

ASHLAND SCHOOLS HAS REGISTRATION OF 1205 STUDENTS

ASHLAND, Sept. 12.—Registration cards were signed by 1205 boys and girls in the Ashland schools on Monday morning. The enrollment was divided with 225 students in the senior high school, 27 in the junior high, 289 in the Lincoln school and 234 in the Washington.

On Monday morning after registration and assignments were made, pupils were dismissed to return on Tuesday morning, fully equipped with all school materials for the year's grind which began on Tuesday morning. The teachers went into session on Monday afternoon, clearing up all matters relative to opening days.

The enrollment for this year shows an increase over last year, and the number will be augmented during the next two weeks by late arrivals who were unable for various reasons to enroll on the opening day.
