FIRST RAIN IN NINE WEEKS OVER CITY AND VALLEY

The first rain to fall in Medford since July 2nd, last, when only a little trace fell, and since on June 29, the only measurable quantity fell, only .91 of an inch, began to fall lightly late this forenoon, and unfortunately for the county fair outlook, rain is forecasted for tonight and Wednesday.

The weather bureau today did not forecast beyond Wednesday, but the weather map indications are that a storm area is headed this way from the Alaska region, which will bring rain within the next 36 hours.

L. W. Dick, the local weather man, holds out no hope for a sunny day tomorrow. However, he said, on perusal of the weather man this forenoon, that the indications were for only a light rain in the form of occasional showers.

A study of the weather map shows that a storm area this forenoon was then south of Alaska, and moving this way. The general indications are for rain in the valley during the next 36 hours in the Pacific northwest, which will probably come to the Rogue river valley in the form of occasional showers of light rain, Mr. Dick said.

While it was cloudy and rain threatening in the valley from late last night on, snow was reported here as falling in the high mountains. It was snowing heavily at Mount McLaughlin this morning and also at Battle mountain.
