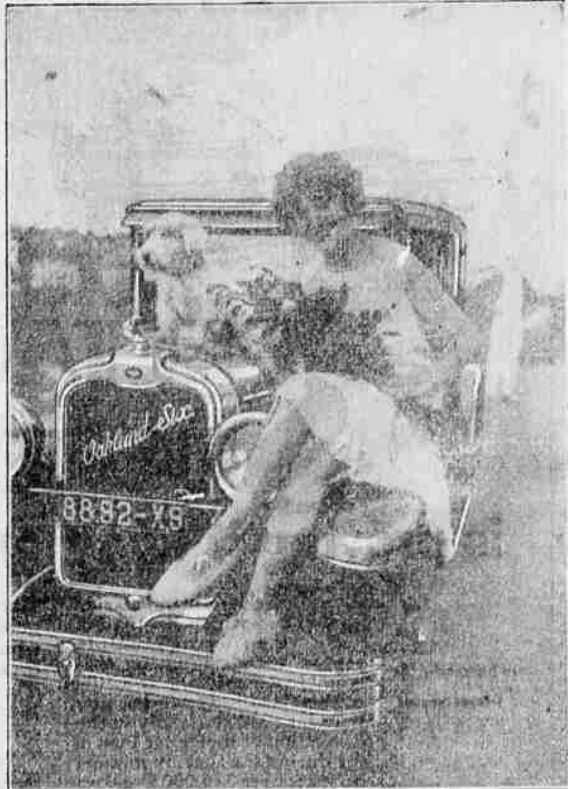

Mister A, Star in British High Society Scandal, Is Pardoned

LONDON—(AP) Britain's famous "Mister A," now occupant of the beloved throne of Kashmir, has received sovereign pardon for any slight indiscretions which he may have committed in the exuberance of inexperienced youth.

His Highness has lunched with Their Majesties at Buckingham Palace. This court, so far as it is concerned, has written "finis" to one of the choicest scandals the empire has ever produced, though the echoes of the case still continue to reverberate through the clubs of the world.

The code which Buckingham Palace enforces as regards the personal conduct and morals of those who have entry to the golden halls is exceedingly severe. Many of the blue laws laid down by Queen Victoria still prevail.

King George and Queen Mary are stern disciplinarians, and frown on anything which even savors of impropriety. Those who have fallen from grace are seldom reinstated. Even at times, who are fairly common in these days, are barred from the palace, with possibly very rare exceptions.

So it was with much interest that one noted the presence of the maharajah at a luncheon given by the king-emperor and his queen.

The case of "Mr. A."

It will be recalled that His Highness, while he was still Prince Hari and heir to the throne of Kashmir, got involved in Paris in one of those well known "understand my wife, you villain" incidents. The parties to the drama were all of British nationality. Prince Hari, in an attempt to hush the matter up, wrote checks on his well night unlimited checkbook to the extent of a million and a half dollars. Ultimately the whole sordid story was carried to a court of justice and the details were blazoned on front pages throughout the universe. For "reasons of state," an effort was made to conceal the prince's identity under the nom de guerre of "Mister A," but this was deemed to fail from the outset.

The testimony brought out some points which were so delicately and complicated that the general public could only guess at their purport, since the newspapers couldn't explain. I recall that one state's attorney general in America wrote and asked me to interpret privately some of the testimony, so that he could size up the case correctly. Ultimately a lawyer by the name of William Cooper Hobbs went to prison for conspiracy to defraud.

There was a general feeling in England that the prince had been very unwise and badly used, and when his uncle, the maharajah died, the prince was elevated to the throne, there being no direct successor.

Uncle's Drowsiness Convenient.

Had the prince's uncle been caught in similar circumstances he would have pulled his wild out by the roots and made his tormentors eat it raw. This ancient prince was about as shrewd as they make them. I was presented to him in India several years ago and was greatly interested in his rather complex personality.

Being one of the most powerful potentates in India, and controlling a state of strategic importance, the maharajah naturally got much consideration from British officials, and at one time or another he caused considerable anguish by a funny little trick he employed in sidestepping important questions.

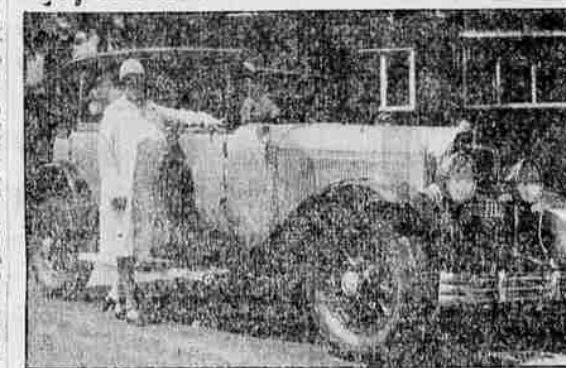
His Highness frequently was in a very sleepy state, and used to doze off in the midst of conversations. I have been told what made him sleepy, but I have forgotten the exact details. Anyway, it really doesn't matter. The fact remains that he used to fall asleep when he was being asked pertinent questions.

A good deal of his dozing was legitimate, but the old gentleman, being quite well aware of his weakness, used to traffic on it when he was as wide awake as anybody. If he saw muddy waters

ahead of him, he just dozed off, and nobody had the temerity to pinch him to see whether he was playing possum or not.

BIG SHIPMENT OF BUICK CARS

How the prosperity enjoyed by our business tends to promote the welfare of those in other lines of work is strikingly shown by the activity of the railroads serving the city of Flint. Always busy transporting the manufactured products of this thriving industrial center, the roads are working overtime this summer, largely because of tremendous increase in the output of a single Flint industry—the Buick Flint Company.

A few years ago, shipment of a whole trainload of automobiles would have attracted widespread attention as an evidence of remarkable business prosperity. The world marvelled then at stories of Buicks leaving Flint in trainloads,—sometimes at the rate of two or three such shipments in one week. Today, the Pere Marquette railroad alone handles from six to eight full trainloads of Buick cars every day, besides about the same number of Buicks in less than trainload shipments.

We get two trainloads, averaging 60 to 80 freight cars each, containing three automobiles, away for Chicago Junction every night," said the Pere Marquette official in charge of the Buick shipments, over his company's rails. "About the same number leaves each day for Suspension Bridge, Ont. There is one trainload a day for Detroit, one for Toledo, and generally one for Milwaukee or for some other point."

Buick delivers to nearby points by drive-aways averaging about 200 cars—or nearly 70 carloads—each day, by this means alone. Even when relieved of this portion of the work, however, the railroads must keep their crews and equipment on the job 24 hours a day, and peak production, Buick officials inform them, is still to come.

The Boers to Trek Again

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Another trek is on in Africa.

The Boers are ready to march again: 1800 men, women, and children, are getting under way with 240 wagons, and 1500 oxen and other domestic cattle.

This time the Boers trek south, usually they have moved north and west from Cape Town north to Transvaal, from Transvaal to Rhodesia, from Rhodesia to Angola. But now their covered wagons will creek behind the slow-moving oxen plodding south from Angola.

Will Drive Wagons 1500 Miles.

Boer families have packed their goods and are ready to travel from 800 to 1500 miles to new homes in South West Africa. In this territory, which has been taken over from Germany by the Union of South Africa as a mandate, 1600 acres has been set aside for each Boer family that will trek from the Portuguese colony.

The regal generosity of the government's gift of land is tempered by the geography of South West Africa, says a bulletin from the Washington, D. C., headquarters of the National Geographic society.

"Where it takes a good many acres to keep one cow in grass, as it does in arid South West Africa, 1600 acres is not such a large farm. The average offered to the Boers, who are a colony of the Boer, is about 1000 acres. The Boer war, in the vicinity of the villages of Groenfontein, Gibeon and Gobabis, all of which lie in the uplands. Their coming will by no means crowd the protectorate in which live only 24,000,000 white people, scattered over an area one-third the size of the United States east of the Mississippi.

highly "like eastern United States, South West Africa has a coastal path between ocean shore and highlands. Unlike the eastern plain in the United States, Africa's plain is a sandy desert, wind-blown, dune furrowed, 800 miles long. However, sufficient rain falls in the uplands to permit grazing. Yet there is not a forest in the whole 300,000 square miles.

About 550,000 natives live in South West Africa. Of this number the Hottentots only have a reputation that goes far beyond the borders. White men listened to them talk. Their click language rattled along like conversation in any zoo monkey cage and the first explorers said it sounded something like hot-tot-tot. So Hottentots they became.

Diamonds are South West Africa's staple product although the uplands support 600,000 cattle and some sheep. There are a few copper mines. But diamonds in the gravel deposits on the desert coast provide the chief income for citizens and for the government. A long search has been kept up for the mother lode containing the gems. A recent discovery may have disclosed the source of gems on the diamond coast.

Site of American Solar Observatory.

"South West Africa is the site of the solar radiation station maintained by the National Geographic society in co-operation with the Smithsonian Institution. 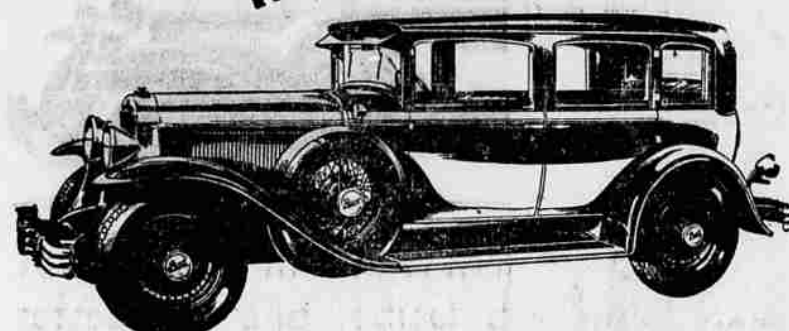
GENERAL MCCOY MAKES FRIENDS IN NICARAGUA

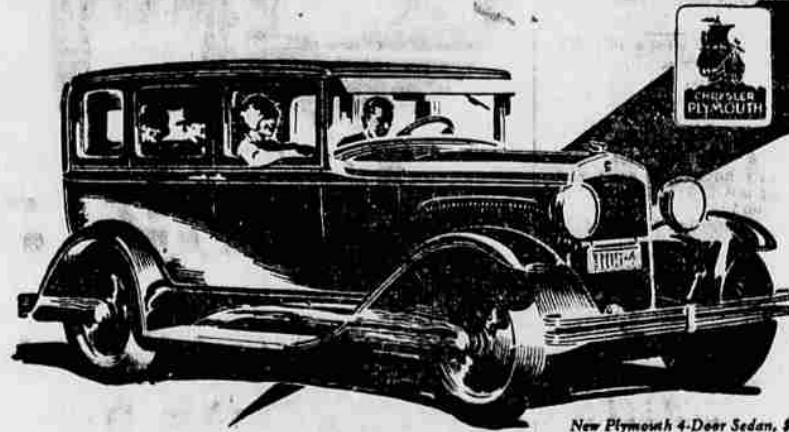

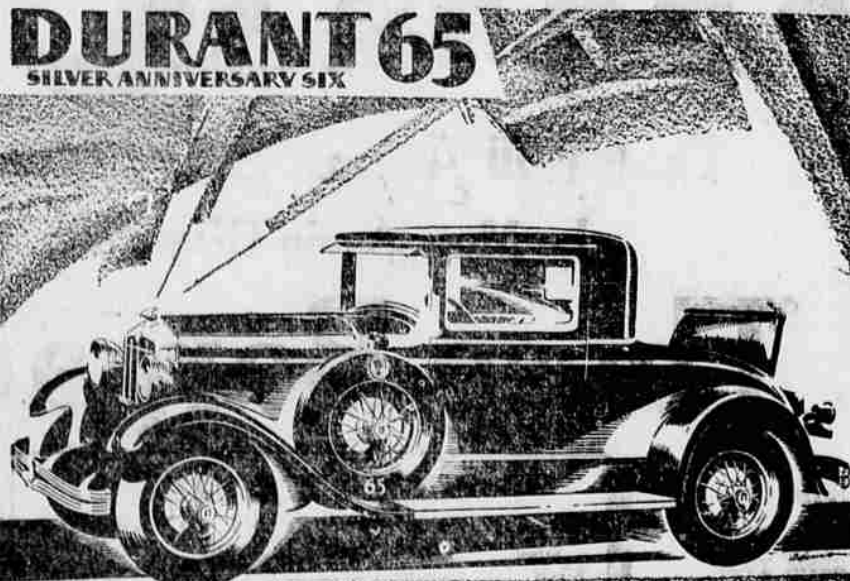
