MACKS DEFEATED AND FLAG HOPES GIVEN HARD JOLT

Cornie Mack's pennant hopes appear about ready to take wing, fly away and return only when another baseball season rolls around.

Cornie's hopes, along with his Philadelphia Athletics, ran full tilt into disaster yesterday at Cleveland, where, after this year, he has been confined almost exclusively to home-town rooters. The Indians are going nowhere and know it but they rose up on the rock of an 11-game losing streak to smack the Athletics for a 3-to-2 loss.

While the Athletics were engaged in this reprehensible business of losing a game, the New York Yankees staggered in drunken fashion to a 14-to-11 victory over the St. Louis Browns. This left the Yankees holding a two-game lead with only 11 games yet to play, no more than the Mackmen.

But Wallace was the victim of Cleveland's triumph.

St. Louis fans were given a chance to see Miller Huggins' four regular pitchers in action in one and the same game. Heimach, Johnson, Phipps and Hoyt followed each other to the mound in more or less rapid succession. Of the Yankees who played the whole game through only George Herman Ruth failed to hit safely. The Babe went to the plate six times. The game ended the season's series between the two clubs, the champions winning 12 of their 22 games with Dan Howley's men.

In the only other American league battle Bill Page, Tiger recruit from Springfield, of the Eastern league, celebrated his major league debut by pitching Detroit to an 8-to-2 victory over the Washington Senators.

The National league situation remained in statu quo, all three leaders recording triumphs.

The league-leading St. Louis Cardinals made it five in a row over the Phillies, 4 to 2, and closed the season's series with the Quakers with 20 victories and only two defeats. Jess Haines held the Phils to six hits.

Bill Terry's home run in the 10th gave the New York Giants the edge over the Pittsburgh Pirates 3 to 2, Thurleigh Grimes, trying for his 25th victory and his sixth over the Giants, gave away to a pinch hitter in the ninth with the score 3 to 1 against him.

The Chicago Cubs held fast to their position a game and a half from the Giants by beating Boston, 3 to 2. The Cubs smashed out 17 hits, Freddy Maguire getting four of them.

Chicabatt had little trouble howling over the Brooklyn Dodgers, 5 to 2, to make the season's count 12 to 10 in their favor.

248 ENTRIES IN PENDLETON RODEO

PENDLETON, Ore., Sept. 19.—(AP)—Sunny skies greeted Pendleton round-up visitors today as the city put on the nineteenth annual rodeo. Entries registered for the arena and track events which open this afternoon, numbered 248.

Today's influx of visitors was heavy for the first day's showing. Tomorrow fully 30,000 were expected to view the western spectacle.

The best bucking horseflesh had been tried out and found ready for contest with buckaroos. Wild steers from Texas, by the Rio Grande, were in pens ready to defy cowboys. More rodeo stars were entered this year than ever before.

Several hundred Indians added color as they were camped at the grounds in tents.

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DRY CANDIDATE IN MASSACHUSETTS IS PRIMARY WINNER

BOSTON, Sept. 19.—(AP)—Benjamin Loring Young, republican, former speaker of the Massachusetts house of representatives and a Boston lawyer, will oppose Senator David I. Walsh, democrat, in the November election as a result of yesterday's primary. The republican nominated Lieutenant-Governor Frank G. Allen for governor. The democratic nominee is General Charles H. Cole.

An eight-cornered race for the republican nomination for Lieutenant-governor developed into a close contest between State Treasurer William S. Youngman and Speaker John F. Hull of the state house of representatives, with Youngman apparently the victor.

John F. Malley, former collector of internal revenue, easily won the democratic nomination for Lieutenant-governor over Charles S. Murphy of Worcester.

In the senatorial contest considerable work of the prohibition league, Young and Ames coming out as "dry" and Draper in favor of any modification of the Volstead act "to promote true temperance."

Gen. Cole attributed his success largely to democratic enthusiasm for Guy Alfred E. Smith, whom Cole was one of the first in Massachusetts to favor for the democratic nomination for the presidency four weeks ago. In nominating Allen for governor the republicans followed a precedent in advancing the Lieutenant-governor which has obtained in many elections, including that of Calvin Coolidge.

Congressman Joseph W. Martin, Jr., and Charles I. Gifford, republican, and William F. Connerly, democrat, all of whom faced opposition, were renominated. William K. Kaynor of Springfield won the republican congressional nomination in the eleventh district and John W. McCormack of Boston the democratic nomination in the twelfth district.

The outcome in the ninth district, where Congressman Charles L. Underhill, republican, had two opponents, was in doubt today, as were democratic contests in the fifth, ninth and tenth districts.

Daniel A. Martin of Holyoke won the democratic nomination in a three-cornered contest in the first congressional district. Congressman Allen T. Treadway, Frank H. Fox, George E. Shultz, Edith S. Rogers, A. Platt Andrew, Frederick W. Dallinger and George H. Tinkham, all republicans, were renominated without opposition.

ALBANY, N. Y., Sept. 19.—(AP)—New York state yesterday selected candidates for congress, state senate and assembly to be voted on at the general election on November 6. Voters made 488 nominations and settled 32 contests in the state, 17 of them in New York City. Republican nominees contested nominations in 29 instances and democrats in 12.

Organization designed were successful in three of the four republican contests for congressional nominations update and a somewhat similar situation existed in the senate and assembly elections.

The seventeenth congressional district, dubbed the "ball stocking district" because of the contest of Phelps Phelps, former assemblyman, and Mrs. Ruth Pratt, lone woman member of the New York board of aldermen, for the republican nomination. Mrs. Pratt won.

Wallace Dempsey, chairman of the house rivers and harbors committee, and a resident of Niagara county, won the republican nomination for the 40th congressional

district from Henry W. Hall, who had the backing of the Erie county organization. Representative Frank Crowther, renominated by republicans of the 40th congressional district, comprising four counties in and north of the Mohawk river valley, was opposed by R. Wilson Gardner. Gardner was entered in both the republican and democratic primaries. He won the democratic nomination from Robert W. Austin.

Simmerings of Oregon Politics

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 19.—(AP)—Frank Davey of Portland, a republican leader of Oregon and former head of the Knights of Columbus in this state, predicted in an address here last night that Herbert Hoover will be elected president by the largest majority ever given a presidential candidate in the nation's history.

Davey said that Salem and Marion county voters have a special reason for supporting Hoover, since as a young man he helped establish the fruit industry here, and with his brother assisted in clearing the Red Hills farming area.

He added Hoover as having been the highest paid engineer in the world and he lauded that everything he has done had been accomplished with ability and dependability.

"I became a republican 56 years ago," Davey said. "And today I am still a republican just as intensely as ever, for I believe that the republican party was born to preserve the integrity of the nation. Its policies have always been directed to that end."

MYSTERY DEEPENS IN DISAPPEARANCE OF WEALTHY PAIR

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 19.—(AP)—Mystery today cast still another shadow over the strange disappearance of Mr. and Mrs. Albert La Huis, wealthy Michigan residents, even though sheriff's deputies early this morning reported the finding of bodies believed to be those of the missing couple beneath a wrecked car in the mountainous country near Sandberg, Calif.

For the discovery of the two bodies only raised the question "where is E. J. Walter?"

Walter was the La Huis, California promoter who accompanied the couple on their trip to Bakersfield, California, to inspect some oil properties. No trace of him was found near the car.

Positive identification of the bodies was lacking yet. The strongest indication that the bodies were those of the Zeeland, Michigan couple who came to California in August from Miami, Fla., to look over some oil lands in which La Huis was reported to have invested \$75,000 "light unseen" was the wrecked car. Its license revealed it was registered to Evelyn D. Walter, wife of the oil man.

Walter was said to have driven to Los Angeles from La Jolla shortly before August 18 to meet the La Huis. He had handled some oil investments for the Michigan banker, attorney of the La Huis family said, and together with his wife, La Huis planned to visit the Bakersfield oil tracts where the investments were placed.

On the eighteenth, they were reported to have reached Bakersfield. Bad roads held them back a day there before they could enter the fields. Shortly afterward they departed in Walter's car and were never seen again. Walter was said to have been driving.

Police investigating at Bakersfield found the company which was supposed to have previously owned the lands never existed. Attorneys for the family claimed the lands "never existed" too.

Sandberg is a village in the mountainous country half way between Bakersfield and Los Angeles. It is south of the Tehachan mountain range and directly north of Libby mountain.

While traversing a highway in proximity to Sandberg in search of a client's car which had been wrecked near there, Harry E. Nichols, an insurance manager and R. B. Savage, his companion, came upon a strip of ground where a car apparently had crashed over an embankment to a deep ravine below. They followed the rutted earth and came upon a demolished machine. Parts of two bodies protruded from the car.

The discovery was reported to authorities who investigated and found the body of an elderly man. The body of a woman beneath the car was left undisturbed because of the inability of officers to move the vehicle without more assistance.
