

VETERAN STAGE DRIVER OF YREKA PAYS FAIR VISIT

George Chase, one of the prominent citizens of Yreka, Calif., is in attendance upon the Jackson county fair, which he never misses. Mr. Chase enjoys a visit with his former Jackson county friends and makes his annual trip to Medford, where he meets many former acquaintances.

Mr. Chase was one of the old stage drivers and he piloted the Oregon-California stage coach from Rock Point, Oregon to Colusa, California.

He began as a young man in the latter '70s on the first of the route, to facilitate as stage driver on that run, and was one of the reliable and responsible drivers for the stage company until the last stage was driven over the Siskiyou mountains in 1888.

He says that he has hauled very many distinguished citizens of the United States over the Siskiyou mountains, and when you get him in a reminiscent mood, he relates many interesting and interesting incidents connected with his experiences as a stage driver, and one of the things that he is particularly proud of at this time, and which he says is one of the greatest distinctions that ever came to him, is the fact that in 1881 he was the stage driver who hauled Gus Newbury into Jacksonville.

Mr. Chase spoke of the numerous mail robberies that occurred on the summit of the Siskiyou mountains when he was a driver, and relates how, upon one or two occasions the robbers had missed the time when the Wells Fargo Express company's box contained large shipments of gold from the Beekman bank in Jacksonville.

More than once he came near having an intimate acquaintance with the celebrated mail robber, Black Bart, who afterwards served a term for mail robbery at San Quentin.

Mr. Chase is now a responsible farmer of Jackson county, California, and has a large ranch in the vicinity of Edgewood. He resides in Yreka and everyone in Siskiyou county knows George Chase.

JACKSON STREAMS FISH REPLENISHED INCLUDING BASS

Showing that the state game commission did much to improve the fishing situation in southern Oregon during the month of August, figures released today by W. H. Coleman, state superintendent of fish services, revealed that 134,000 eastern brook trout were released in six Jackson county streams during that month. Over 5,000 small bass were released the same month in the Lake of the Woods, and 8,000 more are to be released soon. In addition to this amount, 8,000 trout were released last week in the upper Big Apple creek river.

Last month's distribution was as follows: Apple creek, 16,000; Union creek, 11,000; National creek, 19,000; Crater creek, 19,000; Copeland creek, 45,000.

These fish were distributed under the direction of Percy Southwick of the Crooked Creek hatchery, which also supplied 8,000 trout liberated last week in the Apple creek river below Cooper by Mr. Coleman and C. L. Roudsnel, in charge of Jackson county egg-taking stations. Despite the long trip from the hatchery, which is near Fort Klamath, not over a half dozen trout were lost.

NEW PIPE ORGAN OF ST. MARK'S IN SERVICE SUNDAY

St. Mark's church is happy in the acquisition of a new pipe organ which will be in use at the morning service on Sunday. Mrs. Herman Vanuise will be the organist for the occasion.

The organ was installed by Henry Piche's Sons of Louisville, Ky., a firm which has been building church organs in America for one hundred and eight years, their first factory having been built in 1820.

The Piche organs are found all over the United States and are notable for their purity of tone and tonal quality.

The friends of St. Mark's and the public generally are invited to the opening service.

MARATHON PLANE FORCED DOWN BY STORM AND WIND

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Sept. 14.—(AP)—Stormy headwinds and motor trouble today strung six airplanes out across the continent and ended the New York-Los Angeles non-stop transcontinental air derby—a race without a winner, much less a qualifying finisher.

Of the nine planes which first began the race, three failed almost at the start and but one of the remainder arrived at Mines field here, western terminus of the cross-country dash. It was the Lockheed Vega ship of Art Goebel and Harry Tucker.

Had weather forced it down at Prescott, Ariz., causing disqualification from the race even though it sailed on to Mines field a few hours later, the sole race finisher.

As to the other planes in the race, the story of their failure is quickly told. The Bellanca plane of Geo. Haldeman grounded at Albuquerque, N. M., when a night of bucking headwinds ate up its gasoline supply long before it could have reached Mines field. A leaky valve on an emergency gas tank forced Lieutenant Jack Loman in the Bellanca airplane Columbia down at Amarillo, Tex.

Earl Burch in another Bellanca hit the same misfortune as Haldeman and landed at Willard, N. M., while an ice-clogged carburetor ended Nick Mamer's attempt in a Dobl air sedan at Rawlins, Wyo. Colonel William Thaw II and John P. Morris crashed in a Lockheed Vega at Decatur, Ind., after a broken oil line put an end to their attempt.

It was a thrilling sight to 60,000 people who milled about Mines field yesterday when Goebel piloted the Yankee Doodle into the port, and he was given a tremendous ovation when, together with Tickle, he clambered red-eyed and dizzy out of the cockpit.

WATCH AND AUTO LINK EX-CONVICT TO DEATH CHARGE

OAKLAND, Calif., Sept. 14.—(AP) D. K. Mayer, 40, said by police to have admitted serving a prison term in California, Utah, Washington and Colorado, and Mrs. Mary Smith, of Seattle, whom Mayer introduced as his mother, were held in jail here today for Seattle police, who telegraphed they had a murder warrant for Mayer.

Mayer was arrested because he drove an automobile with a license issued to James H. Bassett, of Riverfront, Wash., who disappeared mysteriously in Seattle last Labor Day. Police said the watch Mayer carried had been identified as Bassett's, and said they found a poison gas gun in the automobile.

Police quoted Mayer as saying he had been released from Leavenworth federal prison last July 31, and first went to Helmer, Utah, where he obtained \$2,000 he had buried there.

He said he bought the automobile in Seattle to bring his mother here, and denied knowing the watch was Bassett's.

SEATTLE, Sept. 14.—(AP) Although the body of James H. Bassett, supposed murder victim, had not been found, officials agreed today to serve out a warrant against D. K. Mayer, jailed in Oakland, Calif., when found in possession of Bassett's automobile and watch.
