

AUTOMOBILE SHOW AT FAIR THRILLS VISITING CROWDS

Automobile men are enthusiastic over the great automobile show at the Jackson County Fair and Fair Show this year. The fine new building which has nearly fifty cars on the floor, has been thronged with visitors since the opening day and salesmen are kept busy answering questions and showing the fine points of their respective displays.

Many sales have been reported and in some instances every car in certain groups has been bought and will be delivered at the expiration of the fair. It is estimated that over eighty thousand dollars worth of automobiles is represented in the show.

Entering the south door visitors find three Dodge models, including the standard six de luxe sedan, standard six coupe and a Victory sport sedan. A 6-cylinder 1-3-4 ton truck complete the group which is shown by the Eakin Motor company with Clyde S. Eakin, assisted by Earl Davis, salesman, greeting the public.

Remaining space in the south end of the building is occupied by the Ford products from the C. E. Gates Auto company. The display is a complete showing of the well known cars with the exception of commercial machines. A sport roadster, phaeton, or touring, business coupe, standard coupe, two-door sedan, and four-door sedan are included in the group. George Gates has been busy engaged on the floor, as a number of "sold" cars decorated the exhibit.

The new DeSoto which recently created so much interest in the automobile world is being shown by the Highway Motor company which also displays the Hupmobile. According to R. B. Markland, sales manager, the auto show visitors have taken pains to look over the new DeSoto which arrived here only a few days before the fair opened.

The O-V. Myers company has a comprehensive display of eight Studebaker models including the Commander Royal, Dictator Royal, Dictator Standard, Dictator Club sedan, President sport roadster, Royal Esquire sedan and Commander standard. A two flying Cloud coupe completes the Myers showing. Salesmen with the exhibit include H. B. James and C. E. Royce of Medford and L. G. Hongland of Ashland.

Two Pontiac wire wheel jobs are shown by the Sanders Motor company, including a two-door and a sport roadster, a four-door standard sedan and a four-door standard sedan which is in charge of L. V. Zundel.

A new model Cadillac and a late LaSalle feature is the Armstrong Motor company's showing, which also has two Essex, a Hudson and an Olds. An Essex placed upon its side to give visitors an unfettered view of the chassis is attracting much attention in the Armstrong corner. E. C. Jerome, O. R. Fouts and R. A. Taylor are putting in most of their time with the exhibit.

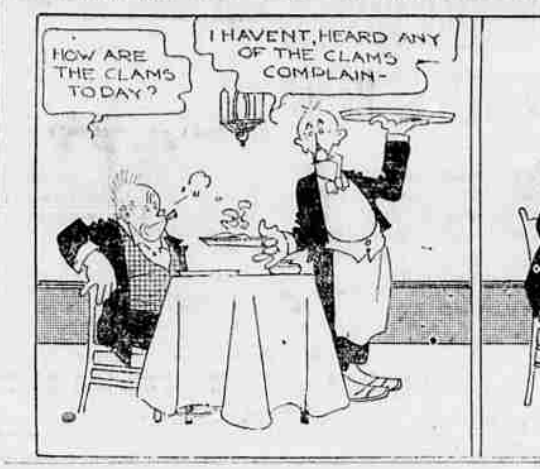
The Pierce-Arrow Motor company, local Chevrolet dealers, are showing two and four-door models, a coupe and a roadster. The Chevrolet which has followed new ideas in automobile design and finish has a large following, according to W. W. Allen a number of sales have been closed directly with visitors in the automobile building. Five members of the Pierce-Arrow staff have been on duty with the Chevrolet display, including L. R. Wicks, W. E. Stevens, M. H. Wiles, H. C. Peetman and H. B. Cousineau.

The first showing in this territory of the new Stearns Knight sedan is attracting visitors to the Treichler Motor company space where a Willys Knight sedan, a coupe, and four and sixes in the Whippet line are also shown. J. E. Whitson, A. W. Walker and Chas. Higgins are showing the Treichler wares.

Sabin and Rindt have encountered so much interest in the Durant line that they expect to increase their showing today in these cars, by the addition of a special coupe, special sedan and special coach. L. R. Johnson and Mr. Ballou are stationed with the Sabin and Rindt display.

The popular Buick line, shown by the Shere Motor company includes a model 50 four-door sedan; model 57, a five passenger four-door sedan; model 26, two passenger coupe and a model 29, a five-passenger coach. Sport models which were expected to arrive for the show were delayed in transit. Ralph Gill, John Dennison and R. L. Chisman have charge of the Buick entries.

ESPEE PRESIDENT SAYS TIMES ON COAST IMPROVING

Portland, Ore., Sept. 14.—(AP) Steady progress in property is seen by William Sproule, president of the Southern Pacific railroad, who reached Portland yesterday on his annual trip of inspection. Business and farming conditions on the coast are improving, Sproule said.

"With the lumber business improving, the livestock industry on a firmer basis and the movement of several lines of farm products increasing, I can see no reason for anything but prosperous times ahead," he observed.

He said he observed a notable betterment in practically all lines in the state. Fruit shipments from southern Oregon will reach a larger total than last year, he was informed, and the lumber shipments are showing a gain over last year's volume.

The southern Pacific expects to have the new broad-gauge stretch of 56 miles between Klamath Falls and Alturas completed and operating by the latter part of next year. This route will shorten the distance to the east via Ogden by 211 miles with reduced grades and fewer curves.

Wall Street Report

NEW YORK, Sept. 14.—(AP)—Speculation for the advance was resumed on a broad scale in today's stock market, which witnessed the establishment of nearly two score new high records. Buying embraced a wide list of issues, but the motors, motor accessories, oils, foods and coppers gave the best demonstrations of group strength. Extreme gains in the active issues ranged from 2 to 3 points, with the ticker again falling half an hour or more behind the market.

The closing was strong. U. S. Steel spiraled into new high ground for the year in the final hour and was followed into virgin territory by other popular shares including Westinghouse, Electric, Republic Steel, Electric Auto, National Cash Register and Johnson & Johnson. A block of 20,000 shares of Continental Baking "B" was bought at 6, then touched 7. Radio, General Motors and the automobile shares turned soft on profit-taking. Total sales approximated 4,200,000 shares.
