the fire hazard. "The new proclamation is ready, but for the date, Harold Clifford, state game warden, said today.

Portland sporting goods houses reported today that three hunting parties were camped in the Nehalem country and others were near Tillamook. Several hunters have been in the headwaters of the Clackamas since Sunday. Others started into the Mount Hood national forest, but were turned back by forest officials.

Today's rain here was the first measurable quantity since July 21, when one-hundredths of an inch was registered.

## MISSION FUNDS USED TO BACK FILM CAREERS

**Missing Baptist Treasurer Furnished Money to Budding Actresses — Fugitive Churchman Sought in Filmland, As Grand Jury Hears of Defalcations.**

ATLANTA, Ga., Sept. 11.—(AP)—Evidence that Clinton S. Carnes, missing treasurer of the Southern Baptist Mission Board, sponsored the moving picture careers of two girls while a \$100,000 shortage accumulated in his accounts was ready for submission today to a grand jury investigating Carnes' affairs.

Thomas B. Scott, receiver for Carnes' properties, announced yesterday that not only had Carnes kept an accurate record of his patronage, but that there was found in his private papers a contract between him and the young women.

This agreement, Scott said, provided that Carnes was to receive a part of the earnings of Miss Sonia Nordlie and Miss Lois Griffin. The contract was made through Mrs. Louise Pope, formerly of Atlanta.

The receiver said he was told the girls were with Mrs. Pope in Hollywood, attending a school for motion picture actresses. In response to appeals from Mrs. Pope for funds, Scott said he had wired her that Carnes had disappeared and that no more money would be forthcoming.

Scott's inspection showed that Carnes had invested nearly \$12,000 in the talent of the two girls over a period of 22 months. Miss Nordlie having received \$4,721.67, Miss Griffin \$5,138.61 and Mrs. Pope \$2,044. In return for the advance sums the girls were to give him part of their earnings later.

## MEMBER EVANS CREEK HUNTING PARTY KILLED

**Accidental Discharge of Rifle Claims Life of Brownsville, Ore., Man—Locating Deer Signs Before Opening of Season—Expedition Entered Hills Sunday.**

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Sept. 11.—(AP)—Death claimed its first toll in a hunting party of four near this city yesterday when John P. Hunter of Brownsville, Ore., was shot by the accidental discharge of a companion's rifle and died on the trail a half hour later.

The accident occurred in the rugged country of Deader mountain between Jumpoff Joe creek and Louie creek, reached from the town of Rogue River through the upper Evans Creek valley.

S. A. Andrews of Brownsville was walking along the trail in the lead, followed by Hunter, and Manuel Knott, also of Brownsville, bringing up the rear.

Andrews said the party was passing a large rock when he heard a shot and turned around to see Hunter falling forward. He caught the man and eased his form to the ground.

"Have I shot you?" Knott cried from behind the rock.

## DECISIVE G.O.P. WIN IN MAINE

**Points Way to Reports of Pro-Hoover Sentiment in Upstate New York—Governor and Senator Chosen By Record Majority — Smith Forces Routed.**

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Maine's overwhelming majority for the Republican state and senatorial tickets brought optimistic statements today from republican leaders generally as to the outcome of the presidential contest in November, but Herbert Hoover withheld comment.

Senator Curtis, the party's vice-presidential nominee, declared the Maine result was a "sign of the trend in the national election."

"The vote shows which way the wind is blowing," he said.

Chairman Work of the Republican National committee issued a statement calling attention to the heavy majority for the G. O. P. in the state which far exceeded that of four years ago, when Calvin Coolidge rolled up the largest plurality ever received there by a presidential candidate.

Senator Frederick H. Gillett of Massachusetts, one of a number of callers at the Hoover headquarters said Maine had returned an even more sweeping majority than had been expected. He added that this showed conclusively that the democratic claim of a general swing away from the republican party was without substantial foundation.

A prediction that Kentucky would follow Maine's lead on November 6 was made by J. Matt Chilton, republican national committeeman for that state, who also called on the republican presidential nominee. To support his statement he pointed to the republican victory in Louisville, which, he said, showed 49,357 republicans; 25,507 democrats and 11,883 independents.

Representative W. E. Evans, of California, who has spent the last five weeks in Tennessee, told Hoover that the preponderance of sentiment in the southern border states was for him at this time.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—(AP)—The results of the Maine election were seen today by John H. Bartlett, first assistant postmaster-general, who campaigned for the republican ticket in the state, as indicating that "upstate New York will give Mr. Hoover a million head when election day comes."

Bartlett said the "decided expression of pro-Hoover views by the voters of Maine, as shown in yesterday's voting, gives him corroboration of the reports which have come of the Hoover sentiment in New York state."

"There is a striking similarity," he continued, "between the people of upstate New York and those of Maine. Their spirit is the same. Their views about national issues are much alike."

PORTLAND, Me., Sept. 11.—(AP)—In the latest majority vote given a gubernatorial candidate in Maine, William T. Gardiner, republican, was swept into the governorship yesterday over his democratic opponent, Edward C. Moran, Jr. Virtually complete returns in yesterday's election gave Gardiner a lead of more than 79,000 over Moran.

Senator Frederick Hale, seeking his third term at Washington, was defeated by Edward C. Moran, Jr. (D.), 44,987 to 44,987.
