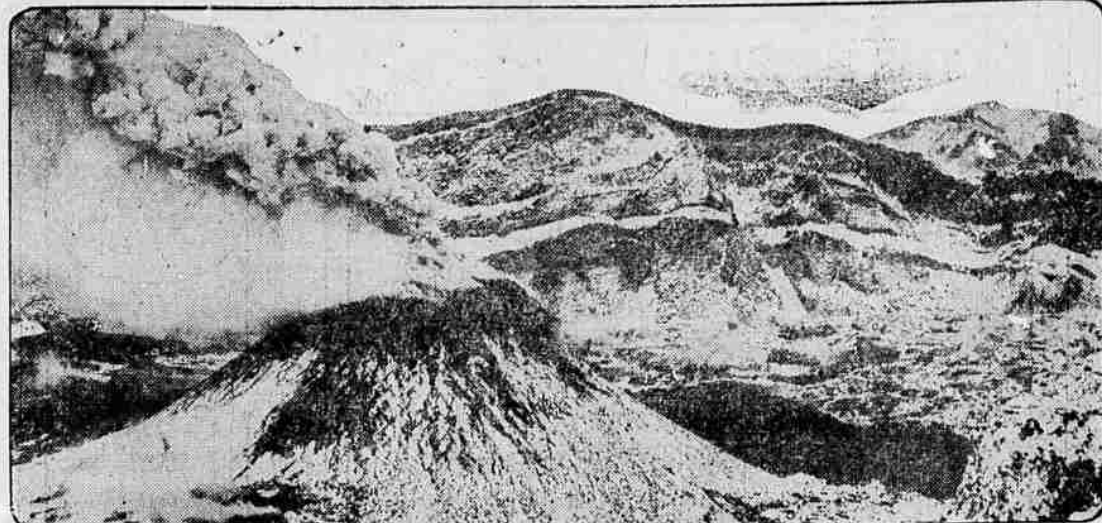

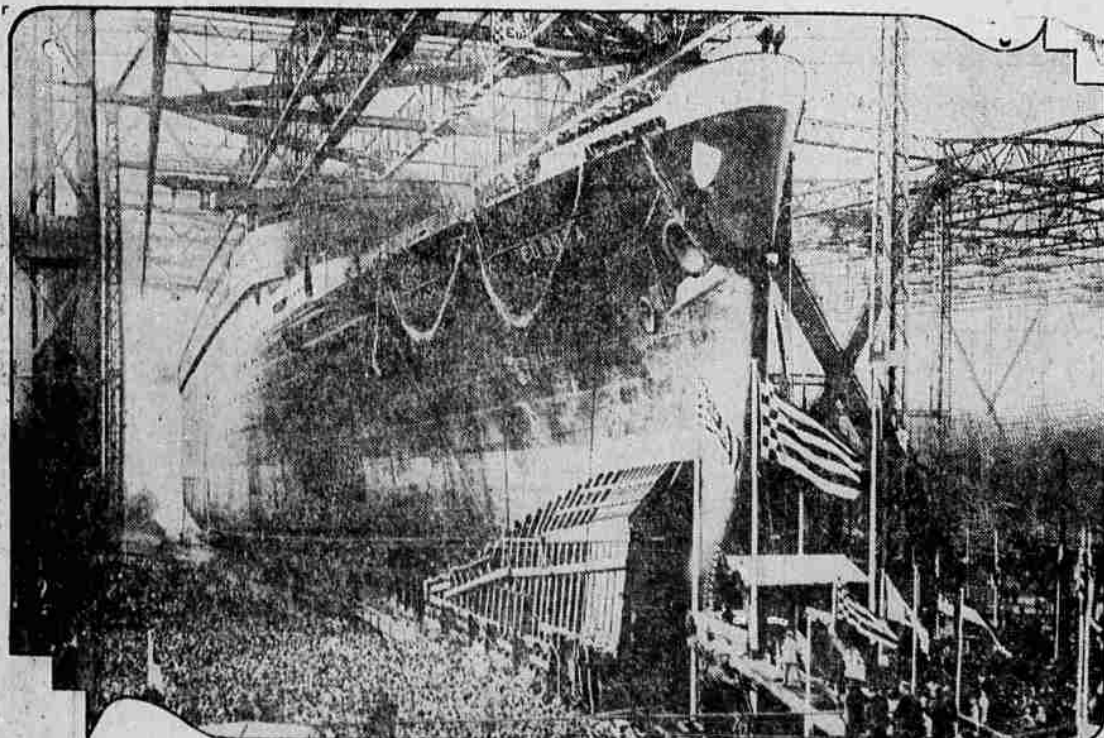

PRIDE OF THE RE-BORN GERMAN MERCHANT MARINE is this mighty ship, the Europa, largest and fastest German merchant vessel afloat. The picture shows the launching of the ship at Hamburg, Germany; the Europa measures 46,000 tons, and flies the flag of the North German Lloyd Steamship Co.



ALL THE WAY ACROSS the Pacific, alone and untended, came these Chinese boys on the Dollar liner President Lincoln, repatriated from Hongkong to join relatives in San Francisco. Neither boy could speak English, but they carried tags, kept their eyes open and made the trip in fine style.



FOR KING AND COUNTRY, in memory of the thousands of Tommies who gave their lives in the defense of Ypres, Belgium, during the war, this memorial has been dedicated at the famous Menin Gate by the British government. Photo shows the dedication ceremonies, witnessed by 11,000 British Legion pilgrims.
