

RADIO STORE TO BE OPERATED BY PEOPLE'S ELECTRIC

Following a month of preparation Medford's newest exclusive radio store will be opened to the public tomorrow by the People's Electric store in a remodeled room adjoining that establishment's present headquarters on West Main street.

In addition to being Atwater Kent headquarters, the store will also act as a radio service station, where receiving sets may be repaired or placed in better condition. This department will be in charge of expert radio technicians, long experienced in this type of work.

The interior of the store is attractively decorated and finished, with hand hewn timbers stained brown, a feature of the decorative effects. The room is painted in tan and buff colors, pleasing to the eye. A balcony is at the back of the room and has a hand-wrought iron railing, which was made by the electric store employees.

Increase High School Usefulness

BOULDER, Colo. —(AP) The typical high school in this country is organized exclusively for the college preparation of the few and not for the life needs of the many, declares Dr. L. Thomas Hopkins, professor of education at the University of Colorado.

Dr. Hopkins explained at a meeting of educators that it is his belief that the subjects offered, the content of each and the methods of teaching should be adapted to the needs of the 92 percent of pupils who do not go to college, instead of the eight per cent who now attend institutions of higher learning.

Rock Moses Smote Still Yields Water

DAMASCUS, Syria —(AP) Out of the rock which Moses is said to have struck with his rod to make water gush forth a little stream still is trickling into the Syrian desert.

The Field Museum Syrian Desert expedition of Chicago, in its search for prehistoric remains of human life in the deserts of Mesopotamia and Trans-Jordan, has come across the famous rock in Horeb which legend says yielded water to the thirsting Israelites crossing the desert.

They found the rock giving an liberal supply of water as it must have done in the first days of its miraculous glory. A steady creek of cool liquid flows from the rock and forms the Wady Musa, or stream of Moses.

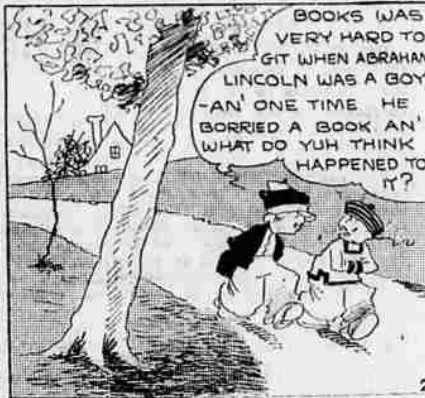
"The Wady is a great boon to travelers and their camels. Its water is clear and eminently drinkable. At the same time it is a place of reverence to many pilgrims who bless it not only for its comfort, but also for its historical associations.

It was at this spot that Moses faced one of the most difficult moments of the desert crossing. The Bible can tell the story much better than a journalist.

And the people thirsted there for water; and the people murmured against Moses, and said, Wherefore hast thou brought us up out of Egypt, to kill us and our children and our cattle with thirst?

"And Moses cried unto the Lord, saying, What shall I do unto this people? they are almost ready to stone me.

"And the Lord said unto Moses, Go on before the people, and take with thee of the elders of Israel; and thy rod, wherewith thou smotest the river, take in thine hand, and say, Behold, I stand before thee here upon the rock in Horeb; and thou shalt smite the rock; and there shall come water out of it; that the people may drink. And Moses did as the Lord commanded him, and water came out of the rock, and the people drank, and their cattle also.

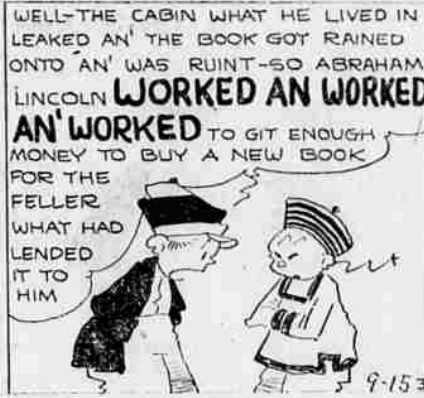
