JONES PROVES SELF KING OF AMATEUR GOLF

Bobby Administers Decisive Defeat to Britisher, and Equals Traver's Record By Triumph — Georgoni Always Master of Situation.

BREAHERN COUNTRY CLUB, NEWTON, Mass., Sept. 15.—(AP)—The rather staid but exceedingly business-like young man who dominates American links strode up and down the hills of Braehern today, wielding a mallet that dealt death and destruction to the hopes of British golf in general and the ambitions of Thomas Phillips Perkins in particular.

While a pop-eyed gallery of some 6,000 spectators perambled to watch him in astonishment, Bobby Jones crushed the champion of Great Britain, 10 up and 9 to play, in the most one-sided match for the amateur championship of the United States in thirty-three years. The great Georgian, reaching a higher plane of achievement than ever before in his amazing career, thus completed his ruthless march to a fourth national amateur title in five years and his eighth triumph in six years in either an American or British national tournament.

His fourth, and by long odds most decisive, amateur victory, equals the record of Jerome D. Travers, only other man to win the American crown four times. Bobby's achievement is even better, however, for he has been a finalist five straight times while Travers appeared but once in the final of a seven-year period.

In these last five championship ships, Jones has won 22 out of 24 matches, losing only to George Von Elm in the 1926 finale in compiling the greatest record any American amateur has ever known. If there has ever been a colossus of golf, it is this chunky, fair-haired son of the south who annihilates old man par and his opponents with complete impartiality.

Perkins, the first Briton to reach the American finals since Harold Hilton was victorious in 1922, was no match for Jones today. The promise of a keen tie fight, indicated by the brilliant manner of the youthful Englishman had won him his way to the final, was quickly dissipated. Whether it was because he could not forget the 12 and 12 thrashing he absorbed two weeks ago at the hands of Jones or whether the tension of the title match was too much for him, the invader's game went almost completely to pieces.

Perkins won only two holes, the first and seventeenth. His approximate medal score, at best, was 17 strokes over par for the 27 holes while Jones was exactly even with standard figures, with this elegant difference in their striking ability. It seemed almost ridiculously easy for the American to gain a lead of six up at the end of the first 18 holes, where he had one stroke of winning eight out of ten straight holes, and settle the match at the twenty-seventh green. There, with his ball some seven feet from the cup and Bobby's inches away for four, Perkins walked over to congratulate his conqueror.

Only one other man in the history of the American amateur tournament has suffered any more overwhelming defeat or failed to carry the issue beyond the twenty-seventh hole. That was in the first tournament, held in 1895 at Newport, where Charles B. Macdonald of Chicago crushed C. E. Sands, 12 and 11.

PITTSBURGH, Sept. 15.—(AP)—Attorney Fayette J. Tyrrell today was convicted of second degree murder for the killing of Philip Clark in the Mullan First Christian church on a Sunday morning last May.

The verdict calls for imprisonment of not less than 30 years, nor more than 25 years.

The killing of Clark was one of the most sensational in the history of Allegheny county. Tyrrell, superintendent of the church Sunday school, had been counsel for Clark's wife in divorce proceedings. On the day of the killing Clark appeared at the church to press for the removal of Tyrrell as Sunday school superintendent, on the grounds that he was not fit to hold the position. They met in the church auditorium a few minutes before services were to have opened. Tyrrell opened fire and Clark dropped with three bullets in his body.

Both families are Catholic. Moreover a Belgian princess, daughter of the "soldier king" Albert, would be enthusiastically welcomed by the Italian people.

SHIELDS BOWS TO COCHET, LOOMS AS FUTURE NET STAR

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Sept. 15.—(AP)—American tennis is to have one of those battles of the rapid and the lightning, the fierce blade of Henri Cochet of France is to be pitted against the slugging power of Francis T. Hunter, the lone surviving American, in the final for the national singles championship here on Monday.

Wielding these weapons with infinite skill and telling effect, Cochet and Hunter marched through their semi-final rounds this afternoon, before a howling, cheering, applauding crowd of almost 10,000 fans. Hunter defeated George Lott of Chicago by scores of 6-8, 6-4, 6-2, 6-4, and Cochet, the master of the scintillating stroke, defeated Frank Shields, lucky national junior champion, 6-2, 8-6, 6-4.

For this particular day it was written that youth should not be served. However, the two who were defeated gave all kinds of promise for future tennis greatness, particularly the latter Shields whose commanding service and skillful courtwork, recalling the Bill Tilden, gave the gallery many a thrill before he finally succumbed.

Frank Hunter already had founded out a notable victory, cheered on from the press stand by Tilden, his friend and former Davis cup comrade, when Cochet and Shields went out on the court. The 18-year-old American youngster, more than six feet tall, towered eight inches above his little French opponent but lacked his calm assurance.

In the first set Shields was clearly overmatched throughout the eight short games. He lasted, the gallery looked in vain for a flash of that brilliant tennis which sent him into this semi-final round bracket without the loss of a single set in four previous matches. Cochet, stealing himself against the noisiness of the crowd, which displayed his temperamental make-up in his last two matches, but suffered him not at all today, took full advantage of his young opponent's dismal errors.

Henri, the temperamental, trooped himself to one of his spells of indifference after winning the first game of the second set. This needed and with his service making it virtually impossible for Cochet to do more than get the ball back he ran off five straight games. He had learned to handle Cochet's puzzling delivery by this time and broke through him twice in this remarkable run, a rally which brought forth bursts of applause from the massed fans in the concrete horseshoe.

To some it seemed that Shields had struck a winning streak which could not be checked and that he had a chance for victory. But Cochet quickly dispelled that hope.

Applying the pressure steadily he ran off five straight games of his own, was hit by Shields' service, then took two more for the set.
