WOMEN GOLFERS START TITLE PLAY WITH 118 ENTRIES

NEW YORK, Sept. 20. (AP)—Women from every section of the United States and Canada will seek the highest honor a woman golfer can win—the championship—at Hot Springs, Va., next week. One hundred and eighty-eight players will bid for the crown in the medal play round of 18 holes Monday, September 24. Thirty-two will qualify for match play to continue through the week.

All the champions since 1921 are entered with a score of sectional title holders and a scattering representation from Canada.

The defending champion, Mrs. George W. Tyson, who won the title as Miriam Burns Horn, will play her qualifying round with Mrs. Harry Pressler of Los Angeles, eastern women's champion and a player whose chances are highly favored in the competition. Margaret Owen, Ayrath, N. J., runner-up last year, will go out to qualify with Mrs. O. S. Hill of Kansas City, another sound woman golfer.

PISTOLS BARK AT NOISY CAFE PARTY

CHICAGO, Sept. 20. (AP)—A gun fight in the Turkish cafe on North Clark street early today ended with John Pecora, a patron, dead, and two policemen, Allen Carroll and John Fogarty, wounded.

Pecora, his wife, a man whose name was not learned and Miss Rose Landis, composed the party, which police were called to quiet. The cafe management summoned police after efforts of waiters to quiet the men had failed.

When officers Carroll and Fogarty approached, Pecora and his companion drew pistols and opened fire, dropping Wilson mortally wounded. Pecora's companion fled.

The two women were held for questioning. The policemen were taken to a hospital where their injuries were said to be not serious.

MRS. COOLIDGE AT MOTHER'S BEDSIDE

NORTHAMPTON, Mass., Sept. 20. (AP)—Anxious to ascertain for themselves the condition of Mrs. Lemna Goodhue, Mrs. Coolidge's mother, who has been ill for many months, President and Mrs. Coolidge paused here today on their way to Vermont for an inspection trip.

They found Mrs. Goodhue considerably weaker than she was on their last visit in May. She was cheerful, however, and hospital attendants said she rallied a little as a result of the visit.

Mrs. Coolidge entered her mother's room alone and stayed at her bedside for a half hour before the chief executive joined her. Mrs. Coolidge promised to return to stay with her mother several days on her way back from Plymouth to Washington.

AIMEE SAYS PARIS NOT SO WICKED

PARIS, France, Sept. 20. (AP)—Paris, the so-called modern Babylon, does not appear to be as wicked as represented, Mrs. Aimee Semple McPherson, Los Angeles evangelist, informed those who inquired today about her impressions. All Parisians, she said, seemed to be hard working.

The only thing that mildly shocked Mrs. McPherson was the prevalence of what she termed "open bars," and interviewers assumed she meant cafes.

Mrs. McPherson said she planned to stay two or three days in Paris to show her son the sights. Then she will go to Switzerland for a vacation after which she will conduct an evangelical campaign in England.

JAPANESE COOK IS SELF SLAYER

LA GRANDE, Ore., Sept. 19. (AP)—Kanematsu Higo, 55, a cook, committed suicide at Pondosa, Ore., by hanging himself to a tree near the cookhouse last night, Coroner F. L. Ralston reported today. The motive was unknown. Higo came to Pondosa from Baker, where his body was taken. He had worked one day. His death was discovered when lumber workers came in for supper; found him hanging and started search.

PLANE MOTOR THAT BURNS OIL TESTED; HAS 3 ADVANTAGES

DETROIT, Sept. 20. (AP)—The Packard Motor company has announced the successful testing of an oil burning airplane motor, the first of its kind ever developed.

The demonstration was made here yesterday before a group of aeronautical engineers in a regulation Stinson-Detroler monoplane, piloted by Walter Lees and Capt. L. M. Woulson, the latter designer of the engine.

The motor, which company officials claim marks a revolutionary step in the development of airplane power, is a radial air cooled type and develops 200 horsepower. It involves use of the Diesel principle of oil for fuel and eliminates gasoline, ignition systems, carburetors, spark plugs and other parts usually regarded as trouble makers.

The engine derives power by firing from compression in the cylinders. The Diesel action that heretofore has been applied only in extremely heavy engines for power plants and boats. Aside from the simplicity and ruggedness of design, the engine has fewer parts than the lightest gasoline engines now in use.

The three cardinal improvements over the gasoline motor, claimed by its designers, are:

Elimination of the danger of fire from gasoline.

Reduction of fuel consumption and cost. It is claimed the motor will carry a plane 25 per cent further with the same weight in oil fuel as compared with gasoline.

Making possible radio communication with aircraft on a broad scale due to elimination of interference by electrical ignition systems and gasoline engines.

From the engineering standpoint the most brilliant achievement is claimed in the weight reduction of such a Diesel engine. Until now the lightest Diesel plant ever built weighed 100 pounds per horsepower. The new plant weighs less than three pounds per horsepower.

German engineers, who have been struggling for years in an effort to reduce the weight of Diesel plants, were quoted in recent newspaper dispatches as having given up the task as far as efforts to make the engine applicable for airplanes were concerned.

Plans for mass production of the engine are being held in abeyance by the Packard company, pending further ground and air tests, officials said.

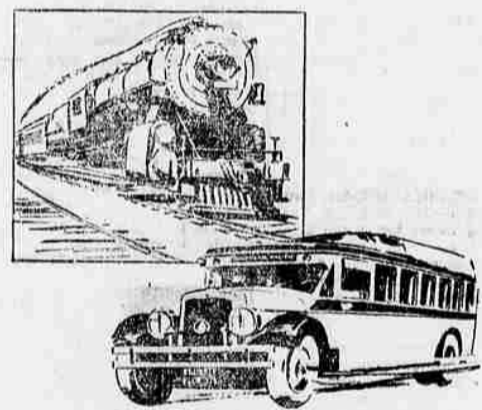
