

CANADA BREWER HELD FOR RANSOM BY GANG, ESCAPES

ROSY DEMOCRATIC HOPES ELUCIDATED BY JOHN RASKOB

DETROIT, Sept. 15.—(AP)—The name of Samuel Lewis, millionaire president of the Canning Brewing company of London, Ontario, today was added to the long list of victims of Detroit extortionists.

Low, his attorney, Major J. H. Clark of Windsor, reported to local police, was kidnapped September 8, near Windsor and held prisoner for \$25,000 ransom, strapped to a bed in a house near Thamesville, Ont.

The brewer gained his liberty Sunday without paying the ransom, but after guarantee had been exacted that he would raise the money.

Nothing was given out regarding the case until after an unsuccessful attempt by Detroit police yesterday to trap the extortionists.

Low had been instructed to deliver the \$25,000 to a taxi driver he was to meet in the lobby of a local hotel. Another man who was substituted for Low by police, met the driver, delivered to him a dummy package, while detectives stationed in the place followed the driver. As the latter reached the street he jumped into a car and eluded his pursuers in the heavy traffic.

Following collapse of the ruse, Low was said to have left for Toronto to confer with provincial officials regarding the next steps to be taken in the case.

The conference at Toronto was expected to result in some definite plan of action whereby crown authorities and Detroit police could cooperate in an effort to stamp out the gang, members of which have been preying upon wealthy liquor operators and others in the district over a period of more than two years.

HUSBAND OF RUTH JOINS POLAR TRIP

PANAMA, Sept. 15.—(AP)—Lyle Womack, who is suing Ruth Elder for divorce, was bound for the Antarctic today aboard the ship of Commander Richard E. Byrd's expedition to the South Pole.

Womack signed as an officer yesterday and sailed for Dunedin, New Zealand, aboard the vessel.

Womack was understood to have originally planned to enter the army flying school in Texas, but apparently encountered difficulties because he was married, which was thought to have barred enlistment.

Womack is the second person from the isthmus to join the Byrd expedition.

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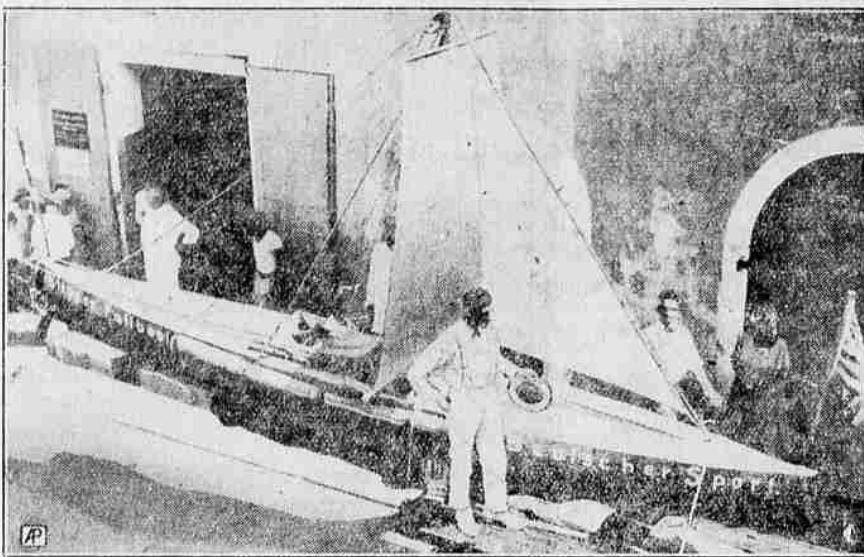
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GERMAN CROSSING ATLANTIC IN RUBBER BOAT

DECOY PACKAGE FAILS TO CATCH KIDNAPER GANG

CHICAGO, Sept. 18.—(AP)—A. Frank Hanteri, father of 10-year-old Hanteri, kidnapped 12 days ago, this morning received another special delivery letter, the fourth in five days believed to have contained messages and new threats from his son's abductors.

The father, a well-to-do Italian sewer contractor, refused to make public the contents of the message, but the police intimated it contained new threats because of a trap laid by the police last night in an effort to seize the kidnapers.

The police planted a package resembling money at a street intersection where they had information the kidnapers might be, and seized three men who tried to pick up the package in succession.

Although the police said each of the men appeared to have picked up the package innocently, all were held for questioning. Their arrests brought the total held to six, three of whom the police charge are members of the actual band of kidnapers.

Shortly after receiving the letter today, relatives hurried to a police station apparently much agitated, and sought a conference. They refused to talk about the contents of the message, although earlier letters had threatened to decapitate the boy and send his head to the parents unless they paid a ransom, first set at \$60,000 and later reduced to \$15,000.

The father told the police that he had paid \$5,000 but believes that those to whom he paid it do not know where his son is held.

Police officers also stated that the boy still is alive and that he will not be killed as long as the three men that the police accuse of the kidnapping are held in custody.
