

NAB 'APE', FEAR WILL KILL SELF

Mother Also Under Arrest
in Canada—Boy Admits
Hoax By Posing As An-
other, and Fooled Police
—Fiend Kept Under Close
Guard.

KAMLOOPS, B. C., Sept. 20.—(AP)—Gordon Stuart Northcott, a 21-year-old youth accused of operating a "murder" farm at Kamloops, B. C., was taken to Vancouver on a Canadian Pacific railway train at 8:10 o'clock tonight, where he will await extradition to Los Angeles.

The alleged killer of several boys on his father's California farm was apprehended at Vernon, B. C., yesterday and brought to Kamloops by automobile last night.

Northcott spent a restless night in the Kamloops jail. He caused considerable anxiety among his guards as it was felt that he might become desperate. Provincial police said that they will take no chances with the man and will permit him no liberties. Staff Sergeant Fraser of the provincial force was in charge of the accused murderer on the trip to Vancouver.

Northcott will be held in either the city police station at Vancouver or at the Okalla jail on the outskirts of the city pending his removal to California.

As Northcott is a Canadian citizen he cannot be deported from Canada. It is not known whether he will waive extradition proceedings.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Sept. 20.—(AP)—The task of unearthing human bones and other evidence relating to the sinister story of the Northcott murder farm was suspended today by southern California officials pending the return here of the woman and boy arrested in Canada as the arch plotters in the case.

The center of activity in the southern California angle of the case today was the Riverside county district attorney's office, which began extradition proceedings against young Gordon Northcott and his mother, Mrs. Louisa Northcott. Authorities here were confident that the youth arrested in Vernon, B. C., yesterday and the woman held in Calgary, Alta., are the two principals named in the story of torture and murder as told by their young relative, Sanford Clark. They are wanted at Riverside for murder.

Last night authorities were informed that a boy who had been brought here from De Kalb, Ill., under the identity of Walter Collins, a youth who had been kidnapped here months before, admitted that he was not the abducted youth and that his association of young Collins' name was a hoax. This confirmed the suspicions of the mother of Walter Collins, who had insisted that the boy returned to her was not her son. Walter Collins was named by young Sanford Clark as one of the four boys tortured and murdered on the Northcott farm.

The boy who had been brought here from Illinois said he not only was not Walter Collins but that he never had been in California before. Declaring he did not know his name, the lad said he believed his parents dead. Police, however, were informed in a message from a woman in Illinois that she believed the boy here to be "Billy Fields" and that his parents were living.

The youngster said he had been able to work the hoax by delaying replies to questions until some one gave him a suggestion as to the correct answer. The rest was just "wild guesswork," he said. He told the police his only knowledge of Walter Collins was from what he learned through newspaper accounts and from talking with people in Sycamore, Ill.

The boy previously had convinced police that he was Walter Collins, and his mother, Mrs. Christine Collins, after her refusal to admit he was her boy, was held in the psychiatric ward of the general hospital for observation.

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CRATER LODGE CLOSED TODAY. PARK IS OPEN

While the Crater Lake season officially ended late today when the lodge was closed, and the stage service from between Medford and Klamath Falls to the lake, and the boat service were discontinued, the season will not unofficially until winter sets in at the national park, as despite the fact that the pack concessions will be suspended, the park administration will remain open until winter's arrival.

This is the finest time of the year at the lake and as usual after the official closing many hundreds of tourists and others will continue to visit the park until it is snowbound. The round trip drive from Medford can easily be negotiated in one day, but in case of emergency, visitors will be served necessary meals at the national park service mess at park headquarters.

The season's program of road and other improvements, will be continued as long as the weather permits.

The big lodge was placed in ship shape to weather the winter storms and all necessary packing had been completed by early this afternoon, after which the remaining officials and employees of the lodge and other concessions, including R. W. Fiske, the general manager, departed for Medford in the stages and were expected to arrive by 5 p. m.

The large force of employees had been gradually decreased since Labor Day, until only a comparatively few remained today. Preparations had been going for days past toward closing up the lodge. No stages went up to Crater Lake today from either Medford or Klamath Falls because the lodge could not entertain guests, and the stage service had gradually been decreased since last Sunday.

FRIENDLY SUITS FILED TO COMPEL BOND PAYMENTS

SALISBURY, Ore., Sept. 20.—(AP) The Florida National bank of Jacksonville, Fla., and George A. Hunt yesterday filed mandamus suits in the supreme court against A. C. Walker, county treasurer of Jackson county to compel the treasurer to pay a total of about \$12,000 interest and principal on the Eagle Point irrigation bonds. They claim that sum of money in the county treasury is available for the purpose. The two suits are identical. The alternative writs are made returnable October 19.

The Florida National bank is suing on a \$5000 bond which they hold on the Eagle Point district, and George A. Hunt on a \$1000 bond, both of which materialized January 1, and the interest upon shortest materialized July 1. These bonds are part of the \$250,000 default now held against the district. The original bond issue amounted to \$400,000, of which \$5000 had been redeemed.

The writ was not objected to by O. C. Boggs, who represents both the district and A. C. Walker. The case is one of priority. The question to be determined is whether the bonds, which materialized in January should be paid from the funds now in the hands of the county treasurer, whether the semi-annual interest on the \$250,000 should be paid, or whether the money held by the treasurer should be retained by him because it is not sufficient both to redeem the bonds and to pay the interest.

POLO GROUNDS, NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—(AP) Some 40,000 per-

sons swarmed the concrete confines of the historic old Polo Grounds this afternoon to watch the New York Giants and the St. Louis Cardinals do battle in a double header that will virtually determine the winner of this year's National league championship.

With interest in the pennant race keen as a razor edge crowds gathered at the Polo Grounds entrance hours before the gates were thrown open. Special details of police kept traffic open and there was no confusion.

The New Yorkers were confronted with the task of winning both games to bring the Giants to a tie with the St. Louis Cardinals. An even break with the Cardinals would be almost fatal to the New Yorkers' championship aspirations.

"We are out for these two games," said Manager McGraw before the first contest. "In such contests as these the breaks usually determine."

There was a world series atmosphere to the contests. Hordes of photographers cruised about during the preliminary practice snapping the managers and players, while balls driven into the stands in batting practice brought salvos of cheers.

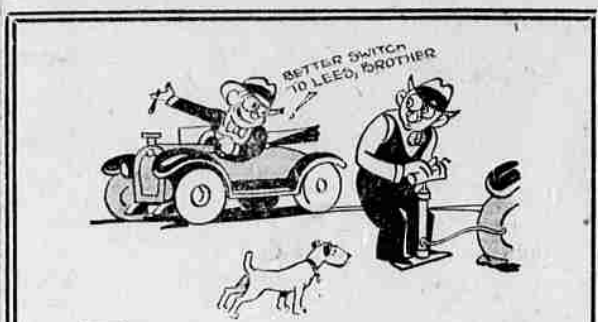

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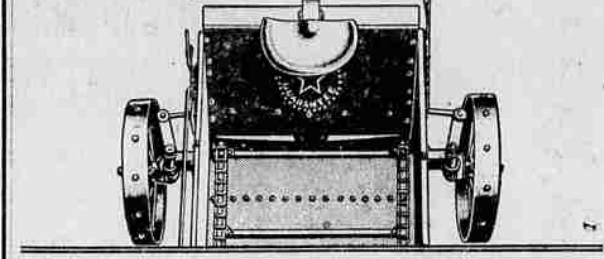
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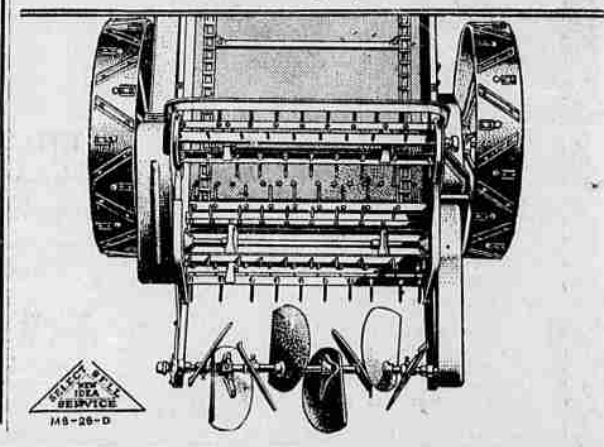
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
