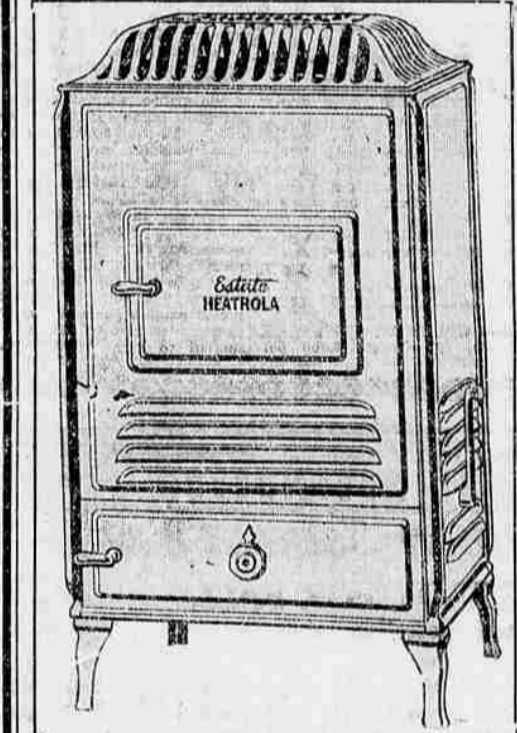

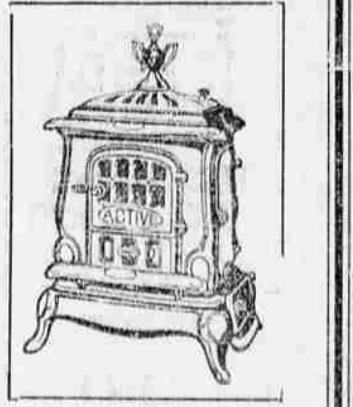

Double Air-Circulating System

Air taken into the Heatrola through patented "Louvre" type openings in both sides, front and rear of the cabinet, flows into a cast-iron chamber called the intensi-fire air duct, which is built into the heater directly over the fire. Here the air is intensely heated, then discharged into the dome, flowing into the room through the round opening in the top of the dome and also through the slotted openings in all four sides of the dome. This is termed primary circulation.
