

GUN CEREMONY MARRIAGE BRIDE CLAIMS

Also Robbed of \$30 By San Francisco Ballplayer, Who Forced Trip to Reno—Screams Bring Rescue By Policeman.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 11.—(AP) The Examiner says today that George "Mickey" Shrader, California baseball player, has been arrested and charged with kidnapping and robbery at the request of his bride of less than a day.

The newspaper quotes the bride, formerly Mrs. Esther Elsenfeld, as accusing Shrader of kidnapping her last Saturday, forcing her to go to Reno, Nev., at the point of a gun and making her marry him. The robbery charge resulted from Mrs. Elsenfeld's statement that Shrader took her purse containing \$30 before they left San Francisco to prevent her escaping.

Monday they arrived at Reno where, she alleges, Shrader forced her to go with him to get a marriage license and later to a justice of the peace where they were married. On the return journey she says while Shrader was gloating over his conquest, she slipped the revolver away from him and hid it in her clothes.

Early this morning they arrived in San Francisco and Mrs. Elsenfeld screamed for help when she saw a policeman. Shrader was arrested and taken to police headquarters where Mrs. Elsenfeld told her story. Last night friends of the woman had asked police to aid in finding her, declaring they believed she had been kidnapped by Shrader.

Shrader is the manager of the San Francisco stock exchange baseball club, which recently won a state tournament.

elector over Herbert E. Holmes, democrat, by a majority almost as large.

Gardner's sweeping victory exceeded that of the previous high majority in gubernatorial races by more than 14,000. In 1926 the republican margin was 65,345. In the presidential election of 1924, President Coolidge carried the state by a plurality of 56,476 over John W. Davis and by a majority of 85,004 over the combined vote of Davis and LaFollette.

The republican victory was decisive in every contest, the party's congressional candidate winning by even greater majorities than the gubernatorial candidate.

Four years ago the governor carried five cities for democrats—Bangor, Biddeford, Lewiston, Old Town and Waterville—and county, Androscoggin. Yesterday, Biddeford, which went democratic in 1924 by a vote of 4,480 to 1,035, remained in the democratic column by a vote of 1,941 to 1,541.

Lewiston, the only other city lost by the republicans, was one of the few places in the state to show an increase in its total vote, the democrats carrying it in 1924 by a vote of 6,177 to 1,098 and yesterday 5,847 to 5,043. This is the home city of Congressman White.

Portland, with one precinct missing, showed a total republican vote within 400 of that cast four years ago, while the democratic vote fell off by 3,800. Bangor's democratic margin of 562 votes in 1924 was turned into a republican majority of 2,398. Old Town, which showed a democratic margin of 449 in 1924, went republican by 473.

Waterville had the closest vote of any of the cities, its democratic majority of 1,022 four years ago being turned into a republican majority of 291.

Androscoggin, the county in which the vote was the closest, returned a republican majority of 2,152 as compared with a democratic majority of 280 in 1924.

NEW YORK, Sept. 11.—(AP) Democratic National Committee Chairman John J. Raskoh expressed surprise today that republicans had not won by an even larger margin than they did in the Maine election.

"We have regarded Maine as a republican state all along," he said. "I don't think the national issues were involved at all in the Maine elections. We thought it purely a state fight up there and took no active part. I understand the republican national committee took a very active part."

ALBANY, Sept. 11.—(AP) The only comment for publication Governor Smith had today on yesterday's election result in Maine was that he "never was optimistic enough to think Maine would be anything but republican."

Informing that Rev. John Roach Straton would be present when he delivers his campaign speech at Oklahoma City, Sept. 20 and might challenge him from the floor, the governor said he "would be pleased to see him."

SECRET BALLOT BY 25 ATTORNEYS AGAINST THOMAS

Twenty-five of the 52 members of the Southern Oregon Bar association met yesterday afternoon and cast a secret ballot on the matter of supporting a candidate for the circuit judgeship for Josephine and Jackson counties.

The vote stood, Charles M. Thomas, of Medford, Republican candidate, two.
Harry D. Norton of Grants Pass, Democratic candidate, fourteen.
Nine of the attorneys present did not vote.

A number of lawyers present at the meeting refused to vote on any of the proceedings stating that the meeting was called and the resolution presented for purely political motives, coming as it did on the eve of election, and further, that the meeting was a special meeting and friends of Judge Thomas were given no information as to the purpose of the meeting.

A number of lawyers present at the meeting and some not present have expressed themselves as being very indignant at what they designate to be a high-handed effort on the part of a number of lawyers unfriendly to Judge Thomas to use the local bar association as a screen to repudiate their endorsement of Judge Thomas, and have stated that they will not take part in any endorsement one way or the other.

The following resolution was adopted by a vote of 16 for, 4 no, and three not voting:

Be it resolved by the Southern Oregon Bar association of Jackson and Josephine counties, Oregon, that

Whereas, in March, 1928, numerous members of this association signed a recommendation sent to them by the Honorable C. M. Thomas, circuit judge, which recommendation was an endorsement of said C. M. Thomas for re-election as Circuit Judge of the First Judicial District; and

Whereas said document is now being used for political purposes against the candidacy of another prominent lawyer and member of said association; and

Whereas, conditions have changed since the signing of said instrument, and the Honorable H. D. Norton of Josephine county, Oregon, has been nominated for said office; and

Whereas it is one of the practices and traditions of our judicial system that a judge should not request individual members of the bar to sign such endorsements for the reason that such members have clients who have important matters pending and they do not want such clients to feel that as such attorneys they are not on friendly terms with the judge; and

Whereas the Multnomah bar association at Portland follows the practice of taking a secret ballot of the members of the association to express to the public the best judgment of such members, and of the association as to the fitness of the respective candidates for such judicial office, and such practice tends to keep the judiciary free from such criticism and assists in keeping the association from becoming a political organization;

Now therefore, be it resolved that a secret ballot of the members of the association as to the fitness and qualifications of these two candidates for Circuit Judge of the First Judicial District and that when said vote is taken, the result thereof be made a part of this resolution and a copy of said resolution be spread upon the minutes of this meeting, and a copy given to each of the papers within the district, with a request for its publication.

NOSES PUNCHED WHEN ANTI-AL FORCES RETIRE

Texas Democrats Go On Rampage, and Joe Bailey Clings to Standard—Men Knocked Down—Women Jostled.

FAIR PARK AUDITORIUM, Dallas, Sept. 11.—(AP) The state Democratic convention split wide open five minutes after it convened here today. The anti-Smith forces quit the hall and retired to the agricultural building to hold their own convention. The convention hall was in a turmoil for several minutes and one fist fight broke out before the opponents of Governor Smith left the hall.

At the height of the uproar which accompanied the bolt, when men were being knocked down and women roughly handled by the shouting, struggling delegates, the band struck up "The Eyes of Texas Are Upon You."

When the confusion was at its height, former Senator Joseph Weldon Bailey was seen standing on a chair trying to wrest a standard from several anti-Smithites who attempted to carry it down the hall.

Within five minutes there were a half dozen fist fights in the Dallas section as uniformed police tried to restore order. No one was seriously injured, although blood was flowing freely from several noses and there were a number of blacked eyes.

When order was finally restored and the anti-Smithites had left the hall, Chairman Wilcox introduced Myron Haddock, temporary chairman of the convention.

DALLAS, Texas, Sept. 11.—(AP) Two members of the democratic state executive committee refused to pledge their allegiance to Governor Alfred E. Smith, democratic presidential nominee, at the meeting of that body here today. They were Benton McMillan of Zavalla county and Mrs. J. T. Webb of Dallas, member by proxy from Denton county. All other members took the pledge, which was demanded by Steve Pinkney of Harris county.

The state executive committee met at noon to fix plans for the hearing of contesting delegations to the convention. D. W. Wilcox of Georgetown, chairman of the executive committee, announced contests had been filed from Dallas, Houston, Wichita Falls, Fort Worth and Mineral Wells.

Alvin S. Moody of Houston, chairman of the Anti-Al Smith democratic party for Texas, reiterated that the group was ready to split the Texas democratic party wide open if anti-Smith delegations were not seated at the convention tomorrow.

Plans for a separate convention of the anti-Smith delegates were not recognized were to be completed this afternoon, when all democrats not supporting the national ticket were asked to meet at anti-Smith headquarters. Tentative plans for the bolt were discussed at an informal caucus yesterday. Several prominent state republican leaders attended the conference.
